### KEEPING FAMILIES TOGETHER

Today, families are crumbling under heavy social and political pressures. In this environment, what God says about the family is critical not only for a few but for all. Healthy stable families are a must for humanity's survival. The key to stable families is having healthy thriving relationships with God and others.

The most important relationship of all is the one we have with God. We ought to love God with all our heart, soul and strength (Deut 6:5). When God is our first love and we obey Him, loving others becomes a part of our spiritual DNA (1 Jn 4:7-14). After loving God comes the priority of loving and respecting spouses. Husbands are to love their wives and wives are to respect their husbands (Eph 5:33). When there are healthy relationships between God and spouses, families have a strong foundation on which to build.

This brings us to relating well with children in a family. Parents are to raise generations of godly children to know God and His ways (Ps 71:18; Prov 22:6). This is accomplished by a combination of teaching God's Word to children to honour God and to obey their parents, and parents not provoking their children (Deut 5:16, 6:1-4; Col 3:20-21).



This can happen as each parent learns and lives out the truths of God for each generation to observe and embrace (Deut 5:33; Ps 119:1-3, 11).

The Bible also tells us to relate with our 'extended family'. For believers this is the local church family. The Apostle Peter sums up how to relate to one another in God's family with the exhortation to live harmoniously, sympathetically, kindheartedly and humbly with each other (1 Pet 3:8). This can happen practically by serving, forgiving, encouraging and spurring one another on to love and good deeds (Gal 5:13; Eph 4:32; 1 Thess 5:11; Heb 10:24). A family's presence and participation in a healthy church family will keep families together.

Families stay together when they have healthy thriving relationships with God and others. Let's do it together with the help and enabling of the Holy Spirit.  $\Omega$

# What Does it Mean to Build a Church? by Melissa Fam

Reflections on the Church Building Task Force

In early December last year, the church leaders announced possible plans to embark on a church building project. As part of this consideration, the leaders also re-evaluated the vision of GBC. This exercise of vision-casting in light of the decision on whether or not to rebuild went beyond the physical infrastructure needs of the church, since we believe that a church is more than just a building. Fundamentally, it begged the questions: "What is God's purpose for the church?" and, "How do we build a church community?"

The Church Building Task Force was set up to gather feedback and data from the whole church to assist the leaders in making this decision. It comprised five members from the EC and CC, and I was privileged to be part of this team.



From the outset, I was confident that my relevant work experience would be sufficient for me to carry out this task well. However, as more members came alongside us and prayed with us, God humbled me. He made me see that there is a role for each and every one of us in church building – it is a community project. As Paul said, "For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ." (1 Cor 12:12) Through my participation in this task force, I realised it was no accident that God brought each one of us, with our different personalities, gifts and talents, into GBC.

In line with the mission of our church, I pray for them to be faithful disciplemakers in their households, and that Christ will reveal Himself to these young kids even at a tender age.



I have found God working in me to be more patient. It was a culture shock to arrive in a CG with eight kids screaming and doing a study at the same time. For this I admire our young parents! I think one year on, I now find this a non-issue and am able to do the study (still with kids screaming).

I am now more aware of the challenges facing young parents when it comes to CG participation. It is difficult to come to CG when kids fall ill. It is something to consider, especially as CG is such a staple of our church in ministering God's Word to our members.

he knowledge of God and of our Lord Jesus Christ is at the heart of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus. Therefore, in April 2013, some members of GBC led by Elder Peter Ho Lick and

Pastor Bobby Lee came together to think of ways to improve GBC's existing Christian education for adults on Sundays.

Underlying this was our common desire to put into practice the

new church vision of being 'a disciple-making church that transforms lives in our families, communities and beyond with the Gospel and love of Jesus Christ'. What we did not expect was

that these meetings would result in a complete revamp of the Adult Bible Class programmes into the current Christian Education on Sunday (CES)!

As we met up for the initial meetings,

we were very concerned that every attendee of GBC would find a relevant Christian education class for them on Sunday. Thus, as we planned, we charted out the following programmes:

For those who were not Christians yet, we created the **Seekers Class** (four sessions, repeated every quarter) to be a place for them to learn about Jesus and to get their questions answered.

For visitors to GBC looking for a church to settle down in, the Welcome Class (three sessions, repeated every quarter) would provide an avenue to introduce the church and its people.

For GBC members looking to grow as disciples of Christ, the **Sunday Discipleship Seminars** (SDS) would run weekly classes (for two out of every three months) on different thematic areas of Christian living. In July and August, we completed

> our inaugural module 'Come Meet Your Saviour God'. Class restarts in October

2013!

Due to God's grace, the three classes have really thrived. Please continue to keep us in prayer, in particular that God will raise up more teachers and administrators for the three programmes so that the weight of ministry is more sustainably spread out.


### Making Disciples through Missions

"Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you..." Matthew 28:19-20 (NASB)



Douglas Erdmann, National Director for Navigators Singapore and a GBC member, started the conference with a question: "Of the four action terms found in Matthew 28:19-20, which one of them – go, make disciples, baptising, and teaching – is a command?"

He shared how being in missions-minded churches, reading missionary biographies, attending missionary conferences and signing up for mission trips have been key to making him a missionary. "Missionaries are made, not born"



"Before we get into The Great Commission, we have to talk about making disciples." Doug emphasised our responsibility to make disciples and outlined three steps:

We can pray, give, reach and send, and go.

- 1. Evangelise to seek and to save;
- 2. Establish to follow up with young Christians;
- 3. Equip to help mature Christians make disciples.


## True Community: The Biblical Practice of Koinonia by Jerry Bridges

Pastor Oliver's review of a book for those in the church who want to grow in the understanding of what biblical fellowship looks like in practice.

The importance of community has been given much attention by Christian leaders and pastors in recent years. This emphasis is a needed corrective to many believers' tendency towards an individualistic approach to the Christian life. However, what exactly is biblical community? To answer this question, Jerry Bridges explores the meaning of the Greek word koinõnia and its most common English translation, the word 'fellowship'. What exactly is *koinônia*? The word has two primary meanings - they are 'sharing together' and 'sharing with one another'. For the former, Bridges writes, "it is sharing a common life with other believers – a life that, as [the Apostle] John says, we share with God the Father and God the Son. It is a **relationship**, not an activity". This fellowship comes about because of our sharing together founded on the gospel (1 John 1:3). Another facet is that of a **partnership**. Bridges writes that, "whereas relationship describes believers as a community, partnership describes them as a community in action... Just as all believers are united together in a community relationship, so we are all united together in a partnership formed to glorify God" through proclaiming the gospel and the building up of other believers.

Bridges writes that the latter meaning of *koinonia*, sharing with one another, further consists of two sub-meanings: the first is **communion** with one another and the second is the **sharing of material possessions**.

Communion as used here, does not mean simply



the observing of the Lord's Supper, but also the sharing of biblical and spiritual truths to deepen our relationships with each other and with God. This understanding of fellowship is not limited only to spiritual things but also includes the sharing of material possessions with those in need (Acts 2:44-45). Bridges goes on in the rest of his book to elaborate on these meanings of *koinônia* and their implications for the church.

There is much to commend in Bridges' treatment of the biblical practice of  $koin\~onia$ . He examines all aspects of fellowship in depth and uses simple prose to communicate his ideas. He also examines how each of the meanings of  $koin\~onia$  can be practically applied in church life – his chapter on the use of spiritual gifts within the community is a must-read, capped off by his insistence that the biblical text places emphasis on the primacy of love in both the use of and the relationship contexts in which we use our spiritual gifts. I commend this book to church members and CG leaders in the church who want to grow in the understanding of what biblical fellowship looks like in practice.  $\Omega$
