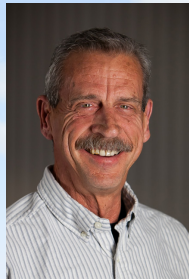

1 Peter 3:13-17

MONDAY

Prophet Project: Jonah 1:7-17

Don't let the familiarity of a story prevent you from reading carefully, prayerfully, and devotionally. Jonah's confession in verse 9 is so clear and so accurate, but his life is a testimony to the opposite. In what ways might this be true for you? It would be wise for us to ask the Lord to reveal to us the ways in which our lives do not conform to our confession of faith. Jonah would rather die than repent, while the boat, the sea, and even the foreign mariners seemed to do exactly what they ought to be doing. Everything in this story stands in stark contrast to the way Jonah is running from God. But you can never run far enough, never climb high enough, ain't no valley low enough... There is nowhere to hide from the Lord.

TUESDAY

Prophet Project: Jonah 2:1-10

In yesterday's passage, we saw Jonah facing death as he was cast into the sea. Yet, in God's grace and mercy, a great fish was sent to "swallow up Jonah," saving his life. In today's passage, we see Jonah's praising God as he poetically recounts his deliverance. Jonah recounts the terror he faced as he was "cast into the deep" with "waves and billows passing over him" (v.3). Jonah's pain goes deeper than the fear of death as he recalls his disobedience to God. "I am driven away from your sight...waters closed in over me to take my life; the deep surrounded me" (vv.3-4). But Jonah doesn't reside in hopelessness. He reminded himself of God's goodness (v.7) and reaffirmed his trust in God. We are never too far gone for God. No action is too horrible to be forgiven. Turn from sin and turn to God. Remind yourself of his goodness and trust in him today.

WEDNESDAY

Prophet Project: Jonah 3:1-10

“Repentance is a discovery of the evil of sin, a mourning that we have committed it, a resolution to forsake it. It is, in fact, a change of mind of a very deep and practical character, which makes the man love what once he hated, and hate what once he loved.” Charles Spurgeon. “When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil way, God relented of the disaster that he had said he would do to them, and he did not do it” (Jonah 3:10). God did not carry out the threatened disaster against Nineveh. God’s relenting shows us that the Ninevites truly repented. This passage in Jonah shows us a beautiful picture of God relenting, of His just wrath, on those who have repented.

FRIDAY

Prophet Project: Micah 1:1-16

This book contains a theme that has been common in many of the minor prophets: judgment. Today’s passage is focused on this same theme. Micah calls people to “hear” and “pay attention” (v.2) to what will come because of the “transgression of Jacob and for the sins of the house of Israel” (5). Both Israel and Judah had fallen back into sin and rebelled against God. As we read this passage, spend time thinking about the deceptive lure sin has. Sin is deadly, it will take you farther than you want to go, and it will cost much more than you think. Learn from the example of the Israelites as we seek to grow in holiness (Rom. 15:4). Heed the warning of John Owen: “Be killing sin or it will be killing you.”

THURSDAY

Prophet Project: Jonah 4:1-11

This is the second time now in the story that Jonah has wished to die. The first time, when he asked the mariners to throw him overboard in chapter 1, and now here at the end of the story, showing that Jonah’s heart has not changed. He stands in self-centered rebellion against God and refusal to pity lost people. Verses 10 and 11 ends this story making the exact point that the whole book of Jonah is written to make. God has pity on Jonah. God has pity on lost people. Jonah does not. Jonah’s pity for the silly little plant only underscores and highlights the foolishness of Jonah’s heart. What ways would you ask the Lord to deepen your heart for the lost?

SATURDAY

Prophet Project: Micah 2:1-13

“Woe to those who devise wickedness and work evil on their beds! When the morning dawns, they perform it, because it is in the power of their hand” (Micah 2:1). Those who have “the power of their hand” are those who do wicked and evil deeds because they have the authority to carry them out. Those who were poor were at the mercy of the wealthy. In this passage accusations are being read against them, like in a courtroom, as they had violated God’s commandments. There are some who have wealth and power, who will try to oppress those who do not. The Lord knows, and the Lord will deal with those who are evil. Our prayer is that the gospel message might reach some and they repent before it is too late.
