

Church at Home

Fourth Sunday of Eastertide | May 3, 2020

In response to the COVID-19 outbreak, we have suspended our regular Sunday worship services and are encouraging people to worship together in their homes. This resource is intended to be flexible and adaptable for a variety of settings, depending on the gifts and resources available. It is structured after our regular worship service, but you may do what works for your context. Some sections have recommendations for worshipping in families with small children.

Gathering & Greeting

Confession & Assurance

Read I Peter 2:19-25

Prayer of Confession:

**Gracious God,
we confess that you are sovereign
over all things
in heaven, and on the earth,
and under the earth.**

**We confess we do not know
why you allow this suffering to endure.
We confess we do not know
why we must wait for your salvation.**

**But we know and are assured
that our Lord Jesus Christ
suffered for our sakes,
that our sins might be forgiven
and our transgressions washed away.**

**Guide us, O Lord, your humble flock.
Fill us with the hope of your presence,
with the assurance of your promises,
O Shepherd and Guardian of our souls.**

Amen.

The prayer of confession may be followed by a time of silence, if desired.

Assurance of Pardon:

Read John 10:1-10.

Hear the good news: In Jesus, our Good Shepherd, we are brought into the flock of God. Our sins are forgiven, and we are saved! **Thanks be to God!**

For families with small children

Read Jesus' teaching on the Good Shepherd (John 10) from a children's Bible or a simplified translation (like the New International Reader's Version) and talk with your children about how Jesus protects us like a shepherd protects his sheep.

Prayer:

**Dear Jesus, you are our Good Shepherd.
Please forgive us for when we wander off.
Help us to always trust in you to guide us,
especially when we feel scared.**

Amen.

Families may talk about how baptism reminds us that we belong to God. The sign of water on our foreheads is a "sign and seal" of our salvation, marking us as belonging to God. It's like when you write your name on your toys or on the tag of your clothes, so that everyone will know that it's yours. That's what God does in baptism. He writes his name on us so that everyone will know that we belong to God.

Prayers of the People

<p>Given the reality that all of us are encouraged to stay at home, reflect together on what you “see” happening in this time. How has your perspective on this changed over the week? This can be a great time for parents to check-in with their kids, and to be honest with their kids about their own struggles and fears. Take a pulse of how each other are doing. What has been joy-filled about this past week? What has been challenging?</p> <p>Invite everyone to share what they would like to lift up to God, their joys and sorrows, hopes and fears.</p> <p>Review the “Church Family News” section of the bulletin on the church website.</p> <p>Close with the Lord’s Prayer.</p>	<p><i>*For families with small children*</i></p> <p><i>Memorizing the Lord's Prayer is a great way to equip your children with important worship language. If you've already memorized the Lord's Prayer, start memorizing a Psalm together.</i></p> <p><i>Try “stick prayers.” Use tongue depressors or strips of construction paper to write names of people, groups of people, or parts of the world your children want to pray for (ex: grandparents, neighbours, doctors and nurses, teachers, friends, Forest Heights Long-Term Care Home, etc.). Then use the sticks throughout the week for prayer time before bed—pick two or three to pray for each night.</i></p>
