Bear with One Another BY JAY POUND

One of my idiosyncrasies is an unfortunate tendency to talk to (yell at) inanimate objects when they don't cooperate with me. In fact, the night before I wrote this I had a long conversation—out loud -with a ceiling exhaust fan. My problem is that in my head I expect everything to go smoothly. I watch the 5-minute Youtube video explaining the installation and figure it should take me 10 minutes, due to my lack of experience. And when it inevitably takes an hour, I get frustrated, and I start asking the fan, "Why can't you just fit?"

I don't know why I cannot learn to moderate my expectations-I am trying. I am not proud of how easily I get frustrated, and I know that my family would appreciate it if I could do better. But progress has been slow and full of setbacks. Recently, after one of these episodes, I apologized to my wife, Heidi, and she shrugged it off, saying, "I don't worry about it anymore; I know it happens and that you'll get over it."

In other words, Heidi bears with me. And it is a good thing too, I have many idiosyncrasies and flaws—and it is highly unlikely that any of them, let alone all of them, will be dealt with by tomorrow. I hope, and expect, that as I walk with the Lord, the Holy Spirit will continue to renew me, but that is a life-long process.

If either of us is waiting for the other to be perfect, we will both be waiting a while. As a result, bearing with one another is crucial for everything from a happy marriage to a productive working relationship. That is presumably why Paul (in multiple letters) places such a significant emphasis on bearing with each other.

Ephesians 4 begins with the powerful and oft-quoted line, "As a prisoner for the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received" (4.1). Paul urges us-urges-that we would live a life worthy of our calling. It is quite the set up. But what is this high and holy calling? What is so important that Paul, an apostle, would urge us to do it? He tells us: "Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace." (4.2-3). Want to live a life worthy of the calling you received in Christ Jesus? Then in humility, gentleness and patience, bear with one another in love.

If this seems like small potatoes, consider how being obedient to this might change your world-or for that matter, your workplace, your family or your marriage. Like many of you, I am troubled by the increasing tendency I see in our culture to

forgive nothing. People are increasingly unwilling to bear with anyone who differs with them on anything-from theology, to politics, to public health policy. These days, we simply cut those people off. Oh, we would take them back, but only once they completely agree with us, once friendship with them means we won't have to be patient or gentle or humble. But that-it should be obvious -is a path to self-imposed loneliness and isolation. This side of eternity, all relationships with others require bearing with one another (and maybe on the other side too-resurrection won't erase our personalities!).

As we look ahead to a new year, let me urge us (along with the apostle Paul) to bear with one another in love - especially within the family of God! As a church, we believe that God has placed us here to be a lampost for the gospel. I submit to you that right now there are few ways that our light could shine more brightly than this. We can and should be known as a place where people bear with one another, where differences of opinion are met with humility and where flaws and idiosyncrasies are met with patience and love. After all, that is what God has done in Christ for us, how can we now refuse to do the same for others?




Sunday morning Creekside Bible Time and Velocity Sunday Morning will start new lessons for At Home starting Jan 17.

We start again Jan. 5th and 6th studying Jeremiah. If you are interested in joining any of our groups you can sign up on our church website! We have Zoom and in person options available.




