# III. What is discipleship:

*Broad Definition*: Teaching another person to become a follower of Christ.

"Walking with Jesus and then turning around and teaching others how you did it."

Narrow Definition: Discipleship is a process whereby a Christian with a life worth emulating commits him/herself to another believer for the purpose of helping them grow to spiritual maturity so that they in turn can disciple others.

Examples of life on life discipleship:

- a. 2 Timothy 2:2... And the things you have heard me say in the presence of many witnesses...
- c. Titus 2:1-6...Read
- b. Proverbs 27:17... As Iron sharpens iron, so one man sharpens another.

Iron cannot sharpen iron from a distance - iron must touch iron! In the same way, people can sharpen one another if they are close proximity – close enough to "rub."

a. Specifically obedient to the Great Commission.

- a. Daily quiet / devotional time
- b. Growing prayer life
- c. Memorizing Scripture
- d. Pursuing holiness
- e. Evangelism
- f. You cannot give away what you don't have.
- g. You will reproduce yourself with all of your strengths and all of your weaknesses.

## 4. You need to be maintaining a life worth emulating.

a. More is caught than taught.

## 5. You need a heart for God's people.

- a. A young Christian is much like an infant... They are needy and tend to make messes.

# I. Why commit yourself to this means of ministry:

- 1. Because of the brevity of life.
  - a. Life is a vapor. James 4:14
- 2. Because of a sense of stewardship.
- 3. A desire for my life to count.

Two things last forever:

- 1. Souls of men
- 2. The Word of God. Luke 21:33
- 4. God commands that we do so. Matthew 28:18-20
  - a. Winning others to Christ Discipleship begins with and ends with evangelism.
  - b. Making disciples Teaching them to obey all that God has commanded us.
- 5. Relatively few Christians are doing it.
  - a. We love comfort. (American Dream)
  - b. We fear rejection.
  - c. We make excuses. (That is for full-time ministers, I don't have time right now, I don't know enough etc...)
  - d. We are absorbed with ourselves. (John 4:35)
  - e. We don't see the need.

# II. <u>Developing a vision for disciple making</u>:

Question: What is a vision?

The ability to imagine a future event before its fruition and to live for it.

Robert Woodruff President of Coca Cola Bottling Company 1923-1955 boldly declared during World War II, "We will see that every person in uniform gets a bottle of Coca Cola for five cents wherever he is and whatever it costs." After the war, he said that he wanted everyone in the world to have tasted Coca Cola in his lifetime.



# Difference Between Call to be a Disciple of Jesus and Call to Discipleship Disciple

"57As they were going along the road, someone said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." 58And Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head." 59To another he said, "Follow me." But he said, "Lord, let me first go and bury my father." 60And Jesus said to him, "Leave the dead to bury their own dead. # I. <u>Barriers to Disciple-Making</u>:

1. You have to be the finished product to disciples others.

"**9**For I am the least of the apostles, unworthy to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God." (I Corinthians 15:9)

**\*8**To me, though I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given, to preach to the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ." (Ephesians 3:8)

- **15**The saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the foremost." (I Timothy 1:15
- "12Let no one despise you for your youth, but set the believers an example in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith, in purity." (I Timothy 4:12)

**Discussion:** Why do people feel this way?

# 2. You have to be a vocational minister to disciple others.

All you need is a life worth imitating "Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ." (I Corinthians 11:1)

**Discussion**: Tell me why people feel this way?

\*Everything I do is built around non-vocational ministers of the Gospel.

# 3. You must see immediate, measurable results.

Peter

Discipleship is a long and painful process but the fruit of it is incredibly sweet.

# 4. I don't want to be in a position of "authority".

Authority is the wrong word. Servant is a better term

John 13

"But Jesus called them to him and said, "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones exercise authority over them. **26** It shall not be so among you. But whoever would be great among you must be your servant, **27** and whoever would be first among you must be your slave, **28** even as the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Matthew 20:25-28)

**"15**No longer do I call you servants, for the servant does not know what his master is doing; but I have called you friends, for all that I have heard from my Father I have made known to you." (John 15:15)

**Discussion**: Are there any other passages that come to mind when you think about this?

# 5. Discipling relationships turn your friends into projects.

- \*Discipleship isn't sitting across a table and talking 90% of the time. That's not even teaching. Discipleship is one life and one life walking with God together.
- **"15**No longer do I call you servants, for the servant does not know what his master is doing; but I have called you friends, for all that I have heard from my Father I have made known to you." (John 15:15)

**Discussion:** How do you fall into the temptation to reduce a discipling friendship into a project?

**Discussion:** How can you avoid this pitfall?

# 6. I don't see the need for discipleship.

"2 And he said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." (Luke 10:2)

**Discussion:** What commonly distracts you from seeing the need for discipleship?

# 7. I don't know enough to disciple someone.

"8Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. 9What you have learned and received and heard and seen in me—practice these things, and the God of peace will be with you." (Philippians 4:8-9)

No one ever asked you to know everything or be perfectly equipped.

# I. Qualifications for a Potential Disciple:

In these days he went out to the mountain to pray, and all night he continued in prayer to God. And when day came, he called his disciples and chose from them twelve, whom he named apostles: Simon, whom he named Peter, and Andrew his brother, and James and John, and Philip, and Bartholomew, and Matthew, and Thomas, and James the son of Alphaeus, and Simon who was called the Zealot, and Judas the son of James, and Judas Iscariot, who became a traitor.

Luke 6:12-16

Couple of things I want you to notice:

- 1. Jesus prayed all night before he chose his disciples.
- 2. Jesus called his disciples and chose from them twelve.

# Important Principle:

Jesus didn't hastily rush out and grab the first few men who showed any interest in Him. To Him it was a momentous decision with far-reaching consequences. Of all those that followed him he chose 12 specifically that he would invite into a more intimate relationship with him.

## What does this mean to us:

We too should enter into the discipleship selection process soberly – understanding our commitment as a disciple maker and the commitment you are asking a potential disciple to make as he /she follows your leadership.

What kind of men did Jesus choose to be his disciples?

- Fishermen (Hard Working)
- Tax Collectors
- Rough around the edges, Unsophisticated
- Unschooled, Ordinary Men (Acts 4:13)
- They didn't have it all together

Suppose Jesus had chosen only those who were highly cultured, of great intellect and wealth, who never had any nagging doubts or fears, men who never made mistakes or said things they later regretted, those who were strangers to the infirmities, desires, problems, and sins of the rest of us. Where would that put us? We couldn't identify with people like that. We would be tempted to throw up our hands in despair, turn around, and continue in our mediocre ways.

Why do you think Jesus chose men that that were very human?

What does this mean to us:

- 1. It means that we can identify with the weaknesses and imperfections of Jesus' disciples.
- 2. It means that we are not looking for perfection in a person before we will disciple them!
- 3. We are not looking for disciples that are just like us. (Interests, temperament, personality...)

# Qualifications for discipleship:

- Again, we are not looking for perfect people to disciple...
- Perfect people don't need to be discipled.
- The qualities that we are going to look at here don't have to be in perfect order in a person's life.
- They don't have to have had a 365-day span where they have not missed a day in the Word.
- But they have to be hungry and willing to grow in these areas!

1. A believer – If not, you are engaged in evangelism...

Truly, truly, I say to you, whoever hears my word and believes him who sent me has eternal life. He does not come into judgment, but has passed from death to life.

# John 5:24

- 2. A Learner
  - a. Humble Hard to teach a know it all
  - b. Teachable Eager to follow
  - c. Hungry Desire to know Christ and pursue a holy life
- 3. Loves God

And you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.'

Mark 12:30

4. Submissive to Christ's authority

And he said to all, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me.

Luke 9:23

- 5. Loves / Abides in the Word
- 1. Take it in Hear, Read, Study, Memorize

Therefore put away all filthiness and rampant wickedness and receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save your souls.

2. Think it over – Meditate

# Discipleship for Everyday Life "The Need for Holiness"

April 3, 2011

#### I. THE ULTIMATE GOAL OF DISCIPLESHIP:

A. Above all else, discipleship can be distilled down to obedience to Christ's commands.

Christian activities such as reading books that help shape theology and doctrine, attending Bible studies, participating in various leadership opportunities, being a part of a small group, serving on a missions trips and the like are all good and helpful, but if there is not a real change in a persons life marked by a growing obedience to Christ, then a person cannot be called a disciple.

Listen to what Jesus says about our obedience in John 14:

If you love me, you will keep my commandments.

#### John 14:15

Whoever has my commandments and keeps them, he it is who loves me. And he who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I will love him and manifest myself to him."

#### John 14:21

Jesus answered him, "If anyone loves me, he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our home with him. Whoever does not love me does not keep my words. And the word that you hear is not mine but the Father's who sent me.

#### John 14:23-24

**Question:** Why is obedience such an important part of love? Our love for Christ motivates our desire to please him. If we are truly regenerate, possessing the Hoy Spirit, our greatest desire will be to do his will!

[The life] that which we have seen and heard we proclaim also to you, so that you too may have fellowship with us; and indeed our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. And we are writing these things so that our joy may be complete. This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light, and in him is no darkness at all. If we say we have fellowship with him while we walk in darkness, we lie and do not practice the truth. But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin.

#### 1 John 1:3-7

**Question:** How does John say that we know we are in Christ? By our obedience. What about the person that says "I know Him," an yet does not obey His commands? That person is, in biblical terms, a liar.

B. The goal of the Christian life is glorifying God.

So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God.

1 Corinthians 10:31

And it is my prayer that your love may abound more and more, with knowledge and all discernment, so that you may approve what is excellent, and so be pure and blameless for the day of Christ, filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ, to the glory and praise of God.

**Question:** What do you see in this passage that talks about obedience? Discernment...Pure and blameless...

## II. THE IMPORTANCE OF ENCOURAGING HOLINESS IN A DISCIPLE:

A. Repentance is required for a person to become a Christian and maintain a life pleasing to God.

Though it is part, it is not enough for a person to simply acknowledge Jesus as Lord. A Christian repents of their sin, both initially and ongoing, and seeks to, by God's grace, walk in a way that is pleasing to the Lord. Does total change happen immediately? No. Discipleship is a process...

**Definition of Discipleship**: Discipleship is a process whereby a Christian with a life worth emulating commits him/herself to another believer for the purpose of helping them grow to spiritual maturity so that they in turn can disciple others.

Though total change doesn't happen immediately, there should be some immediate change in a person, visible fruit, that evidence a new desire to please and obey Christ. What are some of these immediate changes that take place at conversion?

B. Immediate changes in the life of a regenerate believer.

a. Spiritual status changes

Truly, truly, I say to you, whoever hears my word and believes him who sent me has eternal life. He does not come into judgment, but has passed from death to life.

John 5:24

For at one time you were darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Walk as children of light **Ephesians 5:8** 

...and, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness.

b. Indwelling Holy Spirit

Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you?

C. Growing changes in the life of a regenerate believer.

#### a. Worldview change

When a person comes to Christ, their worldview begins to change. The realization of their justified status before God leaves them in awe. And as this realization becomes increasingly rooted and grounded in the trust of God's Word, a new believer begins to interpret the world they live in though a distinctly Christian (Godly) lens. This does not mean that a young disciple becomes perfect, but there is a new desire to grow. The temptation that we need to resist is the temptation to take on the role of the Holy Spirit to "help them grow faster." Be careful that your leadership is not just teaching them what "hoops" the must jump through to please you. This will only lead to a performance-based relationship that is shallow, brittle, and more destructive than it is helpful. They need you to be truthful, but they also need to know that you love them. We see this theme in **Romans 5:8**, "But God shows His *love* for us in that while we were *still sinners* Christ died for us." Bad habits and cravings don't disappear over night in those we are discipling. Don't expect that – or you will surely be discouraged. But take heart, what you can expect is to see the Spirit's working over a period of time as you seek to encourage and nurture a young believer in the truth and promises of God's Word.

#### b. Character change

Character can be defined as moral strength and constitution and is developed by hardships, struggles and even sin that is dealt with in a Godly way. Through these hardships and struggles, we see God's faithfulness and learn to trust Him more and more.

More than that, we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope,

Romans 5:3-4

## III. THE IMPORTANCE OF HOLINESS IN THE LIFE OF THE DISCIPLER:

A. A disciple learns what it looks like to be holy by seeing a holy life.

Jesus not only *told* His disciples to how to be holy, He *showed* them how as well.

For I have given you an example, that you also should do just as I have done to you.





## III. TRAINING:

Three vital, ongoing, questions we must be able to answer as we train our disciples:

- 1. Where are they now?
- 2. Where am I taking them?
- 3. What is their next step?
- A. How do we train those we are discipling?
  - a. By example. 1 Corinthians 11:1
  - b. Spend time in the Word with them. Tell them what you are learning...
  - c. Teach them a useful method(s) for spending time in the Word. SPECK | OIA | GOD/SELF/GROW
  - d. Pray with them and for them. Luke 11:1 "Lord, teach us to pray."
  - e. Take them with you when you go to share your faith.
  - f. Expose them to others with Godly character.
  - g. Give them responsibility.
  - h. Give them feedback. (The breakfast of champions!)
- B. Pitfalls to avoid when training disciples:
  - a. Spiritual Pride. Feeling the need to communicate a life that is flawlessly all together.
  - b. Exclusivism. Failure or refusal to expose those you are discipling to others.
  - c. Using a man or woman instead of training them.
  - d. Inundating them with activities.
  - e. Pushing methods instead of principles.
  - f. Locked into a syllabus and ignoring natural God given abilities a spiritual gifts.
  - g. Dealing more with the head than the heart.

## IV. Building: The 3 C's

A. Conviction – Being convinced of the need or importance of something to the point that it affects their lifestyle.

How to build conviction:

- a. Teach
  - 1. Teach them by getting in the Word and studying the area of question with them.
  - 2. Teach them by making them think. Ask them "why" questions.
  - 3. Tell them why you have a conviction about it.
- b. Model
  - 1. Spend time with them (rub) so they can see you live out your conviction.
  - 2. "More is caught than taught"
- c. Pray
  - 1. Pray with them.
  - 2. Pry for them.
- B. Competence Having adequate ability; knowing what to do and how to do it; understanding general principles.

How to build competence: Training Language

a. Do it in front of them.

Principle: A disciple needs to see it lived out before them.

Key: Our example

b. Teach them why.

Principle: A person must be convinced of the need or the importance of something in their own life.

**Key: Conviction** 

c. Show them how.

Principle: A person needs shills in order to practically apply convictions to the life.

**Key: Skills** 

d. Do it with them.

Principle: A person must have on-site supervision and feedback for maximum understanding.

Key: Supervised involvement

e. Keep them going.

Principle: A person must experience victory over a period of time in application of it in their life.

**Key: Accountability** 

f. Help them reproduce.

Principle: Believers are to spiritually multiply their lives.

**Key: Reproduction** 

C. Consistency – Experiencing victory over a period of time in application of what has been taught.

How to build consistency:

- a. Ensure that there is adequate conviction and competence.
- b. Supply structure and encourage self-discipline.
- c. Provide accountability.
  - 1. Presence
  - 2. Praise
  - 3. Proper feedback
- d. Pray for them and with them.
- e. Encourage them often.

  - c. Bring the coming week before the Lord.

# II. <u>Using a Christian Book in your Discipleship / Mentoring Relationships</u>

- 1. Why the use of a book can be helpful in your discipleship:
  - a. The benefit of stimulating conversation with the author.
  - b. There is a wealth of knowledge and wisdom in books that God has used godly men and women to write.
  - c. Reading a book by a trusted author can be like letting them lead a study that you and your disciple(s) can attend.
- 2. What to look for when choosing a book to read:
  - a. Two different kinds of books
    - 1. Doctrinal Teaching oriented, will be more didactic and systematic, imparting the truths of Christianity.
    - 2. Devotional Typically seek to take biblical truth (theology / doctrine) and apply it to our lives.
  - b. Look for a book that will meet a need or speak to an interest in your disciple(s) life.
    - 1. Look back at discipleship meeting #4 Teaching.
  - c. Do not choose a book based solely on its title.
    - 1. "Christian" bookstores can be one of the most dangerous places if you don't know what you are looking for.
    - 2. Choose a book based on its author not its title.
    - 3. Look at who endorsed the book... If they aren't familiar, trusted names...PUT IT DOWN.
    - 4. Be cautious when you see endorsements made by editorial magazines.

  - e. Ask questions that help your disciple(s) apply the book to their life.

  - c. Read good commentaries Be careful that you don't teach them to use this as a crutch for Bible study.
  - d. Read a Confession of Faith Talk about the doctrine that it contains.

# Discipleship for Everyday Life "How to lovingly confront"

May 22, 2011

#### I. Introduction:

The overarching principle for confronting / correcting is found in Ephesians 4:15... Speak the truth in love.

Speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, **Ephesians 4:15** 

- Biblical correction is not easy but it is required.
- The cost of being unwilling to correct is greater than the correction itself.
- There is a difference between biblical correction and being judgmental. Luke 6:37 | John 7:24 | Romans 2:1-3
  - Biblical correction seeks to restore.
  - A judgmental / critical spirit seeks to condemn.
- To strip life of all analysis (Judgments) will produce a society with no standards.

### **II. Three Misconceptions:**

**Misconception 1** – It's not my responsibility.

- That is for the Pastor's or Elder's...
- God will convict their heart...
- Surely someone else sees this issue and will say something...

I myself am satisfied about you, my brothers, that you yourselves are full of goodness, filled with all knowledge and able to *instruct* one another.

#### Romans 15:14

- Instruct = Noutheteo Reprove gently or to admonish...
- We have the responsibility as fellow believers to help each other grow in holiness.
- When we see a believer not acting in line with the Word of God, speaking the truth in love, we need to correct them.

**Misconception 2** – Who am I to tell someone else that they are wrong?

- Your ability to correct someone is not dependent upon your moral perfection.
- It does require humilty!
- Biblical correction is not aimed at bringing the offender before you, but before the Lord.
- It is motivated by a desire for another to receive the grace of conviction, confession, repentance, and forgiveness.

**Misconception 3** – If I correct them they will no longer be interested in my friendship.

- One reason that we would refuse to correct another person is because we love something else more than God.
  - We love the relationship and no not want to risk it...
  - We love peace, respect, appreciation, and approval...
- Our responsibility should not be conditioned by another's potential response.

Better is open rebuke than hidden love. Faithful are the wounds of a friend; profuse are the kisses of an enemy.

**Proverbs 27:5-6** 

# III. How to Admonish:

#### 1. Do it in Private

If your brother I against you, go and tell him his fault, between you and him *alone*. If he listens to you, you have gained your brother.

#### Matthew 18:15

Notice a couple of things here:

- 1. If he sins. We are not admonishing because someone gets on our nerves... What sin is involved?
- 2. Go and tell him, between you and him alone.
- You may need to get others involved later, but first go alone!
- There is also no need to share the offender's sins as prayer requests...
- Great Principle: Talk to people, not about people!
- 2. Don't Flatter
- There is no need to "butter someone up" before you correct them.
- This is false love, and manipulative.
- We definitely need to be gracious, but there is no need to hide behind loose words.

A man who flatters his neighbor spreads a net for his feet.

#### Proverbs 29:5

- 3. Don't Hint
- Maybe I will just hint at the issue and he will get the point...
- We hint because we are afraid to be honest.
- Hinting shirks our responsibility to present everyone mature in Christ (Colossians 1:28-29).

I did not shrink from declaring to you anything that was profitable.

#### Acts 20:20

- 4. Keep a Spirit of Gentleness
- We are not immune from committing the same sin that we are seeking to correct...
- We are seeking to restore.
- Jesus is our model... He came in grace and truth. John 1:14

Brothers, if anyone is caught in any transgression, you who are spiritual should restore him in a spirit of gentleness. Keep watch on yourself, lest you too be tempted.

#### Galatians 6:1

# IV. The 2 Timothy 3:16 Model:

- 1. Teach Do they know what the Bible teaches about this? Discern between ignorance and defiance.
- 2. Reprove "Expose" that the behavior does not match the teaching.
- 3. Correct Don't leave it at the reproof...positively correct them!
- 4. Encourage / Training This is where we take the time and effort to help them embody the Word. James 1:22

# Wrap Up:

- Which of the four are the easiest for you? Teaching and encouraging...
- You cannot develop Christ-centered disciples without reproof and correction.
- Though speaking the truth in love requires risk... risk is right and the result is honoring to Christ.
