Since the beginning of Covenant Fellowship, we have desired to become a people of prayer. Prayer should be our first response, not our last resort. Praying because we are told to pray is not enough. For prayer to transform our life, it needs to become something we look forward to doing. Many people don't enjoy prayer because they have never been taught how to pray, how to be intimate with God. This guide is intended as a simple aid. Please use it as you see fit. When you experience the beauty of daily conversation with Him, you'll experience the presence of God that will change your life. Prayer changes everything!

What is fasting?

Fasting is designed to intensify our dependence on God by weakening our dependence on food and other things.

Fasting is to voluntarily abstain from eating for an extended period. "Eating" can represent anything that is holding you back. What do you "consume" in terms of social food, intellectual food, and emotional food? Are these things distracting you from your relationship with God?

Are you relying on things that have nothing to do with God to get you through your day?

The goal of this time focusing on prayer is to see transformative, Christ-centered revival. We want to see people come to faith in Jesus. We want to see the broken healed. We want the body of Christ to pierce the darkness of our time with the light of the gospel.

Ask God what He wants you to fast from and let Him guide you.

If you have medical issues, consider fasting TV or social media. The point is that there is something God wants you to separate yourself from for three weeks so that you can see and hear Him more clearly.

Whether you have done a 21-day time of prayer and fasting before, or if this is your first time, you can start where you are and experience what God has in store for you in a powerful way.

Fasting goal: A personal encounter with God

We pray that you will experience the presence and power of God in an extraordinary way as you commit yourself to Him over the next 21 days. As you seek God first, we pray your relationship with God when you start the fast looks and feels different than how you finish.

As you prepare for the next 21 days, think about why you are fasting. Is it for spiritual renewal, for guidance, for healing, for the resolution of problems, for special grace to handle a difficult situation, or for a major decision? Ask the Holy Spirit to clarify His leading and objectives for your fast. This will enable you to pray more specifically and strategically. Think about the top two or three uppermost issues on your heart and press in on those with God. Write these down in the space provided below or in a journal, and be open to hearing what God wants to show you in those areas.

When praying, make your primary goal to know Jesus more and experience Him. Focus first on what's right about Him, such as His goodness and His greatness, and see everything else through that filter.

Finally, make time to pray daily. Don't over complicate it! Just talk to God. Have that place and time where you can seek Him every day. If you don't plan to pray, you won't. We also want to remember that it's a "get to" not a "got to." It's a privilege to be able to come to God in prayer.

During this fast, I am praying and believing God for:		

You may experience many benefits from fasting (cleansing your body, breaking addictions, etc.), but the goal of fasting is to experience God. Right now, your life may be all about you, what you want, and when you want it. Imagine if you separate yourself

Biblical Examples and Purposes of Fasting

from your perceived needs (such as food) you may see that life is all about Him.

- Jesus fasted to acknowledge His dependence and to gain spiritual strength through reliance on the Holy Spirit and God's Word. He did this before He began His public ministry (Luke 4:1,2).
- Nehemiah fasted for confession, repentance, and favor in the sight of the king to get permission to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem (Nehemiah 1:4).
- David humbled himself for God to intervene because of injustice (Psalm 35:13). In 2 Samuel 12:17,23, he fasted for healing and miraculous intervention.
- Mordecai and the Jews fasted upon hearing news of Haman's wicked plot for their extermination (Esther 4:3).
- The Early Church fasted while worshiping and committing their ministry to the Lord. They also sought the Lord through fasting for guidance, confirmation, and the appointment of elders (Acts 13:2; 14:23).

Types of fasts

There are several types of fasting. The one you choose is between you and God. He will honor your best sacrifice.

The Daniel Fast

Eat no meat, no sweets, and no bread. Drink water and juice. Eat fruits and vegetables.

Partial Fast

A partial fast is from 6:00 am to 3:00 pm or from sunup to sundown. You can select from three types of fasting — Daniel Fast or give up at least one item of food.

Scripture References for Fasting:

Matthew 6:16-18, Matthew 9:14-15, Luke 18:9-14

Relation to Prayer and Reading of the Word:

Corporate Fasting:

1 Samuel 7:5-6, Ezra 8:21-23, Nehemiah 9:1-3, Joel 2:15-16, Jonah 3:5-10, Acts 27:33-37

Remember that it is the attitude of a heart sincerely seeking Him to which God responds with a blessing (Isaiah 58, Jeremiah 14:12, 1 Corinthians 8:8). May God greatly bless you as you fast!

Developing a lifestyle of prayer

Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where He prayed. - Mark 1:35

Prayer is most effective when it isn't something we do every now and then, but when it's a lifestyle we cultivate. To understand how to have a lifestyle of prayer, we can look at the example Jesus gave during His life on earth.

Develop a Set Time

Jesus got up early in the morning to spend time with His Heavenly Father. Make a daily appointment with God — whether it's first thing in the morning, at lunch, or in the evening — and faithfully keep it.

Designate a Certain Place

Jesus had a specific place He went to pray. He prayed in private. He specifically withdrew to a solitary place to avoid being distracted by others. We can follow His example by designating a quiet space for ourselves and schedule it at a time that we are less apt to be bothered by family,

friends, and other distractions. Maintaining a focus on God is the main purpose so that we can hear Him speak to us in return.

Have a Plan

When Jesus taught His disciples how to pray, He gave them an example of prayer. We call it "The Lord's Prayer." As we pray every day, our plans for our prayer time can vary, maybe include worship music, Bible reading, and quiet time to listen to God. It doesn't always have to look the same; it just helps when we are intentional about connecting regularly with God.

Learn to Fast as a Spiritual Discipline

In addition to the prayer guide and prayer times, we are encouraging everyone to go deeper in their understanding of fasting this year. Start thinking about fasting as a spiritual discipline that happens throughout the year and beyond the 21 Days. The power you experience and closeness you feel to the Lord can become a new way of life all throughout the year.

Day 1, March 10, 2024: Dedication

Today, we're all about dedication, and we're using Psalm 119:10-11 as our guide. King David knew it's about wholehearted pursuit. Let's dig in and see how dedication becomes a beautiful adventure, a passionate pursuit of the One who's truly worthy. Put aside your cell phone, and anything else that will distract you from your time with God.

Psalm 119:10-11 (NIV)

I seek you with all my heart; do not let me stray from your commands. I have hidden your word in my heart that I might not sin against you.

Devotional:

Dedication is the act of committing oneself wholly and passionately to a purpose or cause. It's an unwavering determination to follow a path with diligence and persistence. In the context of our spiritual journey, dedication is essential. It's about seeking God with all our hearts, just as the Psalmist expresses in Psalm 119.

Imagine a ship setting sail in the vast ocean. Dedication is its anchor. It keeps the vessel grounded and on course, preventing it from drifting aimlessly. In our lives, God's Word serves as that anchor. As the Psalmist says, "I have hidden your word in my heart." When we store God's Word in our hearts, we equip ourselves to navigate the unpredictable waters of life.

Dedication requires intentionality. It's a choice we make daily, sometimes even moment by moment. We commit to staying close to God, adhering to His commands, and remaining faithful even when the storms of life threaten to toss us off course.

Why is dedication important? Because it keeps us aligned with God's purposes. It helps us grow spiritually, make righteous choices, and become more like Christ. Dedication deepens our relationship with God, allowing us to experience His love, grace, and guidance in profound ways.

Prayer:

Psalm 119:10-11 is a powerful testimony to the psalmist's deep love for God and His Word. This passage highlights the importance of seeking and treasuring God's commandments to live a righteous and fulfilled life.

Context:

He recognizes his own propensity to stray from God's laws and seeks God's help in remaining obedient. This is a reminder of our own human nature and our constant struggle against sin and temptation. However, the psalmist's request also reflects his understanding that true obedience to God's commands can only be achieved with the help of God Himself. This aligns with the biblical principle that it is only through God's grace and strength that we can live a life pleasing to Him.

The historical and spiritual significance of this passage is evident throughout the Bible. In Deuteronomy 6:5, God commands His people to love Him with all their heart, soul, and strength.

This is exactly what the psalmist is expressing in Psalm 119:10-11 – a deep, unwavering love and commitment to God and His Word. In addition, the phrase "do not let me wander" is a reminder of God's faithfulness and promise to guide and protect His people, even when they are prone to wander.

We see that the psalmist uses the term "commandments" to refer to God's laws and instructions. The Hebrew word used here is "mitsvah" which conveys the idea of a divine requirement or mandate. This further emphasizes the psalmist's understanding of the importance of God's laws in shaping his life and actions.

This passage carries several practical applications for believers today. It reminds us of the importance of seeking God with our whole hearts and being obedient to His commands. It also serves as a reminder of our own weaknesses and the need to rely on God's strength and guidance. It encourages us to approach God's commandments not as a burden, but as a source of joy and fulfillment in our lives. It challenges us to examine our own hearts and evaluate the level of dedication and love we have for God and His Word. Are we seeking God with our whole hearts, or are our motivations and actions deceitful and half-hearted? Do we truly treasure God's commandments and see them as a necessary guide for righteous living, or do we view them as burdensome and restrictive?

Application:

- 1. Daily Scripture Reading and Memorization: Dedication starts with immersing ourselves in God's Word. Commit to reading and meditating on Scripture daily. Consider memorizing verses that resonate with you to keep God's Word close to your heart.
- 2. **Setting Spiritual Goals:** Dedication requires intentionality. Set specific spiritual goals for yourself. What do you want to accomplish in your relationship with God? These goals can include prayer, service, or growing in a specific aspect of your faith.
- 3. Accountability and Community: Share your dedication journey with a trusted friend or mentor. Accountability and a supportive community can provide encouragement and help you stay on course.
- **4. Regular Self-Reflection:** Dedication involves continuous self-examination. Take time regularly to reflect on your commitment to God. Are there areas where you've grown, or places where you need to recommit your dedication?
- **5. Practice Surrender:** Dedication isn't just about doing more; it's about surrendering control to God. Identify areas of your life where you need to surrender to His guidance and trust Him completely.

Day 2, March 11, 2024: Gratitude

1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 (NIV)

Devotional:

Day 2: Gratitude | | Deeper Dive

Definition:

Context:

The book of 1 Thessalonians is a letter written by the Apostle Paul to the Christians in Thessalonica. In this passage, Paul is giving final instructions to the church before ending his letter. Exegesis:

Verse 16: "Rejoice always"

The word "rejoice" in Greek is "chairo" which means to be glad, delight, or be of good cheer. The command to rejoice does not suggest a superficial or emotional response but rather it points to an attitude of the heart. This command is in the present tense, which implies that it is to be a continuous action. The Thessalonians were facing persecution and struggles, yet Paul urges them to keep rejoicing in all circumstances because of their salvation in Christ.

Verse 17: "Pray without ceasing"

The phrase "pray without ceasing" does not mean to be in a constant state of kneeling or uttering prayers. Instead, it means to have a continual attitude of dependence on God and to have a constant communion with Him throughout the day. The Thessalonians were being urged to maintain an ongoing conversation with God, seeking His guidance, and laying their worries and troubles at His feet.

Verse 18: "Give thanks in all circumstances."

The command to give thanks is difficult, especially in the midst of difficult circumstances. However, the word "give thanks" in Greek is "eucharisteo" which means to be thankful, grateful, or express gratitude. This command is not limited to certain circumstances, but it is to be done in all circumstances, whether good or bad. As believers, we are to be thankful to God at all times, knowing that He is in control and is working out all things for our good (Romans 8:28).

Application:

- 1. Cultivate an attitude of joy: We are to rejoice always, not just when things are going well. Our rejoicing is not based on our circumstances, but on the unchanging truth of our salvation in Christ. As Christians, we should cultivate joy in our hearts that will be evident to the world, even in the midst of trials and struggles.
- 2. Maintain a constant prayer life: Our relationship with God is meant to be ongoing and not just limited to certain times or circumstances. Be intentional about maintaining a constant attitude of prayer, seeking God's guidance, and staying connected to Him throughout the day.

- 3. Give thanks in all circumstances: It is easy to give thanks when things are going well, but the true test of our faith is giving thanks even in difficult circumstances. We should have a grateful heart, knowing that God is in control, and He is working out His perfect plan for our lives.
- **4. Trust in God's will for our lives:** The will of God for us is to rejoice, pray, and give thanks always. When we follow these commands, we are aligning ourselves with God's will and trusting in His plan for our lives. We can have peace and assurance knowing that our lives are in His hands.
- **5. The power of acknowledging God:** By giving thanks and praise, we declare our dependence on God and acknowledge that all good things come from him. This can strengthen our trust and faith in him, knowing that he is our provider and sustainer.

Day 3, March 12, 2024: Guidance

Day 3: Guidance | | Deeper Dive

Verse 5: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding." This passage emphasizes the importance of fully trusting in God rather than relying on our own limited understanding. Trusting in God means surrendering our human reasoning and instead relying on His wisdom, guidance, and direction. This trust requires a deep, unwavering faith in God's character and promises.

Verse 6: "In all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight."

Submitting to God in all areas of our lives means acknowledging God's authority and seeking His will in every decision we make. When we allow God to direct our paths, we can trust that He will lead us on a straight and righteous path, even when it may not make sense to us.

Explanation:

One of the main themes in this passage is the contrast between trusting in God versus trusting in ourselves. The author encourages readers to trust in God with their whole being, acknowledging His sovereignty and infinite wisdom.
