Session Report



The Session met on Monday, June 19th. The meeting opened with prayer and an exhortation from Pastor Quillen. The Elders prayed for individual members of their respective flocks with a particular focus on those who had experienced deaths in their families, those who were going to have surgery, those who were seeking jobs and those with relatives and friends needing the gospel. They also prayed for Pastor Oommen and his wife who were visiting friends in Alabama.

After prayer and discussion, the Session addressed several matters including assigning new members to flocks, future new member interviews and officer nominations and training. The elders discussed the young adults and Pastor Quillen's plans for their Sunday School Class and a growth group. They also discussed various Presbytery matters including submission of minutes. Recognizing that Brandon Burks is currently interviewing for pastoral positions, the elders discussed the youth ministry and various options regarding that ministry. They prayed for Brandon and noted what a blessing he and Traci had been for the youth and the church as a whole.

The elders reviewed the financial summary for May noting with thanks that the church's bills were all paid. They reviewed an update from the Preschool Launch Committee and noted that the preschool furniture and other items looked very nice in the Sunday School rooms. Several people have been assisting Donna Martin with the transition, including Fred Nelson, Ron Burrell and others. An open house is scheduled for Saturday July 1st and the transition has been favorably received by parents and the local community. The elders also noted that the Deacons were considering a proposal to improve the current security system in light of the preschool.

The elders discussed several upcoming matters including the funeral for Margaret Cloak, meeting with Jean Legters who is visiting from Mexico and preparing for Freedom in Christ Sunday and the picnic to follow the services on July 2nd. They also reviewed the preaching schedule for the summer.

The Elders closed their meeting in prayer and asked the Lord for His continued guidance and direction.

Absent from the Body, Present with the Lord

On June 16, 2017, our sister Margaret Cloak went to be with her Lord. A member of Crossroads since 2000, Margaret was a committed Christian with a clear testimony of her faith in Jesus Christ. She was predeceased by her parents and two older brothers. Her nephew and friends bore witness to her Christian faith and godly life. The first person in her family to graduate from high school, Margaret was known for her generosity and her faithful church attendance. A woman of determination and energy, her nephew remembers walking with Aunt Margaret to the Philadelphia Zoo, a journey of 8 miles one way.

During her time working for Apex and subsequently for Philadelphia Gum, she engaged in cross cultural relationships for more than 50 years befriending Armenian and Hispanic co-workers and becoming Aunt Margaret to many. Margaret was particularly kind and giving to families with young children both in and outside the church, often providing them with hand made things and thoughtful gifts. Having suffered a stroke three years before her death, she was cared for by one of her co-workers, Miriam Lopez, who insisted that Margaret come to live with her and was determined that Margaret, who had ministered to so many others, would not be alone in her waning years.

We thank the Lord for blessing us with Margaret Cloak. May we profit from her example.

Peacons Update



Deacons' Building Projects in Progress

It has been a few months since the Deacons have reported to the congregation about building projects under consideration. Recently, the Deacons have been working on plans for the following projects that were topics for the June 26th Deacons meeting:

- 1. The Deacons evaluated the church's current security system and determined upgrades that would be required to support the new Preschool coming into the church building in September. After gathering information and consulting with security companies, the Deacons had the Invision Security company compile and present a proposal at the meeting for a new system. The system will be more up to date than our current security system and provide improved surveillance with greater camera coverage of the interior and exterior of the church. At the Deacons meeting on June 26th, the plan was approved by a unanimous vote.
- 2. The Deacons are also working on a project to fix the windows on the Barrington Road side of the church. The windows need to be replaced to help reduce the cost of heating the building. The Deacons unanimously approved implementation of this project over time at the June 26th meeting.

Both of these projects have been recommended to the Session for approval. Funding for both projects will come from the church Building Fund.

Missions Highlight



How does one recognize the call to missions? Of course, as Christ's disciples we are all called to mission service of some sort, be it in our family, among our friends, in our community, or in the world in general. But how does someone recognize the call to international missions, especially when there is no family background to influence the decision or even a faith environment to call on?



The Crossroads family of missionaries includes those serving in every corner of the world who inspire us to proclaim the Gospel to our own international community here in Upper Darby. Few churches can claim such a resource of diverse cultures and nationalities with which to interact. But what leads to taking up the cross in faraway places? There is no typical circumstance which leads to responding to the call to international mission service, but here is one:

He was a northerner who responded to a new family tradition of attending college in the south; she was a "Townie" attending that school. Neither was a professing Christian as we would recognize. But sometime in their college careers the Holy Spirit called them to faith and their relationship led to marriage. Their degrees led in the direction of the military and nursing, but their associations in the college Christian community piqued their curiosity about what to do with their faith after his military obligation ended. At a missions conference they became convinced that they should pursue international missions. But what was the process that would get them there?



One useful tool was to be formal biblical training. A course or two stretched into a Master of Divinity degree but the larger question became where to serve? Europe did not seem like the prototypical missionary location at first but they learned that there is a desperate need for the Gospel there in spite of, or because of, the modern culture. The other issue was what agencies to become affiliated with; they discovered that raising support would become a full-time occupation. However, they also found that they enjoyed this aspect

of missions, for the prayer and friendship it engendered has lasted through thirty-five years in multiple French cities and home assignments. He found time in the midst of the mission to become a Teaching Elder in the PCA. Their two children, raised in France, still felt the draw of their parents' southern college, but even after, one serves in missions in Eastern Europe.

The call is still strong. While they have spent the last two years in the states as she recovers her health, they look forward to fulfilling their reassignment to Eastern Europe.

So, what can this example show us?

- · Accept that the call is God's.
- Be open to His "where" possibilities.
- With prayer let Him take care of "how".
- As a couple, work to be on the same page.
- Expect surprises.
- Never limit the power of the Holy Spirit to accomplish Jesus' Great Commission.

Fundamentals of Reformed Theology



The Five Points of Calvinism

According to Calvinism, salvation is accomplished by the almighty power of the triune God. The Father chose a people, the Son died for them, the Holy Spirit makes Christ's death effective by bringing the elect to faith and repentance, thereby causing them to willingly obey the Gospel. The entire process (election, redemption, regeneration) is the work of God and is by grace alone. Thus God, not man, determines who will be the recipients of the gift of salvation.



The Five Points of Calvinism are easily remembered by the acrostic TULIP:

T - Total Depravity (Total Inability)

Total Depravity is probably the most misunderstood tenet of Calvinism. When Calvinists speak of humans as "totally depraved," they are making an extensive, rather than an intensive statement. The effect of the fall upon man is that sin has extended to every part of his personality -- his thinking, his emotions, and his will. Not necessarily that he is intensely sinful, but that sin has extended to his entire being.

The unregenerate (unsaved) man is dead in his sins (Romans 5:12). Without the power of the Holy Spirit, the natural man is blind and deaf to the message of the gospel (Mark 4:11f). This is why Total Depravity has also been called "Total Inability." The man without a knowledge of God will never come to this knowledge without God's making him alive through Christ (Ephesians 2:1-5).

U - Unconditional Election

Unconditional Election is the doctrine which states that God chose those whom he was pleased to bring to a knowledge of himself, not based upon any merit shown by the object of his grace and not based upon his looking forward to discover who would "accept" the offer of the gospel. God has elected, based solely upon the counsel of his own will, some for glory and others for damnation (Romans 9:15,21). He has done this act before the foundations of the world (Ephesians 1:4-8).

This doctrine does not rule out, however, man's responsibility to believe in the redeeming work of God the Son (John 3:16 18). Scripture presents a tension between God's sovereignty in salvation, and man's responsibility to believe which it does not try to resolve. Both are true -- to deny man's responsibility is to affirm an unbiblical hyper-calvinism; to deny God's sovereignty is to affirm an unbiblical Arminianism.

The elect are saved unto good works (Ephesians 2:10). Thus, though good works will never bridge the gulf between man and God that was formed in the Fall, good works are a result of God's saving grace. This is what Peter means when he admonishes the Christian reader to make his "calling" and "election" sure (2 Peter 1:10). Bearing the fruit of good works is an indication that God has sown seeds of grace in fertile soil.

L - Limited Atonement (Particular Redemption)

Limited Atonement is a doctrine offered in answer to the question, "for whose sins did Christ atone?" The Bible teaches that Christ died for those whom God gave him to save (John 17:9). Christ died, indeed, for many people, but not all (Matthew 26:28). Specifically, Christ died for the invisible Church -- the sum total of all those who would ever rightly bear the name "Christian" (Ephesians 5:25).

This doctrine often finds many objections, mostly from those who think that Limited Atonement does damage to evangelism. We have already seen that Christ will not lose any that the father has given to him (John 6:37). Christ's death was not a death of potential atonement for all people. Believing that Jesus' death was a potential, symbolic atonement for anyone who might possibly, in the future, accept him trivializes Christ's act of atonement. Christ died to atone for specific sins of specific sinners. Christ died to make holy the church. He did not atone for all men, because obviously all men are not saved. Evangelism is actually lifted up in this doctrine, for the evangelist may tell his congregation that Christ died for sinners, and that he will not lose any of those for whom he died!

I - Irresistible Grace

The result of God's Irresistible Grace is the certain response by the elect to the inward call of the Holy Spirit, when the outward call is given by the evangelist or minister of the Word of God. Christ, himself, teaches that all whom God has elected will come to a knowledge of him (John 6:37). Men come to Christ in salvation when the Father calls them (John 6:44), and the very Spirit of God leads God's beloved to repentance (Romans 8:14). What a comfort it is to know that the gospel of Christ will penetrate our hard, sinful hearts and wondrously save us through the gracious inward call of the Holy Spirit (I Peter 5:10)!

P - Perseverance of the Saints

Perseverance of the Saints is a doctrine which states that the saints (those whom God has saved) will remain in God's hand until they are glorified and brought to abide with him in heaven. Romans 8:28-39 makes it clear that when a person truly has been regenerated by God, he will remain in God's stead. The work of sanctification which God has brought about in his elect will continue until it reaches its fulfillment in eternal life (Phil. 1:6). Christ assures the elect that he will not lose them and that they will be glorified at the "last day" (John 6:39). The Calvinist stands upon the Word of God and trusts in Christ's promise that he will perfectly fulfill the will of the Father in saving all the elect.
