Beginnings: Know Thine Enemy Genesis 3:1-7

Know that the Enemy is a Denier of God's Goodness

- There are important and difficult questions raised in Genesis 3:1-7.
 - The introduction of evil into the world is not an academic question but a personal agony.
 - In the end, we have to confess that the God of all the earth knows right and will do right.
- The emphasis in the text lies more on the serpent's tactics than the serpent's origin.
 - \circ We are told that the serpent is more crafty than any other beast of the field.
 - The term "crafty" can be good or bad in the Bible.
 - The ambiguity of the term fits the subtlety of the serpent.
 - Satan disguises himself as an angel of light. (2 Corinthians 11:14)
 - His initial temptation is both suggestive and subtle. (v. 2)
 - Satan is not just wrong about God's command but wrong about God's character.
 - The idea that God is withholding something is a Satanic staple.
 - \circ We imagine that God is miserly, but the Bible actually says and shows otherwise.

For the LORD God is a sun and shield; the LORD bestows favor and honor. No good thing does he withhold from those who walk uprightly. (Psalm 84:11)

- God is a good, loving Father, wisely and generously blessing His people.
- Even the prohibitions of God are not arbitrary but lovingly and carefully crafted.
- God steers us from sin because sin reduces us to less than we are created to be.
- Do you trust that God is good? Generous? Large-hearted toward you?
- Consider...
 - Beholding God's goodness in the cross.

What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? ³² He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things? (Romans 8:31-32)

• Being reminded of God's goodness in the weekly gathering of the church.

Know that the Enemy is a Deceiver regarding God's Word

- Eve doesn't rightly know or trust God's good Word.
 - She has reservations about the firmness of God's command.
 - \circ She has misunderstandings about the details of God's command.
- Sensing weakness, the serpent strikes. (v. 4)
 - Satan flatly denies the penalty for sin.
 - \circ The greatest lie of all is that sin has no price tag.
- The Bible tells us that sin is deadly from first to last.
 - The final penalty of sin is death.
 - The continual payoff of sin is death.
 - Sin robs us of the abundant life God intends.
 - Sin never pays what is promises.
- Application:
 - \circ Jesus showed us a firm reliance on God's Word in the face of temptation.
 - \circ Jesus established His church as a buttress of truth in a world filled with lies.

He must hold firm to the trustworthy word as taught, so that he may be able to give instruction in sound doctrine and also to rebuke those who contradict it. (Titus 1:9)

Know that the Enemy is a Destroyer of God's Order

- Notice that the temptation in v. 5 is something that they already really possess as image bearers.
- But the serpent "offers" more—autonomy and self-rule.
 - There are only two ways to live—we can live as creatures or as would-be kings.
 - Only living under God's rule brings blessing; everything else brings ruin and misery.
- Application:
 - For those who are toying with sin, see clearly the lonely end of sin. (vv. 6-7)
 - \circ $\,$ For those who are tired of sin, hear clearly the loving offer of grace and forgiveness.

She took of its fruit and ate... (Genesis 3:6)
