Lesson 18 – The Return of Christ

Key Verse: John 14:2–3

“In My Father’s house are many dwelling places; if it were not so, I would have told you; for I go to prepare a place for you. If I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself, that where I am, *there* you may be also.”

Overview

Over the past two thousand years many people have tried to predict the return of Christ. For example, Edgar Whisenant published a book titled *88 Reasons Why the Rapture Will Be* in 1988. When that didn’t happen, he wrote a follow-up book titled *The Final Shout: Rapture Report 1989, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1993*. These predictions have gone all the way back to sixth century and they still continue today. Many Christians have debated the signs of the end times as they seek an answer to the question, “When will Jesus return?” Although we will never be able to predict the date of Christ’s return, the Bible teaches a lot about the return of Christ.

Three Views of the End Times

- Revelation 20:1–6. How long will we reign with Christ? _____

1. **Amillennial View:** *The millennium is now, and when it ends, Jesus will return.*

This view describes Revelation 20:1–6 as the present church age, not a future time. Those who hold this view believe that many or all of the previously mentioned signs occurred early on in church history and that Christ could return at any moment. They take Revelation 20:4 to mean Christians who have already died are today reigning with Christ in a spiritual sense. The “thousand years” in Revelation 20 are a figure of speech for a long period of time—namely, the entire church age from Pentecost to Christ’s return. It is called “amillennial” (no-millennium) because they don’t believe Revelation 20:4–5 teaches a future thousand-year reign either before or after Christ’s return.

2. **Postmillennial View:** *The millennium will come gradually, and Jesus will return after the millennium.*

This view describes the return of Christ happening after the thousand years mentioned in Revelation 20:4–5. The church will grow and have a greater and greater influence on society and society will begin to function more and more in line with God’s standards. Gradually, a “millennial age” of peace and righteousness will come about on earth, but this is not necessarily a literal one thousand years. At the

end of this millennial age, Jesus will return. There will be only one resurrection of both believers and unbelievers. This view is called “postmillennial” (after the millennium) because Christ’s return and reign will occur *after* a future millennium.

3. **Premillennial View:** *The millennium is future and will come suddenly, and Jesus will return before the millennium.*

This view describes the return of Christ before the events of Revelation 20:1–10. It is called “premillennial” because it holds that Christ will return *before* the millennium. This view also holds that prior to Jesus’ return there will be a time of great suffering on earth called the tribulation. This tribulation will be a seven-year period. After the tribulation Christ will return physically to reign on earth for one thousand years. When Christ returns to begin His millennial reign, all who have believed will be raised from the dead to reign with Christ. During the millennium, Satan and his demons will be removed and bound so that they will not have influence on the earth. However, there will be people who sin and reject Christ during this time.

- Revelation 3:10. What will Christ keep the church from? _____
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- **Pretribulational Premillennial View:** Christ will return twice: first, He will appear before the seven-year tribulation to suddenly take (rapture) the Church out of the world; and second, after the tribulation (seven-year period) in a public return when He will bring Christians back to earth to reign with Him for one thousand years. During the tribulation, the vast majority of Jewish people will trust in Christ as their Messiah (Zech. 12:10; Rom. 11:25–26; Rev. 7).
