"WISE LISTENING" PROVERBS 15:31, 18:2, 18:13 CAMERON BARHAM

Key Truth: Wise listening serves as the critical first step to receiving God's wisdom and being able to apply it to loving Him and our neighbors as ourselves.

Introduction:

Q: What is Jesus' example to us in terms of wise listening?

"Throughout the Bible listening is the central act of the people of God. They are those who are gathered and formed by his voice and held together by his word. They hear his promises and judgments, instructions and warnings, reassurances and exhortations.... You become a disciple by hearing. Listening is the first act of discipleship...."

Proverbs 15:31: Listen to Life-Giving Reproof and Dwell Among the Wise:

"By nature we are unteachable. But the Lord gives humility and self-knowledge. We become teachable, and light pours in. We learn the meaning of words that we had previously only known by name. The way we receive a rebuke tests our character. It reveals if we possess the graces of humility, sincerity, and self-knowledge."

Q: How do you respond to Biblical reproof? Do you immediately get defensive or prayerfully consider the weight of the words and context of delivery before responding?

Proverbs 18:2, 13: Fools Express Their Opinions and Fail to Understand:

"I suggest we make it our aim to listen to, not listen for. In listening for, we are listening like a prosecuting attorney, trying to uncover a hidden motivation, catch the person in a contradiction or find something to confirm our suspicions. We are setting the trap, poised to say "aha!" at any second. To listen for is deconstructive: we are breaking people down into parts. We listen to collect data.

We reduce people to issues or categories or positions in a debate. We may view them as problems to be solved, issues to be diagnosed, shortcomings to be corrected. We listen for inroads or openings to spring our thoughts on them. We are in danger of turning people into mere foils for our opinions, their words simply setups for our musings."
