**Verses Used/Referenced on Sunday**

The following is not an exhaustive list of references from Sunday's sermon, but represent the majority of where Pastor Scott came from to make various points.

Remember the necessity of love, 1 Cor. 13, and the need to bear the fruit of the Spirit, Gal. 5, even as we may disagree on these matters.

Apostles & Prophets referred to in Eph. 2:20, 3:5, 4:11, 1 Cor. 12:29-30 and the office of both closed with Apostolic era ending and canon being complete.

Paul = last and least of the Apostles - 1 Cor. 15:8-9

Romans 12:6 "according to their faith" is better translated "corresponding to the faith", in agreement with True doctrine.

OT prophecy needing to be 100% accurate = Deut. 13:1-5, 18:15-22

Agabus' NT prophecy was fulfilled = Acts 21:11, 17
