Gospel makes progress in Canada

Despite growth of secularism, work of Christ moves forward in land of Maple Leaf

ARBCA has one missionary and two national pastors in Canada. Each of these is faithfully serving Christ and each is seeing encouraging gospel results.

This article will give a brief summary of each of these faithful servants of Christ:

Daniel Durand, Raymond Perron and Chris Powell. I will also include in this article Pascal Denault whose ordination council was conducted during my visit to Quebec.

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Commentary: Of balloons and seed planters

I read the book "Missionary Methods: St. Paul's or Ours?" by Roland Allen over 40 years ago and the deep impression it made on my mind has never left. However, I have not reread the book in the intervening years. I deeply regret that neglect.

As I was reading the book statements made on pages 174-176 gave me pause for meditation. The book was first published in 1902 with a second edition in 1927. My edition has a copyright of 1962.

The sentences that I quote come from chapter 7, "The Substance of Paul's Preaching."

"St. Paul expected his hearers to be moved... Simply to scatter the seed, with a sort of vague hope that some of it may come up somewhere, is not preaching the Gospel... To preach the Gospel requires that the preacher should believe that he is sent to those whom he is addressing at the moment, because God has among them those whom He is at the moment calling: it requires that the speaker should expect a response." (p. 174)

"Our idea of 'sowing the seed' seems to be rather like scattering wheat out of a balloon... St. Paul did not scatter seeds; he planted. He so dealt with his hearers that

he brought them speedily and directly to a point of decision, and then he demanded of them that they should make a choice and act on their choice." (p. 174)

"The possibility of rejection was ever present... Can there be a true teaching which does not involve the refusal to go on teaching? The teaching of the Gospel is not a mere intellectual instruction: it is a moral process, and involves a moral response. If then we go on teaching where that moral response is refused, we cease to preach the Gospel; we make the teaching a mere education of the intellect... We should refuse to give intellectual teaching to a pupil if he refused to give us his attention: we might equally refuse to give religious teaching to a pupil who refused to give us religious attention." (p. 175)

"We have forgotten that the same Lord who gave us the command to go, gave us the command to shake off the dust from our feet. We have lost the art of shaking the lap, we have learnt the art of steeling our hearts and shutting up the bowels of our compassion against those who cry to us for the Gospel." (p. 175)

The applications are almost too obvious for me to note, but I will take the risk of the obvious.

1) Do we preach with the expectation that conversions will occur? Or have we become so used to the lack of fruit in America that we consider it normal to have only one to five conversions a year?

2) Are we content with merely scattering the seed from a balloon? This is a stinging rebuke to those who merely serve up good meals of gospel preaching that lack zeal, conviction and expectation.

3) Are we willing to move on from a place or country that is rejecting the gospel and move to a place in the world that is crying for the truth?

In regard to this last thought, I wonder if we may have too many preachers in the USA. There are places that are longing for someone to learn their language to come and teach them, to help them evangelize, to help them form a church and to help them see clearly the errors of false teaching.

Would it be good if some of our experienced men sacrificed and went to regions of the world to plant the seed among those who are longing for a gospel ministry? I am asking the question of myself and of you. I believe these are questions that need to be answered.

The Lord has been pleased to establish an association of Reformed Baptist churches in Quebec. The Association d'Eglises reformées baptistes du Québec was formed on March 17, 1999. Montreal – Daniel Durand

National Pastor Daniel Durand, spon-

sored by Grace Baptist Church in Carlisle, Pa., pastors the Reformed Baptist Church in Montreal. Because they rent a building from a Bible church, they only meet on Sunday afternoons at 2 p.m.

However, even with this kind of hindrance the Lord has been pleased to add many to the church over the past months so that their attendance has steadily increased. The worship on the Lord's Day was reverent and vibrant as these saints sang the praises of God in their own language.

Pastor Durand travels many miles each month as he shepherds these believers. The Lord has truly rewarded his efforts with a growing congregation that loves Christ.

Pastor Durand is also involved in planting a church in Aylmer. Aylmer is over 200 kilometers (125 miles) west of

Montreal (about a 2 1/2-hour drive) and just west of Ottawa, the capital of Canada. André Pinard is the brother who is leading this group and the work has seen slow progress, however recently some visitors have begun to attend.

Here are some prayer requests for the ministry of Daniel Durand:

1) Pray that the Lord will provide a building so they can meet on the Lord's Day morning.

2) Pray for continued progress in the church plant effort in Aylmer and for a pastor for this work.

3) Finally, pray that the Lord will supply the needs of the Durands. Daniel faithfully visits and carries on an active ministry, but I noted that his automobile is quite

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Institute for Reformed Baptist Studies

Church interns: From the other side

In the previous issue of ARBCA Update, Pastor Dave Johnston wrote about his church's experience with an IRBS in-

tern. Now we get to hear the other side of the story, from two men who are members of Escondido Reformed Baptist Church—Jason Walter, a senior IRBS student, and

Micah Renihan, a second-year student. These are their reflections—in their own words—on internships completed in the summer of 2010.

Jason Walter:

In June and July of this past summer I enjoyed the tremendous privilege of an internship at Grace Baptist Church in Christchurch, New Zealand. Pastors Rob Harrod and Doug Sinclair were a joy to learn from; the church was warm and welcoming; and the scenery, of course, was gorgeous. During six, all-too-short weeks, I was able to preach several times, lead or help lead multiple Bible studies, sit in on elders' meetings, tag along on pastoral visits, participate in weekly outreach programs, and even attend the annual School of Theology (taught by none other than Dr. Jim Renihan) and a meeting of the Fellowship of Reformed Baptist Churches of New Zealand. I benefited from the experience to a far greater degree and in far many more ways than I could possibly describe here, and I can only pray that the church there was blessed to some small fraction of the extent to which I was.

As seminary students, my classmates and I are frequently reminded that much of what is required in pastoral ministry cannot be learned in the classroom or from a textbook, and this summer I learned how very true that reminder is. I was able for the first time fully to be involved in the nitty-gritty of everyday pastoral life, and observing such godly and faithful pastors in action was of inestimable value. They modeled for me a deep concern and love for the flock that God had placed under their care, tremendous wisdom in dealing with difficult and sensitive issues, as well as profound humility and a sense of dependence upon God in it all. Nothing could have impressed the necessity of these traits upon me more deeply than seeing them demonstrated in such vivid and living colors. Parallel to this, I have never been so convinced as I became this past summer of the unstinted sufficiency of the Scriptures to supply the pastor with all he needs to fulfill his calling (II Tim. 3:17).

One unexpected benefit in doing an internship in a different cultural setting, I found, was that the experience helped to temper my perspective on America and on the church in America. For one thing, it deepened my thankfulness for the bountiful resources that God has provided His people in this land, especially in opportunities for theological education in such a multitude of solid Christian colleges and seminaries. But it also helped me to realize, in a way that only first-hand experience can help one to realize, that God is

Micah Renihan:

This summer I had the privilege of spending nine weeks in Maine ministering at Grace Community Church in Topsham as a summer intern. This was my first experience doing any sort of real internship or doing any full-time ministry at all. The understanding that I gained during this time was invaluable to me. During these nine weeks I was able to preach six times, teach Sunday School five times, speak at a youth event, meet regularly with Pastor Baines, meet with several of the young men in the church in a pastoral setting, meet with a couple of the men in the church on a weekly basis for evaluation and encouragement, not to mention getting to know and love the brothers and sisters in the church.

Probably the main reason this experience was so helpful to me was simply gaining the experience. Before this summer I had preached only a few times and had taught an adult Sunday school class only a few times. Each time I preached or taught in the past I knew at least a month in advance. I never had the experience of preparing sermons for consecutive weeks. I also had never been able to preach a series of sermons. This internship was very useful to me both in giving me more opportunities to preach and teach as well as in learning what it is like to be preparing sermons each week and in a series. It is apparent to me that the more opportunities I get to preach the better preacher I become.

The second reason this internship was so helpful to me was that I was able to spend a whole summer at a different church than my home church. I found it very helpful to preach to a church that doesn't know me in the same way as my home church. The church in Topsham, Maine very appropriately viewed me as a student, as someone still developing as a preacher. But even with that mindset, it was still different for them to hear me preach than it is when I preach at home. The type of feedback and critique I could receive from them was often different from what I would receive in my home church. I would strongly recommend to my fellow students that they do an internship at a church that they have not grown up in.

One of my favorite parts of the internship was being able to work with Pastor Baines very closely every week. I was able to ask him any question that came into my mind, questions about the

Please pray also for a young family I am counseling. They also have had a beginning with Christ, yet the husband and wife both struggle with anger and lack of gentleness with each other. They exhibit some attentiveness to God's Word and we are praying that God will be pleased to do His work in their lives.

I was selected to lead the committee for our Chaplain Anniversary event this year, which will have taken place on Nov. 5, after you read this.

There are a lot of moving parts involved as we expect to have several flag officers present and coordinate a formal dinner, etc. My children were asked to provide the musical entertainment for this event.

I am preaching one sermon on each book of the Bible at the Chapel and have gotten through Psalms in the Old Testament and 1st Thessalonians in the New. Hopefully my attempts to "attack biblical illiteracy with fervor" will pay off.

Thank you for your prayers for our annual Summer Family Camp. We had an excellent camp, though numbers were down about 20 percent to about 120 attendees this year, just as they were last year.

The site where we have been holding the camp for the last three years is not as geographically central to the French attendees as the previous site, so we wonder if this is a factor in the lowered attendance. We are thinking of changing sites after next summer. However, we enjoyed excellent ministry from the various preachers including Daniel Durand, who brought a message on prayer and a message on self-denial in relationships and in the family.

It was a special joy for the people to get to know Daniel and Loraine and to deepen our ties with our French-speaking cousins in Quebec. We continue to get a good number of new first-time comers to the camp and these are often people who have not had previous exposure to the world of "Reformed theology." We are thankful for this opportunity and trust that it is bearing fruit throughout the years.

In the beginning of September we had a week-long visit from Pastor Ibrahim Ag-Mohamed. I mentioned him to you in my last letter. He is a converted Muslim and Reformed Baptist pastor from the West African country of Mali.

He has had a rich experience, including 10 years of translating the New Testament into his mother tongue, Tuareg, as well as about 15 years of planting 3 churches in Muslim northern Mali. He and his Polish wife and his two children have moved to Europe for family reasons and he is now searching for an opportunity for church planting and pastoral ministry on the continent.

As Mali is a French-speaking country and he is a fluent French speaker, he is especially interested in opportunities in France and Switzerland. He ministered in the Grenoble church on the Lord's Day, and in the mid-week meeting and we drove down to Aix-en-Provence where he led a mid-week Bible study and we had a morning's discus-

sion with a missionary involved in ministry to Muslims in the south of France.

Ibrahim and I hit it off wonderfully and greatly enjoyed one another's fellowship. It was a joy to be with a seasoned man of God who possesses real wisdom and sound theology (Ibrahim was trained at Spurgeon's College at the Metropolitan Tabernacle in London.) and seems to know the Bible almost by heart. Ibrahim accompanied me on an important pastoral visit during the week and his contribution was a great help. His whole manner was very wise and pastoral and the person we were counseling greatly appreciated this. Ibrahim and I are discussing the possibility of ministry together.

There may be an opportunity to go to Aix-en-Provence as a team. In this highly Muslim region of France, Ibrahim's gifts, knowledge and experience would be of tremendous value. At the moment he is waiting to get naturalization as a Polish citizen. This December he will have completed the two-year stay in Poland which is necessary to obtain it. Once he has it he will be able to live anywhere in the European Union including France or Switzerland.

Ibrahim has also visited the Reformed Baptist church plants in Payerne and Neuchatel and is weighing them, along with Grenoble/Aix, as possible doors of service. Please pray that the Lord would guide him and us as we seek His will.

In my last letter I mentioned a Frenchman studying for the ministry in London who might be a candidate to take over the church here in Grenoble. After further con-

tact, it has become clear that this will not work out as this young man could not subscribe to our confession of faith. We hope, nevertheless, that the Lord will open a door of service to him in France and that he might bear much fruit in his native land. We have received another letter of motivation from a Welshman who did his theological studies in France at the Reformed seminary at Aix-en-Provence.

He is, of course, a fluent French speaker and is married to a French girl from the south of France. I knew him 15 years ago when he was studying here and really liked him. At the time he found no place of service in France and so went back to Wales and pastored for seven years as well as spending some years in teaching French and working as a translator. After five years of translation work his desire is to re-enter the gospel ministry.

When I called him some weeks ago to try to organize a plan for him and his wife to come to Grenoble for a weekend I was very surprised to learn that his wife was a girl I baptized about 14 years ago. Please pray for this couple and for us as we organize this visit, which will probably take place in December.

We are encouraged to have a nice group of university students who have started attending services this fall. They are a very international group – French, English, American, Brazilian, Chinese and German being represented among them. One of our young

About 40 percent of the average of 30 present at the last four meetings in the Library For Pastors, have been pastors or leaders from their churches.

We continue to send out 80 invitations each month, and these include notes from the previous meeting's topic, each month a different aspect of the Doctrines of Grace.

As far as pastors using the Library to study there, that has decreased even more, and with Enrique and Mercy Abadía having finished their three-year commitment to this work, we are cutting back the Library's regular schedule to two days each week. We will be available if some one wishes to make an appointment for using it at other times.

Our thanks to the Abadías and to Grace Baptist Church in Carlisle, Pa., for making it possible for them to be with us. They have made a valuable contribution to the churches as well as to the Library.

Attendance has been increasing in both San José de Bavaria and in La Alborada. Pastor Marco Antonio has finished a class for 10 candidates for baptism, and a baptismal service was held Oct. 31 for most of these. Joel, Mauricio, Gerson, Carlos, and Henry are giving valuable

teaching in the Sunday schools and afternoon services. And, yes, we continue to pray for a pastor for La Alborada.

The church in Bosa has purchased a lot on which to build a chapel, but after being told the lot could be used for that purpose, now that permission is being denied. Pray for pastor Ramiro Beltrán and those who work with him.

The building permit for the Christian school likewise is delayed. Verbally, we've been told everything is in order, but the permit doesn't appear. One of our teachers just resigned to take a better paying position elsewhere. The need for teachers both for now and for next year is one of the many matters for prayer in this ministry.

in the state of Santander is slow. Alirio, Agustín, and Roberto do become discouraged.

In August, Juan Manuel Santos took office as president. He is of the same party as the outgoing president, Álvaro Uribe Vélez, but it is yet to be seen if he is as capable as the former president was.

In this first month of President Santos' administration, guerrilla activity has increased markedly. This isn't surprising, for latent unrest because of injustice, inequality, unemployment, corruption, poverty, etc., is bound to show itself if the new government shows any weakness militarily and does not implement policies for correcting these ills. Of course, the Gospel, yes, the Gospel, is our great need.

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men, Chris, has started up a bi-monthly meeting to study the disciplines of the Christian life with them, using the French translation of Kent Hughes' book.

The group of Chinese that I mentioned in my last letter continues to come to our services and we very much enjoy their presence. Their leader, Moses, works in the computer industry, but teaches small groups of Reformed Chinese Christians once a month on weekends in Grenoble, Lyon, Zurich (Switzerland) and Milan (Italy). He is quite amazing in his zeal and commitment to bring the Word of God to His people and is willing to

travel on his weekends to do so. He is very enthusiastic about our church and brings the Chinese group in Grenoble to our services.

When they have their once-a-month Chinese worship service here in Grenoble they still come to our service in French first, then have their service in Chinese afterwards. As soon as it ends the leader immediately drives up to Lyon, 90 minutes away, to do an afternoon service there.

Please pray for our six-week evangelistic Bible study, "Discovering Christianity" (Découverte du Christianisme"), which started Oct. 22 in one of our families' homes. Pray that we can also start a couple more groups by the New Year.

Secondly, please pray for the next books

to be sent out to pastors through our Adopt-a-Pastor program. We have added about 40 pastors to our list, bringing it to about 100 broadly evangelical pastors now in France and Switzerland who receive four Reformed books a year. The two books for this mailing will go out in the next month. We have decided to send out a recent French translation of Graeme Goldworthy's "Gospel and Kingdom" and the French translation of Arnold Dallimore's "Biography of Charles Spurgeon."

Spurgeon is well loved in France among evangelicals, but his Calvinism is even more of hidden secret here than it is among English-speaking evangelicals.

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old. Also, at some point he desires to be able to move into Montreal (where housing prices are much higher) so the commute will be shorter to both the church and his congregation.

St. Jerome – Pascal Denault

Pascal Denault has been leading the St. Jerome church for the past two years. On Saturday, Sept. 11, 2010, his ordination council was held. Arden Hodgins, pastor of ARBCA member Trinity Reformed Baptist Church in La Mirada, Calif., and I had the privilege of serving on this council. (Trinity RBC in La Mirada is the sending church for ARBCA missionary Raymond Perron.)

Through translation we were very gratified to hear the fine, thoughtful and thorough answers that this young pastor gave. Along with solid answers Pascal also has a heart for evangelism. When he was asked what is the place of evangelism and missions, he replied, "If a church does not reach out it will collapse."

After the unanimous recommendation of the council was announced, Raymond Perron, with tears, related how Pascal had asked him to be his mentor and then said to Pascal, "Always stand for the truth. Never water down the gospel."

Presently Pascal is writing his thesis for his Master's in Theology as well as preaching and shepherding the flock in St. Jerome. I found it a great encouragement to see another young man, who is solidly reformed, raised up for the gospel ministry.

Quebec City – Raymond Perron

Raymond has been an ARBCA missionary since 1991. For the first several years he was quite discouraged because of the slow progress in planting the church in Quebec City. However, as the years went by, the Capitol Reformed Baptist Church was not only established, but the Association of Reformed Baptist Churches in Quebec also was . The pastors of these six churches meet regularly for fellowship, reporting and prayer.

On the Saturday of Pascal Denault's

ordination, Raymond led the Association meeting as each of the men gave prayer requests, after which prayer was offered. The pastors of the Association also are encouraged twice a year to attend week-long sessions for theological training. Dr. James Renihan, Dr. Fred Malone, Rev. Robert Selph and Dr. Tom Nettles have

taught past courses.

Another important outreach ministry is the Christian radio station that operates out of the building of the Reformed Baptist Church in Quebec City. Raymond, who was once a radio deejay, has spear-

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headed this work and the station is now operating around the clock, by computer.

Raymond has a devotional and Bible teaching each day, plus twice a week he conducts interviews on topics of interest.

The signal has a potential of reaching 450,000 people in the city. Many people are listening because they like the music and no commercial breaks. A few have also expressed interest in the church as a result of the ministry of the station.

The Capitol Reformed Baptist Church in Quebec City is now able to support full-time Pastor Jacques Pelletier. Raymond Perron continues to serve as an elder in that church. The Lord has given this church a fine building in a very desirable location in the city. Pray that the church will have an increasing influence in Quebec City.

In addition to the works in St. Jerome, Montreal and Quebec City, the pastors in the other churches of the association also deserve our prayers: George Corriveau in Acton Vale, Richard Gagnon (absent from the picture) in Lac-Megantic and Jean Lepine in Rouyn-Moranda.

Toronto, Ontario – Chris Powell

Toronto is a growing, thriving and exciting city with a population of over 5 1/2 million. In the center of the city the University of Toronto has 70,000 students without a strong consistent evangelical witness on campus.

The Covenant Baptist Church is near the center of the city and also near the UT campus and other large universities. When Chris Powell took me to the front campus of UT, I came near to weeping as I saw some 2,000 students exit a lecture hall – sheep without a shepherd.

Chris has a great burden to reach that campus with a solid witness for Jesus Christ. However, his time is limited because he is the pastor of a church that has doubled in size over the past year and so the demands of a ministry with needy souls prevents him, at the moment, from reaching these students.

I know he wants us all to pray that the Lord will send laborers into His harvest

field.

Covenant Baptist Church meets in a rented United Church of Canada building that is scheduled to be torn down in 2011. The sign out front of this building tells it all: “Bedford Park United Church, The Upbeat Alternative.”

Although the building is in fair to good condition the congregation has dwindled so that now they have fewer people meeting than does the Covenant Baptist Church!

This presents a special challenge for Covenant as rent and housing in the downtown Toronto area is very expensive. A modest three-bedroom home sells for \$800,000 or more in the area of the church! Please pray that the Lord will provide a place for the church to meet in 2011 that they can afford. They do want to stay near the downtown area.

The city of Toronto has experienced rapid growth, due to immigration of many Asians, Hispanics and European ethnic groups. Today less than 50 percent of the Toronto population is Caucasian. This reality is happily reflected in the congregation of the Covenant Baptist Church.

On the weekend that we were present the church had its annual retreat. I spoke five times on Saturday, giving snapshots

from “Pilgrim’s Progress” and also gave the ARBCA PowerPoint. The 49 saints gave careful attention to the teaching and they also obviously greatly enjoyed each other’s fellowship. On the Lord’s Day I spoke at the retreat center for the Sunday morning worship and again there was excellent attention.

Sunday evening I had the privilege of hearing the testimony of Leigh Powell, founding pastor of Covenant and Chris’ father. Leigh was converted under the ministry of Dr. Martyn Lloyd-Jones. The Lord has used this brother not only to plant the church in Toronto, but also to influence many pastors through his teaching at a seminary and to stand firmly for the foundational truth of Justification by Faith Alone against the false teaching of the New Perspective.

Canada is in much need of prayer. The churches in Quebec and Toronto have a difficult task to reach their country with the gospel of God’s grace. In 1900, 25 percent of the Canadian population was evangelical but today only 10 percent is. Yet that number has risen from a low of 9 percent just a few years ago.

The Lord is able to cause many to come to Christ in this great land so let us pray that He will.

Church Planting: Looking for the next town

"He said to them, 'Let us go somewhere else to the towns nearby, so that I may preach there also, for that is what I came for.'" Mark 1:38

Our Lord tells his disciples that the reason he came was to preach and spread the good news of the gospel to neighboring towns. In the Gospel of Mark, we see that Jesus was a man of the gospel and a man of both word and action. He came to build his church and was continually pressing forward with this church-planting mission. This is at the very heart of who and what he is and why he came among us. He continues even today to lead his church into the next towns preaching the good news of the forgiveness of sins, and advancing his kingdom.

It is with this vision that Grace Fellowship Church in Bremen, Ind., has graciously sent their elder Aaron Hoak, along with a core group of 25 people, to Warsaw, Ind., a town approximately 30 minutes away, to plant a church.

In the final months of 2009, Grace Fellowship Church was seeking to respond to Mark 1:38 and searching for "the next town" to plant a church. There were approximately 30 people from the church traveling the half hour from Warsaw to Bremen to worship each week. As they prayed, it became apparent that this might be the next town that the Lord might have them plant a church.

Not only did a good-sized core group travel from Warsaw each week, but they noted Warsaw was also a small but growing city, 103 miles south of Chicago, with approximately 14,000 souls. Its population growth rate has been over 10 percent since the year 2000. Warsaw is an old, mostly politically conservative, blue-collar manufacturing town, nicknamed the "Orthopedic Capital of the World."

The town of Warsaw was named after the capital of Poland in 1836 and incorporated in 1854. Not only is it growing in numbers but it is changing in many other ways as well, including an expanding Hispanic population.

Spiritually, Warsaw is 12.4 percent below the national average in church affiliation. The national average is 50.2 percent while Warsaw has an affiliation percentage of 37.8 percent. It appears that the majority of the population is not affiliated with any major denomination but is classified under the religious designation of "other," while 19 percent are Methodist and 17 percent are Roman Catholic, with 12 percent claiming the Church of Christ. Clearly, Warsaw is an area that is in great need of the gospel and the church planting ministry of Pastor Hoak.

Between December 2009 and January 2010, Pastor Hoak and the other elders of Grace Fellowship Church met with the eight families that were traveling from Warsaw to pray and discuss the possibility of planting a church in their neighborhood. A core group of 25 agreed to start a Thursday evening Bible study/prayer meeting / fellowship to catch the vision and to lay the foundation for a church plant.

On the Lord's Day, May 2, 2010, they gathered together for their first evening service with 30 in attendance. Over the summer, Grace Fellowship Church came to believe that it was God's will for them to officially support the work and to send and fully support Aaron as the church planter. The church held a commissioning service, in Bremen, on the last Sunday in August.

That Sunday evening in Warsaw, in a spirit of joy and expectation, Grace Fellowship Church of Bremen met in a joint worship service with Grace Baptist Fellowship, with approximately 100 in attendance.

The following Lord's Day, Sept. 5, another very special day arrived in Warsaw. Grace Baptist Fellowship met for its very first morning worship service. At that service, Pastor Hoak preached a sermon to encourage the fellowship that was now starting out together as a new church.

Since then, Grace Baptist Fellowship has implemented several outreach ministries in the community. One such outreach is systematic door-to-door neighborhood

visitation, with people from the church introducing themselves to their new neighbors and inviting them to worship services and church Bible studies, which include free meals and a friendly atmosphere. They also have advertised in the local newspaper and one paper wrote an article on the new church-planting effort.

Through these efforts several new families have started to attend the church. The church also has had an outreach to a woman in the area who was in need of material help, and have ministered to her soul as well.

During this time the Lord has supplied them with office space to meet, in a strip mall, which can accommodate 80 -100 people. Providentially, the name of the office was "The Meeting Place." Perfect! Presently, Sunday morning services average between 35 to 55 people.

On Sunday morning Pastor Hoak is preaching Christ as presented in the Gospel of Mathew and in the evening he is going through an overview of the Bible. The congregation still meets on Thursday nights for Bible study and prayer as well as for planning together what God would have them to do next in planting the church.

Pastor Hoak has asked us to remember to bring before the "Throne of Grace" the following requests:

- That the Lord in his grace would establish the church.
- That he would bless their outreach efforts with much fruit.
- That they would be able to reach the lost with the gospel.
- That the Lord would provide a permanent piano player for their worship services.
- That the Lord would give them Godly wisdom and discernment as they move forward in their efforts in planting the church.
- That the Lord would continue to bless and uphold his family: his four boys and his wife Erin, who is, he says, "a huge asset and I could not do this work without her."

Work in Jamaica faithfully carries on

Oscar Bloise, along with his wife Dolly, has faithfully served the Lord in Jamaica since the early 1960s, and as an RMBS missionary since 1986. Grace Baptist Church in Carlisle, Pa., has been his sending church.

Although Oscar is now officially retired, he still continues to serve His Lord. For years he was the pastor of the Grace Reformed Baptist Church in Kingston. Now he is the pastor of the Faith Missionary Baptist Church in Kingston and also fills the pulpit with some regularity at Grace.

Youth Group

The youth group meets each Saturday night under the leadership of O'Neil Thomas. During our visit to Jamaica earlier this year, I spoke to these young men and women after O'Neil led them in a time of singing. Many come from the neighborhood and are not only poor in material things but also lack spiritual life. I shall not soon forget Oscar speaking with some of the young ladies after the meeting and exhorting them to avoid the boys. Teenage pregnancy is a huge problem in Jamaica.

Lord's Day Services

A faithful band of believers from both the Faith Missionary Baptist Church and the Grace Reformed Baptist Church met together on the Lord's Day morning for worship. They gave good attention to the Word. A faithful brother, Boise Williams, who also helps in the preaching at Grace on a regular basis, led the service. One of the great needs for these saints is to have a pastor. Oscar told me that at the present there are no men on the horizon for this pastorate. Earnest prayer is needed for a replacement at Grace. On Sunday evening the church met once again and watched and listened with interest as I reported on Reformed Baptists in both Zambia and Colombia.

Monday Meetings

After an all-day outing to Ocho Rios, Rayna and I were once again at Grace Reformed Baptist Church in Kingston. A good group came as I spoke to the men and Rayna to the women about the proper roles of husbands and wives and also about the role of men and women in the church. The questions asked revealed the continuing need

for instruction in a society in which men have given up the place of leadership in the home and in the church.

After this meeting the executive council of the Grace church asked me to meet with them to discuss their future and need for a pastor. This church certainly feels its need for guidance as they look to the future. I came away with the conviction that much prayer is needed for the witness of this Reformed Baptist church in Kingston.

"I, along with my wife Margaret, and Howard and Patsy Swart flew from Philadelphia to Jamaica on Friday, Oct. 29, and the funeral was held Saturday, the 30th. During the intervening week there had been a steady stream of friends and relatives visiting the

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Bloise home in Kingston to offer their condolences to Oscar, Orville, and DeeAnn and her husband (also named Orville).

"Dolly had been a member of the local Lions Club, so the members (most of whom are women) served visitors donated refreshments at the house each evening. This was a great help to Oscar. The funeral was held in Grace Missionary Church where Oscar and Dolly were married 47 years ago, and where Dolly had been a member when the church was first established.

"Kelly Knowlden from Grace Fellowship Church in West Hazleton, Pa., and Dan Stuber from Grace Baptist Church in Carlisle also attended the funeral. For the past 13 years Kelly has led summer teams to hold Vacation Bible School in Grace Reformed Baptist Church, the church founded by Pastor Bloise. For the past five years Dan and some of his family have accompanied Kelly. Dan served as one of the pallbearers at the funeral.

"The church was filled and overflowing with about 400 people. The service was dignified and honoring to Christ. Following several tributes, prayers, hymns, Scripture and special music, I preached on the 23rd

Psalm. A light meal and drink were provided by Oscar for those in attendance, and served by the Lions Club members under a tent adjacent to the church.

"The police escorted the cortege to the cemetery, 35 kilometers away. After the graveside service was concluded, the casket was lowered into the vault, sealed with concrete planks placed on top, and the complete void filled with the earth that had been removed earlier, while those in attendance sang of the Christian's blessed hope in our Savior.

"Then we all dispersed to await that great day of Christ's return and the resurrection of the dead."

mightily at work elsewhere in the world as well. Specifically, it was a great encouragement to see the advances that the Reformed Baptist movement has made in New Zealand just in the past few decades and to meet many of the men and women whom God has used

in those advances.

The chief benefit of this internship, however, was a further confirmation of my calling: despite being reminded of the great difficulties that inevitably attend the gospel ministry, God has sustained and even deepened my desire for this good work (I Tim. 3:1). I had the chance to put into practice much of what I have been learning in my time of preparation, and it was encouraging to see the true

usefulness of all that I've been studying, to know that I am being prepared well. But, at the same time, it was also humbling to discover just how much I have yet to learn.
