Generosity & Hospitality – a Match Made in Heaven

New Testaments God commands His people to be generous – especially to those in need. For example, in Deuteronomy 15:7-8 the Lord tells us, "If there is a poor man with you...you shall freely open your hand to him, and shall generously lend him sufficient for his need in whatever he lacks." And in 1 Timothy 6:18, God instructs those who are rich "to be generous and ready to share."

This should not surprise us for God is a generous God. In James 1:5 we read, "But if any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask of God, who gives to all generously and without reproach..." As God's children, we should be committed to being like our heavenly Father.

God's Word tells us there are blessings in store for those who are generous. In Proverbs 22:9, "He who is generous will be blessed..."

While it is clear that God's people ought to be generous, the question of "How?" arises. Part of the problem is that generosity is often associated only with

the giving of money, but it goes beyond just generously giving away money. The dictionary defines generosity as "being willing to give unsparingly". For example, we can be generous with our time and/or talent and not be limited to just giving treasure.

This is where hospitality comes into the picture. The Bible instructs God's people to be hospitable to one another, 1 Peter 4:9, "Be hospitable to one another..." and even to strangers, Hebrews 13:2. In Biblical times, people did not have much, and for them to share what they had with one another and strangers was a challenge – it was an act of selflessness. Such efforts could make a deep and lasting impression on the one recipient of a generous act.

In this month's edition of the Grace News you will hear how different individuals hope to exercise generosity and use hospitality to do it. I hope you will join them in the effort to be generous, or practise it in your own quiet way. Ω

Behind the Scenes with Colin Soh

Por the 224 participants of this year's church camp, the end of camp concluded four days of workshops, fellowship and devotion time. It was also the culmination of the tireless efforts of the camp's organising committee. Only for them, their journey began much earlier.

Just ask Colin Soh. As head of a team which includes a treasurer, logistician, and programme coordinators, Colin conducted site surveys of various venues for the event: a task which, he assures, is far removed from the idyllic driving trips up the coastal resorts of Malaysia.

"Apart from location and available dates, we also made sure all amenities were in working order," he explains, recalling memories of a water disruption during a previous camp. "Once the venue was decided, we negotiated with its management to secure the best rates."

This year's camp is the sixth instalment of the biennial gathering which Colin has chaired. It will also be his last in this capacity, a decision he keenly attributes to the addition of new blood, such as Mark Chan and Melissa Fam. They have joined the team to help organise this year's church camp, working together with the experienced camp committee to provide fresh perspective and new energy.

Perhaps the attitudes and commitment they have displayed were reminiscent of his own motivations behind taking over the helm all those years ago; a period, he recalls, when a question mark hung over the event's very existence. "Around 2002, many people, including the senior pastor, were unsure whether there would even be a camp at all," he says.



GBC's Mission Outreach

The Mission Committee sets aside funds to support field projects proposed by selected Mission Organisations. Two such projects will 'go live' soon, and there will be opportunities for our members to learn more, pray for the work and even see the project in action.



GBC, in partnership with Wycliffe Singapore, will help a local city church in East Asia share the Gospel to over 140,000 people from two people groups, Su and Du (both pseudonyms), living in the nearby mountainous region. The groups have only 200 known believers today. GBC is sharing resources to assist in the translation of 24 Bible stories into the Su and Du mother tongue in written and oral forms. The project will run from Jan 2012 – Dec 2014. Our prayer is that through study of the translated translat

GBC embarks on Proclaimer ® **Programme**

At the beginning of this year, the Mission Committee purchased 15 units of the **Proclaimer** ® – a digital player dedicated to broadcasting God's Word in the **local heart language**. Light and battery-powered, the player is loud enough for a gathering of people within hearing range, ideal for a village or small town. If batteries are unavailable, it can be manually cranked to generate power. After hearing the Word, the people then discuss it with the help of native

Christians present. The Proclaimers are given to GBC mission projects as part of the outreach effort to proclaim God's Word. The Proclaimer ® Programme is part of the Bible study programme in **Pua** and **Lampang**, Thailand; **Kampong Speu** and **Phnom Penh**, Cambodia. Ω

BOOK REVIEW

Relationships: A Mess Worth Making


By Timothy S Lane and Paul David Tripp

The title of this gem of a book is one that we can all relate to. We all have relationships, whether it is with a spouse, child, parent, friend, neighbour, classmate or colleague. And we are well aware of the joy as well as pain that they bring.

Lane and Tripp begin by laying out the Biblical foundations for relationships. We were created for

relationships because we bear the image of a social God who lives in community within the Trinity as Father, Son, and Spirit. But our relationships have been affected by sin. Our relationships are messy because they reveal our struggle with sin!

What this means, Lane and Tripp note, is that "Christ is the only real hope for relationships." We need more



than just techniques to improve our relationships. We need Christ himself to transform us and those around us through the power of His gospel. We often approach relationships with a selfcentred goal: our personal happiness. But God's agenda for our relationships is far greater than that! God's purpose is nothing short of conforming us to the image of Christ, and our relationships are God's tools to grow us in Christlikeness. Understanding this enables us to apply Scripture to areas such as communication, forgiveness, and bearing one another's burdens.

Our relationships say a lot about whether we are living out of a sense of who we are in Christ, and whether we are worshiping God by loving those made in His image. I highly recommend Relationships. This book will convict and challenge you towards Christcentred relationships that glorify God. Ω
