#### Shepherding the Flock (Part 2)

Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood. -- Acts 20:28 (ESV)

The church of God is precious and valuable. It exists because God so loved the world that he sent his only Son (John 3:16). It was purchased only with the blood Jesus Christ, the Son of God (Acts 20:28). It is empowered by the Holy Spirit who applies the blood of Jesus Christ to particular people, distributes gifts as he sees fit, and raises up leaders to oversee the flock (Ephesians 1:7, 14; Titus 2:14; 1 Corinthians 12:7, 11, 18; Acts 20:28).

I am thankful for the leaders God has raised up at Crossroads Community Church. I am thankful for the biblical approach to shepherding that was developed by Pastor Tim Witmer and still in use by our leaders today.

As we saw last month, a key aspect of shepherding is getting to know the members of the flock so we can effectively minister to God's priceless flock. Knowing the flock is, first of all, personal and relational. Shepherds build relationships with the sheep. Shepherds seek significant contact with members of the church. That is why we divide the church into flocks. You can only know a limited number of people well enough to minister to them effectively. Even with a limited number of members to focus upon and a plan to contact them, it is hard to reach everyone.

Beyond personally knowing the individual sheep, shepherds know the congregation as a whole. This makes a difference not only in how we lead, but how we serve and worship. For example, knowing that one third of us were born in another country and our native tongue is not English has implications in almost every area of ministry.

Not knowing "us" led me to a shepherding error in my first few months here at Crossroads. I didn't know that we come not only from a variety of ethnic cultures, but also from very different church cultures. So, I put some of us in a difficult situation when I led us to celebrate Communion during our Good Friday service. It was then I learned that we value Good Friday worship and we value Communion, but we do not necessarily embrace combining the two in one worship service.

To be precise, *some* of *us* are troubled by the matter and *some* of *us* aren't. That tension is exactly why shepherds must know the flock and prayerfully consider matters like this. Shepherding "us" involves who we are as a group, not merely who I am or who you are as an individual (or even a sub-group).

Pastor Tim helpfully described this as Macro-shepherding and Micro-shepherding. Macro-shepherding is big picture, us-as-a-congregation, and more public. Micro-shepherding is personal, relational, and more private. Shepherds must know the forest AND the trees.

Next month we'll look at the other aspects of shepherding: feeding, leading, and protecting. Meanwhile, if you are a member of Crossroads, you are in a flock. Please see the flock lists on pages 10-12 of this newsletter for your shepherding team (elders, deacons). ## Session Report



The Session met on March 20th together with the Deacons. Due to the snow storm of 2017, the meeting had been delayed for one week. The meeting opened with prayer and an exhortation from Pastor Quillen. The Officers divided into groups to pray for their respective flocks for approximately 40 minutes and then resumed their meeting together noting particular needs that all of the officers should be praying about.

The Officers reviewed several property matters including key access to the church and certain exterior doors which are not closing correctly. In light of the new preschool, it was agreed to also review the security camera coverage throughout the church. There were several concerns about inadequate snow removal by the contractor during the past week which resulted in cancellation of the Wednesday evening service and CHEER on Friday as well as a need for church volunteers to complete clearing the snow. The officers received and discussed a report from Gary Ladeau regarding the new church cleaning process including the checklist and standards. Gary was thanked for addressing this matter in a professional and thorough manner.

The presence of water in the kitchen led to a discussion of the Armstrong Hall renovation and the initial need to address water seepage in the basement. Jack Matsinger noted that contractors have already looked at the building and they will be returning in the upcoming days as the snow melts to inspect the walls and make recommendations. This is not a new concern as the Officers learned from a discussion by Hadden Smith and Jim Buchanan of the last Armstrong Hall renovation more than 50 years ago.

After a review of the monthly financial information and the church calendar, the officers received a copy of the Preschool Launch Team's minutes from their March 10, 2017 meeting. Pastor Quillen noted that contractors were being contacted to provide bids on putting a door between classrooms B4 and B5 and to refurbish the stage in Armstrong Hall so that it could be used for art and snacks. He noted with thanks to the Lord that the cost of these improvements will be paid by supporters of the preschool. The plan is to have these improvements completed at the end of April so that the preschool can host an open house in mid-May.

An all church workday has been scheduled for Saturday April 1st to do some spring cleaning and prepare for Easter and the new preschool. Anyone having materials needed for ministry purposes will need to label and take possession of those materials. The goal is to not only tidy up the church but also to create space so outdated and unused items will be given away or otherwise disposed of. While the entire church will be included, particular focus will be given to Rooms 101,102 and 103 on the main floor and B2, B4, B5, B6 and the closet underneath the stairs on the Barrington Road side of the church on the basement level.

Everyone was encouraged to attend the Life Explored Winter Series on the following two Wednesday evenings. Officers were reminded to organize their flocks to address the weekly tasks on Wednesday evenings which are being rotated among the flocks.

After ending their joint meeting in prayer, the Session and Deacons separated to address matters of particular concern to them. The Session discussed various ministry proposals and discipleship opportunities. Elders Quillen, Ellis and Reese reported on their meeting with Debbie Ghrist regarding the position of CHEER administrative coordinator. She gave a clear testimony of her commitment to Jesus Christ and her ongoing walk with Him. She encouraged the brothers by noting how much she and her family had benefited from the CHEER ministry. A member of a sister PCA church, Debbie has the gifts, experience and skills needed to fill this key position. The brothers prayed for her and the continued flourishing of this vital outreach.

The Session also discussed the upcoming EE Day and agreed on standards to be used when seeking instructors. They also discussed the resumption of TEAM at the end of the Winter Series and set a goal for enhancements in the Fall following the commencement of the preschool. The Elders closed their meeting in prayer and asked the Lord for His continued guidance and direction.

## Missions Highlight



Crossroads people who are associated with mission ministries (shouldn't that be all of us?) are often asked how to be of help in the ongoing support of missionaries, and how to actually be missionaries. Let's start with ten suggestions, certainly not an exhaustive list and in no particular order (except the first one):

- 1 Pray: OK, so this is priority number one. Missionaries covet prayers for safety for their families with them and back at home. They also long for divine appointments.
- 2 Give: We can all designate a portion of our giving to missions. By Crossroads policy 25% of undesignated weekly giving is dedicated to missions. Feel free to give more.
- 3 Communicate: Missionaries love to interact with their church supporters and the field can be lonely. Pick a missionary (or two or three) with whom to correspond.
- 4 Participate in missions activities: Attend conferences and outreaches; be attentive to visiting missionaries and offer to host them if needed.
- 5 Become a Missionary: There are many opportunities to bring the Gospel to people in exotic and familiar places everywhere in the world, and missionaries have used career skills of all kinds to accomplish Kingdom building. Expect to be spiritually enriched but likely not materially.
- 6 Join the World Missions Leadership Team: This is a fancy name for your Crossroads Missions Committee. We are always looking for new participants; requires dedication but not a lot of time (except Devadatta).
- 7 Present a Missionary Report: You will see them in the church bulletin every week but they are always better to hear from church members during services.
- 8 Go on a short-term missions trip: Consider joining a team serving in interesting places like India or Uganda or 69th-Street.
- 9 Partner in para-missionary ministries: Our ESL, CEF, Amnion and (coming soon) Pre-school associates are bringing the Good News of Jesus to our neighbors from many countries, cultures and faiths.
- 10 Learn to share your faith: A perfect opportunity is coming up on Saturday, May 6, at Evangelism Explosion Day, an area wide training seminar and outreach equipping Christians from many churches in our area in biblical evangelism.
- So, there are lots of answers to the question of "what can I do?" when it comes to missions. The best answer is still "just jump in!"

## Easter at Crossroads





Although every Sunday is resurrection Sunday for the believer, this Easter season at Crossroads is full of wonderful ways to be encouraged in our faith as the gospel is proclaimed through the preaching of the Word, through prayer and through various times of worship! Let us begin the season by coming back to church on Palm Sunday April 9<sup>th</sup> at 4:00 p.m. in the afternoon for our Palm Sunday Concert. Come and support Lois Smith our music director, Cheryl Chewkanes our children's choir director, and the children as they direct us to worship our risen Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

As you may know, many people get more excited about Black Friday and the potential for great shopping bargains than they do about Good Friday. But Good Friday is to be of "first importance" for the Christian. The apostle Paul says in First Corinthians chapter 15 verse 3, "For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, that He was buried, that He was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures." We don't get to have Easter without having Good Friday. Bring you and your loved ones to Crossroads for our Good Friday service where Pastor Mike will lead us through the Passion account. Starting at 7:00 p.m. on Good Friday, April 14<sup>th</sup>, we will hear various people dramatically read through the Passion account as is found in the gospel of John. Following the Good Friday service, we also have the privilege of participating in our 24-hour prayer vigil. Pastor Shibu Oommen will be encouraging everyone to come to the church and pray! It is special time that we can pray with and for one another and for those who do not yet know our Risen Savior Jesus Christ!

"When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Salome bought spices so that they might go to anoint Jesus' body. Very early on the first day of the week, just after sunrise, they were on their way to the tomb and asked each other, 'Who will roll the stone away from the entrance of the tomb?' But when they looked up, they saw a young man dressed in a white robe sitting on the right side, and they were alarmed. 'Do not be alarmed,' he said. 'You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen!'" He has risen! He has risen indeed! Ever since that first resurrection Sunday people have been gathering together for a sunrise service to celebrate the Son rise! Join us as we gather on the front lawn of the church (weather permitting) at 7:00 a.m. on Easter Sunday, April 16<sup>th</sup>, to hear a brief message by Pastor Shibu Oommen as well as singing praises to God for the resurrection of Jesus, God the Son! And perhaps a small incentive for those getting up early will be sharing together a time of fellowship, coffee and donuts afterwards in the church Narthex.

And don't forget that our Easter week of celebration will culminate in an all church worship service at 11:00 a.m. (No 8:30 a.m. service) with Pastor Mike preaching, special music and more! ## Evangelism Explosion Day



#### We are Compelled to Evangelize

"Yet when I preach the gospel, I cannot boast, for I am compelled to preach. Woe to me if I do not preach the gospel!" ~1 Corinthians 9:16

In this verse, the Apostle Paul was expressing his responsibility to evangelize because he said that the necessity (responsibility) is laid upon him. The word 'preach' means to publish the good news (evangelize). For Paul, sharing his faith was a responsibility and stewardship of life.

Last year we had 155 people participating from 50 different churches in PA, MD, DE & NJ. After lunch, many teams went out to share the Gospel around Upper Darby and downtown Philly. Thousands of tracts were distributed; hundreds of serious conversations took place; there were 12 professions of faith; and numerous Christians were encouraged.

## God Uses His People



#### Christians in Baseball by Steve Cunerd

Everyone who knows me knows that I am a huge baseball fan. I count down the days until spring training starts. I believe Opening Day should be a holiday. I've even studied baseball history back to the start of the National League in 1876.

This article, however, uses baseball as an example of how God used His people to bring about positive change in the world. There have been Christians in baseball since its beginning. James "Deacon" White, a Hall of Fame player from the 1800's, got his nickname because he didn't drink, smoke, or swear, and carried his Bible with him. For the most part, however, those early days were known for rowdy, heavy drinking players. Many parents didn't want their sons to play. The newspapers concentrated on the rowdiness because it made good press. Clean living players were boring.

The image changed at the start of the 20th-century - Christy Mathewson was so talented the press had to cover him. Pitching for the New York Giants, he won 373 games in his career, led the Giants to the World Series four times, and later, was part of the original class for the Baseball Hall of Fame. He was a college man (Bucknell), an honor student, class President, and also a strong Christian who carried his Bible with him. Baseball was now a respectable career.

Probably the biggest positive social change came in 1947 when Jackie Robinson became the first African American player in the Major Leagues. It's a story that has become well known. Branch Rickey, the general manager for the Brooklyn Dodgers, recruited Robinson, who was playing for the Kansas City Monarchs in a segregated baseball league. Robinson went on to be the Rookie of the Year in 1947, Most Valuable Player in 1949, and a Hall of Famer in 1962. It's significant that integration in baseball came a decade and a half before Dr. King and the civil rights movement of the 1960's. The part of this story that is usually omitted by the media is that Rickey and Robinson were both Christians. Again, God used His people to bring about positive change.

There are many other examples. Roberto Clemente, the first Latin American star, opened the door for the other Latin players, and Watson Spoelstra was a hard-drinking baseball sportswriter until the Lord saved him and used him to start the Baseball Chapel program.

The point is, God has chosen to use His people to bring about positive changes. Sometimes it impacts a sport like baseball. Sometimes it affects society as a whole. Sometimes it changes just one other person. For us, the message is to be willing and available for God to use us to accomplish His purpose.
