Lesson 3: Titus 3

In Matthew 12:33, Jesus said, "for the tree is known by its fruit." If you were to look at an apple tree and all you saw on it were rotten apples, you would conclude that something was wrong with that tree. Why? Because a healthy tree will produce good fruit, but an unhealthy tree will produce bad fruit. In chapter 3, Paul tells Titus that the church is to do good deeds that reflect the salvation we have been given. Although Christians are not perfect, our good deeds should reflect the salvation that we have been given by Christ as we live in this world. Unbelievers should be able to look at our lives and notice that there is a difference between us and the people of the world they encounter. As they notice our good deeds, this will be an effective tool for evangelism and bring glory to God. Let's dive in and see what Paul has to say about our good deeds.


Read Titus 3:1–3

1. In verse 1, Paul commands Titus to give the church reminders. Why does the Bible emphasize the ministry of reminder?

- 7. In verse 5, Paul emphasizes that God is the one who saved us in the past. He then gives the basis of our salvation negatively ("not") and positively ("but"). What is the negative and positive basis of our salvation?

Application: Notice Paul says in verse 5, "He saved us." Many modern evangelical altar calls tell people to, "Ask Jesus into your heart," and Christian testimonies will say something like, "I accepted Jesus as my Savior." What would Paul say about that altar call and testimony?

Application: What dynamics in many modern churches make the application of verses 9–11 unlikely to be obeyed by the church leadership?

Read Titus 3:12–15

- 13. How does verse 12 show Paul's care for the churches in Crete?
- 14. In verse 13, what is Titus commanded to do?
- 15. In verse 14, what does the church need to learn?
