

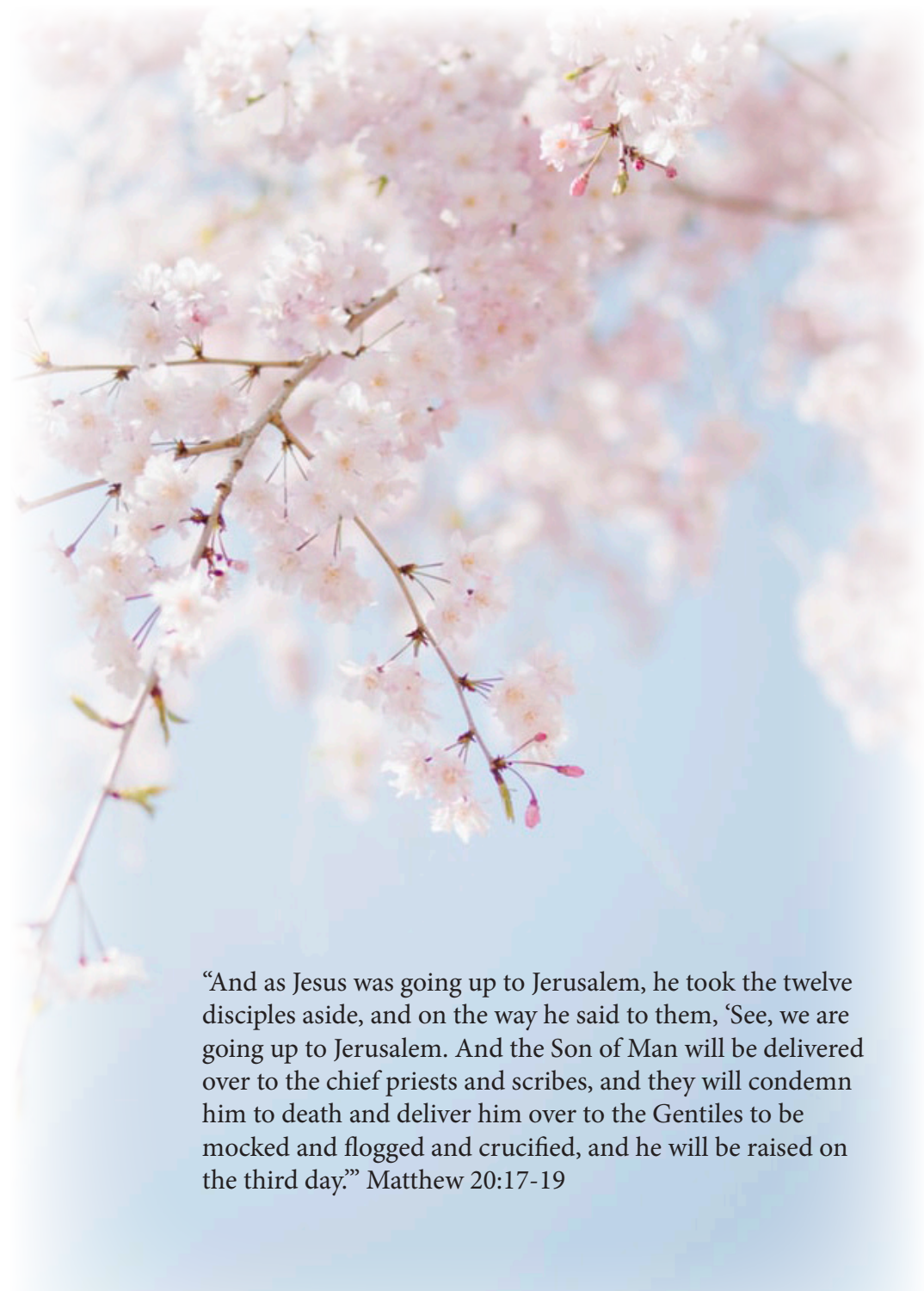

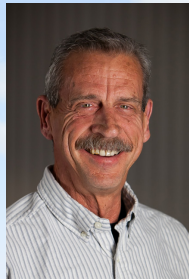

**Canyon Ministries**

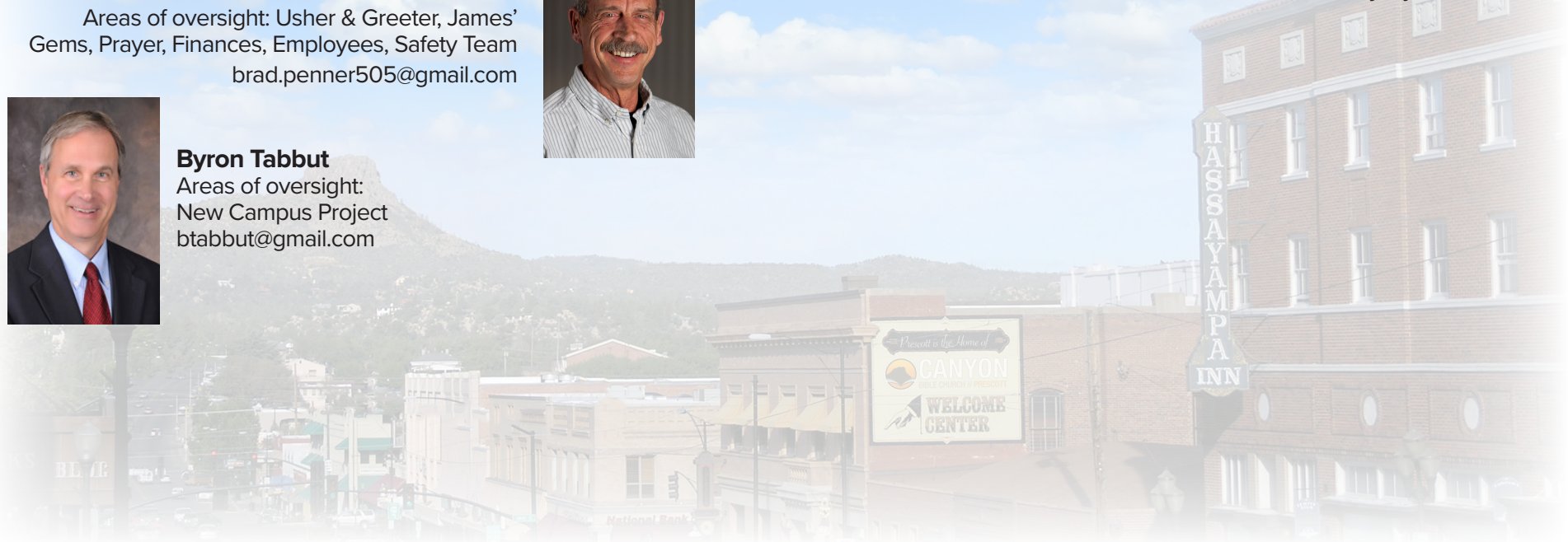

Mark 4:1-20

MONDAY

Gospel & Acts Project: Mark 13:28-37

“But concerning that day or that hour, no one knows, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father” (v. 32). The precise day and time of Jesus’ return is not given to us and will not be revealed to us. The angels, who enjoy intimacy with God, do not even know nor did Jesus at that time. It is because we do not know the date or time we are instructed, by Jesus, to “be on guard” and to “keep awake” (v. 33). Jesus does not focus on the date and time, of the end times, but rather that His disciples are to be vigilant. Christians are to constantly be on guard against spiritual dangers. Pray and ask the Lord to help you in this regard. Pray and ask the Lord to help you be on guard, to be vigilant each and every day.

TUESDAY

Gospel & Acts Project: Mark 14:1-11

“For you always have the poor with you, and whenever you want, you can do good for them. But you will not always have me” (v. 7). At this time, it was not about the needs of the poor. The disciples thought that the ointment, which had been poured over Jesus’ head (v. 3), could have been sold and given to the poor (v. 5). Jesus was pointing out that they only had Him there for a limited time, but the poor would always be with them. The time was coming where Jesus would soon suffer and be crucified. We, too, have the poor with us and those who are in need, and they are not to be ignored. But Jesus reminds us of the greater need, that need is Jesus Himself. Our hearts ought to be to help the needy, but first, our hearts should be to provide for them what they need most, Jesus Christ.

WEDNESDAY

Gospel & Acts Project: Mark 14:12-31

Today's passage centers on the institution of the new covenant. Jesus uses the bread and the cup to signify his body and blood that would be given for all. Among those who participated in this intimate and important event was the man who would betray him—Judas. It is easy to be enraged at Judas' actions. He ate the bread and drank the cup even though he had determined in his heart to betray Jesus. Before we run down this road of judgment, we need to examine our lives. Confessing Jesus, while actively denying Him with our lives is betrayal. Take time and examine your life today. Is there any way that you are "betraying" Jesus?

THURSDAY

Gospel & Acts Project: Mark 14:32-52

Much could be said about today's passage. Indeed, many books have been written exegeting and explaining this scene. But focus on what Jesus is doing in Gethsemane. He turns to the Father in prayer. He expresses his emotion about what will happen while resting in God's will (v. 35-36). Don't overlook this scene! Christ turns in prayer, expresses His emotion, asks God to act, but rests in God's good and perfect will. This has been a difficult season for our church on many levels. But follow Christ's example and turn to God. Be honest with your emotions. Ask God to act in accordance with His Character. But end with a renewed trust in God's good and perfect will.

FRIDAY

Gospel & Acts Project: Mark 14:53-72

"And some began to spit on him and to cover his face," (v. 65). For the Jews, spitting on someone's face was not only an insult and one of the grossest things you could do but one of the most hateful things you could do to another. Simply put these Jews hated Jesus. It was a vile hate they had towards Jesus. Jesus endured this, and so much more for our sin, yours and mine. Knowing this should serve as a reminder of all that Jesus endured on your behalf. Knowing this should cause you to praise Him more each and every day.

SATURDAY

Gospel & Acts Project: Mark 15:1-15

The Jews accused Jesus of blasphemy. The accusation of blasphemy, against Jesus, would not have meant anything to Pilate. When the Jews delivered Jesus to Pilate, the only accusation that Pilate took seriously was that of the claim of Jesus being "the King of the Jews" (v. 2). This claim would have been, in the eyes of Rome, rebellion, and a challenge to Caesar's rule. Jesus was being accused of a capital crime. When challenged with this crime, when asked if indeed Jesus was the King of the Jews, Jesus acknowledged that He is, in fact, the King of the Jews. Jesus knew what it would mean to acknowledge this before Pilate. Jesus did not shy away from what He had come to do. In all that we could be accused of and what could happen to us; it does not compare with what Jesus went through on our behalf. Pray that when faced with persecution that you too would not shy away from being a follower of Jesus and that you would acknowledge that fact to everyone.
