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# The PROPHECY of Wosea

The Story of God's Redemptive Justice and Covenant Love

#### Introduction

One of the major sticking points for many people is how to reconcile the tension of God's justice (or judgment and wrath) with His love (or mercy and grace). We tend to lean too far to one characteristic versus the other. Some see God as perpetually angry with fire in His eyes and blood on His ever falling sword. Others view Him as this grandfatherly type figure who loves indiscriminately as He laughs off our sins as quaint silliness. Maybe we lean one way or the other based on whether we have sinned or been sinned against. As Krish Kandiah observes, "The Hosea Paradox exposes our sloppy thinking; we struggle with a God who accepts the unlovely, but we also struggle with thinking about God coming to a point where there are no more chances — we don't want to experience the full extent of his judgment. Essentially, we want to play fast and loose with God. We want God's faithfulness to extend as far as we need, but we want God's judgment to come into play when other people are unjust to us." The Prophecy of Hosea grants us a beautiful picture of God's redemptive justice and covenant love working together for the purpose of returning His people to Him to enjoy His blessings and peace.

We know very little about Hosea as a person. What we do know is that he was a native of the Northern Kingdom (also referred to as Israel or Ephraim²) who prophesied primarily to Israel from about 752/3 B.C. near the end of Jeroboam II's reign to 722 B.C. when the Northern Kingdom would suffer defeat and exile at the hands of the Assyrians (see **2 Kings 17**). At the start of his prophetic career, the Northern Kingdom convulsed politically and spiritually as 2 kings, Zechariah and Shallum, were assassinated within the first 7 months following Jeroboam II. These convulsions would continue over the next 30 years as each king would continue in the idolatrous sins of Jeroboam (See **Appendix A: Table of Kings During Hosea's Prophetic Ministry: 2 Kings 15**). The Prophecy of Hosea is the story of God's pursuit of and call for the people to repent of their spiritual adultery and return to Him. Through Hosea's lived

prophecy and Israel's lived reality, we see God's use of redemptive justice and application of covenant love to draw His people back to Him.<sup>3</sup>

This story continues to be important for us today as we struggle with the distortions of the Angry, Judgmental Old Testament God and the Unconditionally Loving, All-Forgiving New Testament God that pervade our culture both inside and outside the church. Hosea will teach us how God uses His just judgments and discipline to draw us back to Him. We will learn that His justice proves patient and long developing. Hosea will also teach us of God's faithful and forgiving covenant love. We will also learn that His mercy and grace move swiftly and are longsuffering with His people. God's justice became redemptive for us in Christ suffering the wrath of God for the fullness of our sins past, present, and future. Jesus granted us His righteousness in exchange so that we could receive joy, peace, and hope in God's unfailing, eternally faithful covenant love. What the Northern Kingdom failed to discern and walk in, we now have full access to through the person and work of Christ! What the Northern Kingdom lost in its refusal to return and seek the Lord, we have had lavished upon us by our Abba Father through His means of grace!

We will continue to seek nourishment from our historic faith and the Old and New Testaments for our weekly devotion and worship. The calls to worship will come from the Psalms as they frequently speak to God's redemptive justice and covenant love. We will confess together each week the Belgic Confession, Article 20: The Justice and Mercy of God in Christ to remind us that the weight of God's justice for our sin so that we could receive God's lavish covenant love in the righteousness of Christ. Our assurances of pardon will come from various places in the New Testament to declare to us weekly that God has loved us freely in Christ who turned His anger away from absorbing Himself on our behalf. Our benedictory blessings each week will come from key texts in Hosea to remind us of God's intentions to bless His children. The goal of these various elements is to show us that God's justice and love are intertwined and serve His redemptive purposes for us as His children.

This devotional is designed to encourage daily meditation and prayer in personal devotions and/or family worship. You are encouraged to use it the week prior to the associated sermon so that you and your family are prepared for worship. In addition to the Scriptures and associated questions, there are opportunities to pray for the various aspects of the Church. On Wednesdays, we will pray for the various missionaries, church plants, and missional ministries that we support at CCC. We also have the opportunity to pray on Saturday for those in our spheres of influence or prepare for the appropriate sacrament, and on Sunday, the Lord's Day Sabbath, to prepare ourselves for worship in the presence of the Lord. Our desire is to continue to facilitate and grow in our dependence on the Lord through prayer.

**FRIDAY, 7/28:** Hosea 14:4-7: What are some ways in which you are blessed by the flourishing that comes from being restored to God?

**Saturday**, **7/29:** Pray for opportunities to share God's plea for His children to return to Him to receive His covenant love.

**SUNDAY, 7/30:** the **LORD'S DAY SABBATH:** Pray for the means of grace to reveal again to us how freely the Lord loves us and how His anger has been turned away from us in the sacrifice of Christ.

## Excursus on Masculine and Feminine Imagery in the Prophecy of Hosea

One aspect of the Prophecy of Hosea that has been problematic for some is the use of masculine and feminine imagery as critical to the plot. It is almost impossible for us not to read our current cultural contexts and baggage back into these ancient Biblical texts. For Hosea, the male prophet and faithful husband, to be presented as the redemptive figure free from worldly passions and lust, seems to equate masculinity with goodness and righteousness; for Gomer, the female harlot and unfaithful wife, to be presented as everything that is wrong with humanity and enslaved to her passions and lust, seems to equate femininity with sin and failure. These conclusions, however, prove to be an overly simplistic reading of text and interpretation of the imagery that is inconsistent with the intentions of the story.

While this subject is complex and nuanced, there are four simple points that should prove helpful to us as we engage the Prophecy of Hosea. First, we must note that Gomer represents disobedient and adulterous Israel which is in the condition that it is in because of the moral and spiritual failings of its kings, prophets, and priests all of which are men throughout this portion of history. They are not being accused of acting like women; they are being accused of acting like their fallen father Adam (or humanity in general or dirt depending on your interpretation) in **Hosea 6:7**. Second, Hosea pursues Gomer not because of his great righteousness (in fact, no aspect of Hosea's character receives mention or commendation in his prophecy), but because of Gomer's great value to him as his wife despite her failure to be faithful. This serves to show Gomer's role in the story as far more complex and valuable than merely a 2-dimensional interpretation. Third, **Hosea 4:14** reveals that God will not directly punish the daughters nor the brides for their adulterous sins, but He will punish the men for their sins. This means that God's judgment will fall first and hardest on the men who were expected to lead in fidelity and faithfulness as covenant servants. Lastly, in the broader context of the Bible, there are a number of instances where feminine imagery is equated with goodness

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and righteousness such as wisdom being portrayed in feminine terms in the book of Proverbs and both God and Christ using mother images to display their care for Israel (see **Isaiah 49:15-18** and **Matthew 23:37-39**). These four brief points at minimum show that it is far too simplistic a reading to do those characters and the broader issue of masculinity/femininity justice to equate Hosea/masculinity with goodness and righteousness and Gomer/femininity with sin and evil.

May we, both male and female, come away with a greater appreciation for God's redemptive justice and covenant love for us all through our study of the Prophecy of Hosea!
