# Advent is for Waiting

Advent is coming soon, December 3 to be exact! Here's the thing, Advent is about waiting for Christmas. As a Presbyterian, my family waited in Advent:

- On Sundays we had special dinners in the dining room, lighted the Advent candles, read Scripture, and sang a line of a Christmas carol;
- We opened an Advent calendar;
- We had Advent Parties and sang Christmas carols;
- We decorated a live tree in mid-December (having kept it in a bucket in the garage!);
- We tried not to do much Christmas baking until the week before;
- The Prayer of the Dawn became a practice that I anticipated all year.

#### We waited.

Our waiting centered on remembering the first coming of Jesus and anticipating his second coming. And yet, I always wondered what else might we be doing while we waited...as we prepared for his coming. It wasn't until we became Anglican nine years ago, that I learned that Advent is a penitential season. And then it clicked! The way to prepare for Jesus is to follow Isaiah and John the Baptist and repent and believe: the Kingdom of God is near. Repentance makes us ready for Jesus and the changes he brings into our lives.

"The irony of the Faith is that we wait. We wait for restoration. But our waiting is not without action. The most important activity of a waiting church is repentance – turning from our known sins and disobedience to God's Word and walking from this day forward in holiness and righteous living in Him. We don't long for the glory days, but rather we long and wait for the Lord, as J.R. R. Tolkien quipped, to make all the sad things come untrue." - **Archbishop Foley Beach**

- Morning Prayer. We offer four Morning Prayer services each week at All Saints on Monday, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays at 8:15 am. Note that we will not be having Morning Prayer services the week of Christmas.

# Formation Hour in December

ur new Sunday morning schedule that includes a Formation Hour for all ages at 8:45 am hit the ground running on November 19. We have been so encouraged by all of those who have made this a priority. We're still adjusting and trying to tweak a few things so that together we might be even more prepared to encounter God at our Holy Eucharist service at 10:00 am. Here are a few things we're learning:

- 1. The Formation Hour for our children is most effective if they are able to be present for the entire hour. Please make every effort to have your child checked in by 8:45 am.
- 2. The Adult Formation Hour begins at 8:45 am in the Hospitality Room off of the narthex for a time of coffee and fellowship. We then move into the nave around 8:55 so that we can distribute material and begin our reflections at 9:00. Feel free to show up at 9:00 instead of 8:45 if that is what you prefer.

- 3. People are encouraged to bring their own journal, Bible, and Book of Common Prayer to use during the Adult Formation Hour, or these will be provided for you.
- 4. We aim to conclude the Adult Formation Hour no later than 9:40 so that parents can immediately retrieve their children from the Parish Hall and return to the nave for worship without being rushed. As the Adult Formation Hour ends, we encourage everyone to keep silence in the nave so that others can prayerfully prepare for worship.



# Bernini

Caravaggio created the baroque style in painting: passionate, personal, human, and always dynamic. Gian Lorenzo Bernini arrived in Rome the year Caravaggio left (1606), appears to have studied Caravaggio, and brought the baroque to sculpture. Both were brilliant, visionary artists, both were famous for their emotional outbursts, and both were committed to capturing the human drama of transformation. Unlike Caravaggio, plenty of written evidence indicates that Bernini became a deeply devout Christian. As a mature adult, he attended Mass daily, worked through the Ignatian Spiritual Exercises multiple times, and sought to live faithfully.

The depth, range, and quality of Bernini's work is startling. He was a mind-boggling mix of talent, work ethic, longevity, ego, and unlimited funding. Bernini's most famous work you have seen: the spiral-columned baldachin (canopy) over the high alter of St. Peter's Basilica in Vatican City. But most of the rest of the interior of St Peter's was designed by Bernini as well, giving the newly completed St Peter's the grandeur and emotional power that it carries today. Bernini also redesigned St Peter's Square, building its massive double colonnade.

These most-seen pieces beckon us to the rest. His artistic career – sculptor, architect, painter, set designer – spanned seventy years, from childhood to shortly before his death at age 82.

His loveliest piece might be *The Ecstasy of*St Teresa, constructed

for a side chapel in the Church of Santa Maria della Vittoria in the late 1640s. Bernini captures Teresa in the middle of her vision of God's love, a moment, she wrote, of supreme ecstasy and pain. The Latin root of the word "statuary" implies "standing", but this statue isn't standing so much as moving: clothes awry, head tipped back, mouth agape. An angel is on the verge of plunging his golden arrow into Teresa's heart. The chapel wall bulges outward from the force of the angel's descent and golden rays stream from above, illuminated as if by the Holy Spirit. It is as animated as marble can be: sensual, theatrical, and beautiful.

St Teresa is installed in the Cornaro chapel, also designed by Bernini. Members of Cornaro family look on from the sides, two watching, others talking, one reading a book. (Bernini preferred to talk with his models rather than have them be still, to

better capture their likeness.) They look on as you and I might look on from theater boxes at a stage production. There is no greater drama than God's transformative love, it reminds us, and we

are part of the play.

St Teresa is unmistakably rich in theology and devotion. As a starting point, its beauty testifies to

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the human love of beauty, itself a unique gift from God. The statuary is part of the Catholic counter-reformation and thus responds to Protestant pursuit of direst relationship with God. In *St Teresa*, the Spirit has descended to visit and inspire Teresa with an ecstasy of love. Teresa's union with God is spiritual and physical, transcendent and sensual, divine and human, action in the midst of contemplation. The work is deeply Christian and sacramental, intended to inspire us, as well. To add a final layer of meaning, the eschatology is clear. Teresa's vision and Bernini's art point to that time beyond time when we will be united with the God who loves us at the recreation of heaven and earth (Rev 21).
