"THE HUMBLE FRUITS OF GOD'S WISDOM" JAMES 3:13-18 CAMERON BARHAM

Key Truth: God's wisdom mortifies our bitter jealousies and selfish ambitions while also humbly producing the fruits of repentance and the fruit of the Spirit.

Introduction:

Q: What evidences to you that someone is wise and has understanding according to God's wisdom?

"Our fear (of the Lord), then, is a proper reverence which makes them inseparable. Our fear, then, is a proper reverence for one who has made himself known and whom we therefore know for ourselves. But the Bible nowhere places much value on knowledge that remains merely cerebral or creedal. Nothing is known until it also reshapes the life. For this reason, the way of wisdom is the way of obedience (e.g. Deut. 4:5-6).

'Knowledge,' at its deepest, is living out a deep personal relationship."

James 3:13-16: The Poisonous Fruits of Bitter Jealousy and Selfish Ambition:

"("Bitter jealousy") combined with "selfish ambition"..., a word commonly used in settings of sectarian rivalry or partisan politics, the image appears of people in angry competition, undermining one another and each fighting for their own rights, a far cry from "the humility of wisdom.""

Q: What sparks bitter jealousy and/or selfish ambition in you? What is the result of these poisonous fruits in your life?

James 3:17-18: The Humble Fruits of God's Wisdom:

"The wisdom required in the world is a holy innocence, not a Machiavellian guile (see Matthew 10:19). It is the glory of a (person) to be a fool in sin and wise in grace. Be careful, then, to pursue the great plan of holiness. This will make you conform to God, which is (humanity's) excellence; it will bring you to enjoy God, which is (humanity's) happiness (see Matthew 5:8 and Hebrews 12:14)."
