The Burden

of Malachi:

Gods Anchanging Love for His Anstable Deople

Introduction

Two of the great risks for the Church today are:

- 1. A loss of awe and joy in what God has done for us as a result of our historical ignorance (or disinterest) and our failure to take time to remember on a regular basis;
- 2. To mindlessly and lifelessly go through the formal motions of worship, discipleship, and life because we don't see an immediate benefit from any of it.

Malachi spoke to similar issues among the people of God in the mid-5th Century B.C. who were in similar circumstances to the Church today. John L. Mackay describes Malachi's context as,

"an age of widespread religious disillusionment and discontentment....(God's people) could see nothing wrong with the way they were living or with the way they approached God in worship. When challenged about their attitudes, there was no acknowledgment of wrong-doing on their part. Instead they were prepared to defend their behavior. Indeed, they more than hinted that what had gone wrong was that the Lord had not lived up to his side of the covenant. It was a time of religious cynicism." ¹

Mackay further observes "two deep-seated factors influencing their attitude. (1) They had lost any sense of wonder at what God had done for them....(2) Their religion had become formal...." In loving grace and mercy, God places the burden of His word upon Malachi to deliver to the people while there was still time to repent and be restored to Him. Amazingly, He begins not with a list of all that they were doing wrong or fire-filled threats of judgment but instead chooses to declare yet again His unchanging love for His unstable people. Once this foundation is laid, God reveals their sin and His coming judgment if they fail to repent. Pieter A. Verhoef writes of this glorious truth: "The Lord is going to admonish and judge his people because of their sins in various spheres of their lives. But before addressing them with the stipulations and obligations of the law, he confronts them with the gospel: 'I have loved you.'" Walter C. Kaiser, Jr. captures this beautiful idea even more succinctly when he writes,

"...Malachi will not be sidetracked from his master theme: <u>God loves His people</u>, <u>however hypocritical and insincere they remain.</u>" Given the similarity of our circumstances, we too need to be reminded of God's unchanging love for us and of His grace and mercy in confronting us with our sin so that we might repent and be restored to Him. Thus, Malachi contains relevant truth for us today.

We know nothing about Malachi personally other than that his burden closes the Old Testament canon in our English Bibles. His name means "My Messenger." ⁵ The book contains no date or clear historical proper names or referents to be able to come up with the exact time of its writing. However, the use of the term governor and the similarities with the issues addressed in Nehemiah suggest the burden was delivered in the mid- to late- 5th Century B.C.6 This means that the people of Judah had returned from exile and restored the temple, however, the glory of the nation had yet to return as they were still under Persian rule.⁷ Bruce K. Waltke describes the situation in this way: "Jerusalem and its temple continue to be nothing more than the backwater Persian sub-province. Instead of the nations bringing their wealth to Jerusalem, Jerusalem continues to pay heavy taxes to the Persians."8 It appeared that God's promises were either in vain or in ruins. Spiritual malaise and the questioning of God's love and goodness dominated the hearts and minds of the people. This manifested itself in the heartless worship and self-serving ethics of the people. As Waltke puts it, "Their liturgy is a sham. For Malachi, the revitalization of the nation's morality is a prerequisite for the revitalization of its liturgy."9 The people had failed once again to be the priesthood to the nations to declare God's glory and offer His peace to the ends of the earth that they had been formed to be. Using a disputational, interrogatory style, Malachi calls for their obedience to God's mandates concerning worship, marriage, and societal interaction to rise from the unchanging, firm foundation of His love for them. While there are some hard questions and

answers in Malachi, ultimately, God's love sovereignly governs them and His people. James A. Fischer captures this idea when he writes, "The loving relationship of Israel to Yahweh was a condition, not a cause. The cause was only God." ¹⁰

We need to be reminded today of God's unchanging love for us and the call to walk in obedience as a reflection of our gratitude for His redeeming love. Our stated beliefs need to be challenged if we fail to practice them to the glory of God and the joy of our neighbors. Mackay articulates this challenge in this way:

"There can be no doubt about God's love. He has irrefutably demonstrated it by sending his Son. We then wonder why when we have received the ultimate gift, the church is not vibrant, attracting crowds and being effective in its moral and spiritual impact on our country. Why is there not revival? We must be careful not to fall into the way of thinking that is because of some deficiency in God's love. The fortunes of the church are blighted by the lack of Christ-centeredness in the thinking and acting of those who are in the church. We ought to examine ourselves and expose what warps our thinking and respond with that total self-dedication that flows from recognizing what his love has given us (Eph. 5:8-20)."11

While this quote contains some strong, hard words, we must hear them through the promise of God's unchanging love and provision of every gift necessary to live for His glory, our joy, and for the life of the world! We must hear the questions and answers from Malachi through this same eternal truth throughout this sermon series.

We will continue to seek nourishment from our historic faith and the Old and New Testaments for our weekly devotion and worship. The calls to worship will come from the book of Deuteronomy which serves as the critical foundation for the Burden of Malachi. It too calls for the people of God to acknowledge through their covenant obedience the unchanging love of God bestowed so graciously upon them. We will confess together each week a confession from Deuteronomy 7:6-9 to remind us of who and whose we are in Redemptive History as a result of God's unchanging love. Our assurances of pardon will come from Paul's letter to the Ephesians. Paul addresses many of the same key issues that were important to the people of God in Malachi's day from the firm foundation of God's electing love and grace. Our benedictory blessings each week will come from 2 Peter 3:8-13 to remind us of the blessing of God's loving patience toward us His children and the promise that He is going to make all things new some day. The goal of these various elements is to show us that

God's unchanging love serves as the firm foundation from which we can love Him and our neighbor to His glory.

This devotional is designed to encourage daily meditation and prayer in personal devotions and/or family worship. You are encouraged to use it the week prior to the associated sermon so that you and your family are prepared for worship. In addition to the Scriptures and associated questions, there are opportunities to pray for the various aspects of the Church. On Wednesdays, we will pray for the various missionaries, church plants, and missional ministries that we support at CCC through Faith Promise. We also have the opportunity to pray on Saturday for God to draw various people near in worship to hear and experience His unchanging love for their joy and peace both now and in eternity. If we have the Lord's Table, we will prepare to receive this evidence of His unwavering love for us in Christ. On Sunday, the Lord's Day Sabbath, we will pray for the means of grace to bear specific fruit in our lives. Our desire is to continue to facilitate and grow in our dependence on the Lord through prayer.

May God bless our time in personal devotion, family worship, and corporate worship as we seek to for the Church to grow in knowing God's unchanging love and living in a way that reflects our gratitude and His glory!


