Missions Highlight



Gordon Taylor, long time missionary to India and part of the Crossroads family, went home to be with the Lord on August 15 at the age of 94. His wife and partner Beth survives him, as do four children, 16 grandchildren, and five great grandchildren.

The Taylors have been part of the Crossroads missionary family since 1998, and were regulars at our annual Missions Conference as long as their health allowed. They were adopted into the Crossroads family from the Beechwood PCA church in Havertown after it closed. They had been supported by Beechwood since the early 1960's, so that some of our members have known them over 50 years.

Gordon was born into a missionary family. His father, John Taylor, was a medical missionary to India. Gordon was born in Cincinnati, Ohio on September 22, 1922, while his parents were home on furlough. After they returned to India, Gordon grew up there. He came to the United States for seven years to attend college and seminary, then returned to India in 1947 as a full-time missionary.

Gordon produced Christian radio programs and planted churches, then became involved in serving the leper community through the Bhogpur Children's Home. This home was started in 1945 with 12 children. It grew as parents voluntarily brought their children, usually at age four or five, to give them an opportunity to have a life outside of the leper community. The school would provide physical, educational, social, and spiritual development for the children, who usually set out on their own between ages 18 and 21. A majority of the children become believers while at the school.



The other major part of the Taylor's ministry was the Presbyterian Theological Seminary in Dehra Dun, which the Taylors co-founded. Dehra Dun is located in Northern India, about 150 miles north of Delhi.

Over the years in India, they worked closely with David and Eleanor Fiol, another missionary couple supported by Crossroads. In addition, the Taylor children have been involved. Their son, Calvin, married an Indian national and now is a missionary in India, serving as President and Chaplin of the Children's Home. Many of the children in the home have been supported by families in the United States, including some from our congregation.

Like the Taylors, our missionaries can be part of multigenerational ministries, or just be starting out as the first of their family or church; the only qualification is their willingness to step out in faith and serve.

Family of the Month



This month the Crossroads Connections spotlight is on the Omuyeh family

In 2002, newlyweds Goodie and Uzezi Omuyeh were searching for a new church - one where they could worship and raise their kids. They found that church in Crossroads. Now, almost fifteen years, five kids, and various jobs later, they continue to call Crossroads home. They explain, "Crossroads is like one big family. The diversity is great and there is such a warm display of love and care by the congregation. Everyone is willing to serve and assist in any given task. Most importantly, the word of God–the Bible–is taught in a very simple and practical way that is applicable in our daily lives."

Goodie and Uzezi came to the United States from Nigeria, and they are both from the Isoko ethnic group in the Delta region. Goodie has been in this country for about twenty years, and Uzezi for fifteen. They now have five children: Prince (13), Evezi (12), Eloho (9), Ujiro (7), and Ajiri (7).



At Crossroads, Goodie serves as a deacon, and both Goodie and Uzezi are involved with T.E.A.M. (specifically with the Barnabas and Rebekah Teams). Outside of their life with Crossroads, the family has had a variety of different jobs, passions, and interests.

Before coming to the United States, Goodie was a high school teacher - until he switched over to the media industry, where his roles included program officer at a non-governmental agency and strategic planning manager at one of the largest advertising agencies in Nigeria. In the US, Goodie (who holds a PhD in social work) and Uzezi (who has a master's degree in applied behavior analysis and criminal justice) have held various roles in the human services field. Goodie has worked as a program director with Devereux Community Service and as a Forensic Evaluation Supervisor with the Public Health Management Corporation. Uzezi worked as a care manager before transitioning to the role of full-time homemaker. Today, they own a healthcare agency where Uzezi works as the administrator.

Outside of work, Goodie writes poetry and enjoys photography. Uzezi has a special interest in fashion design and cooking. All five children are interested in music and play piano. Prince has a special talent for the saxophone and guitar, as does Evezi with the flute and violin. Along with their love for music, the family demonstrates a great love for people. They have a passion for humanitarian work, and they love to host people in their home and share the love of God.

The family recognizes that they are the people they are today because of the Lord. They say, "We believe that we have come this far not by our own strengths, but by the grace of God (2 Corinthians 12:9); and each day, even in our lowest ebb, we are propelled with the following assurance: 'I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me' (Philippians 4:13)."

Pevotional



God, Our Refuge & Strength: A Commentary on Psalm 46 by Daniel Wilson

If you are like me, your inclination as a Christian is to lean on God for protection from harm. You *know* that "bad things" are out there: illness, war, financial distress, crime, betrayal, etc. "Threats" are real—a part of life. But you hold firmly to the Word of God. You cling to Scripture like Psalms 46 for confidence—verses as 46:1: "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble." Or verses 7 and 11: "The Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge." (NRSV)

Accordingly, knowing that God is our "refuge and strength," you habitually pray for God's divine power to shield you from the evil of this world—to protect you from harm. You trust the Lord as being that "strong tower," as Proverbs 18:10 conceptualizes, whereby you can hide from the storms of life and be sheltered from all those scary things you see happening to others around you. This is your faith every day—your security. You live by it. This is your proof God is present, "real" in your life. And you subsequently vow to be that testimony to those less fortunate around you, displaying that faith in Christ is all they need to likewise be "safe."

But what happens when you yourself are *not* protected from trouble? After all, our Lord did say that in this world, we'll experience adversity (John 16:33). How do you justify your faith in God's protection—Him being your refuge and strength—when He permits you to suffer?

I pondered this question upon reading Psalms 46 in its entirety. Accordingly, for me, to answer this question, one must begin with a further analysis of verse 1. Consider it again here: "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble." Firstly, notice the second part of the verse (which I underlined). This relates that God is our refuge and strength not *from* trouble but *in* trouble. Bad, frightening things are thus *assumed* to occur, even in the lives of God's people. (This is something that can be easily overlooked if we focus too much on the "refuge and strength" part.) In fact, the idea of trouble being *expected* is related immediately in verses 2-3 through the concept of the natural disaster: "Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change, though the mountains shake...[and] tremble...." The conceptualization here is what appears to be an earthquake (or something related) from which tragedy can occur at any time via nature. Later, in verse 6a, we are reminded of the daily effects of sin experienced from our broken social world: "The nations are in an uproar, the kingdoms totter...." The occurrence of trouble is hence taken for granted by Psalms 46.

In light of this expectation, how then does God serve as our "refuge and strength" during the time things are going wrong? I believe the rest of Psalms 46 serves to answer this question and actually allows for a conceptualization of God's *refuge* and *strength* as unique provisions by which we can realize different manifestations of God's presence with us during a storm. Let's consider first God as our refuge.

For me, concerning God being our *refuge* in trouble, an idea which is evident is that God provides *mercy*: He *spares us* when bad things are happening. What this means is that we can realize protection from the worst of what could—or should—happen to us, similar to a castle shielding soldiers from the worst of a battle. Consider verse 9: "He makes wars cease to the end of the earth; he breaks the bow, and shatters the spear; he burns the shields with fire." Shown here is that God can suddenly act to completely end something bad that is happening (e.g., making an active war, a situation of violence/death, "cease"). He can also neutralize threats in the midst of something bad so that further harm is not realized during the trouble (e.g., breaking "the bow," shattering "the spear"—causing things that *harm* to malfunction). We can therefore take refuge in the fact of God being in control during a storm.

But what does it mean for God to be our *strength* in trouble? Sometimes we will suffer. For me, though, realizing God's *grace* is realizing His *strength*: God *encourages us* in hard times. Consider verse 4: "There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the holy habitation of the Most High." When I think of water making people "glad" in the Bible, I think of the idea of water being used to quench people's thirst, to provide people sustenance to get them through the desert. Note: water does not take the desert away but gives people a boost of energy to endure the experience in order to get through it. This is what God does, whose sustenance is described as "living water" by Christ in John 4.

Ultimately, it is through Christ via the power of His Spirit that we can endure any trials. He may provide Words of comfort, bringing us to a particular Scripture for encouragement when we are down. He may also move others to say a kind word to us, provide a meal for us, give us a hug, etc. These blessings we do *not* deserve but, during our troubles, represent God's grace poured out to us as a refreshing drink of water. Thereby, we can realize a boost of energy—new strength—to persevere. Paul therefore writes in 2 Corinthians 12:9: "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness.' So, I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may dwell in me."

I want to lastly point out one more idea. Looking back at verse 1, we see again that God is "a very present help" when there is trouble. That is, we should not find ourselves in despair, asking "where is God?" during something bad. The writer seems to want to make God's continual presence with His people clear. He states "God is in the midst of the city" to "help it" (v. 5) and twice "The LORD of hosts is with us" (v. 7 & 11). Sometimes, though, we do not have our eyes on God's presence but are caught up on the "wind" and "waves" of the storm around us. Therefore, we must "find" the Lord. I believe this is the significance of verse 10a: "Be still, and know that I am God!"

For me, knowing, or finding, God entails recognizing His mercy and grace in the situation, making Him our refuge and strength. Foremost, there is recognizing Christ and the forgiveness and eternal life He has secured for those that put their trust in Him. But there is also the recognition of any immediate good in the storm. As James 1:17 says: "every perfect gift...is from above, coming down from the Father of lights...." Mercy and grace given to you is of God.

During times of trouble, you might ask yourself: Are things as bad as they could/should be? Or you might ask: have you found spiritual encouragement by someone or something from which to "keep fighting" during the storm? It is in finding aspects of God's mercy and grace that we can recognize God's continual helpful presence. Hence, we do not have to be afraid of bad things happening, as Psalms 46:2 relates, for God will be there for us. My prayer, especially for those of us heading back to work or school this fall, is that we can find encouragement from Psalms 46, by which to faithfully lean on God as our refuge and strength to both protect us from and pull us through any time of trouble.
