Beginning in the late 1960's and early 70's, a Dutch social psychologist working with IBM attempted to identify and compare the core values held by various national cultures throughout the world. How did the values of Americans differ from, say, the values of Japanese culture? This was an important practical question as businesses and corporations became increasingly globalized and divergent peoples needed to communicate across not only language differences but cultural differences in values. The researcher's name was Geert Hofstede, and his work in trying to compare and assign a numerical scoring system to rank and compare national-cultural values continued on for decades.

One of the values that Hofstede and his team compared among different national cultures was individualism. Nations that tended to highly value individualism tended to believe that things like privacy, individual freedom, and individual accomplishment were of utmost importance. In highly individualistic cultures, people see themselves as primarily a singular individual not a member of a particular group as those in other cultures do that more highly value collectivism. Among the 140 national cultures currently evaluated in the Hofstede Index, guess what country has the highest ranking for valuing individualism?

That's right. Our own culture right here in the good ol' U.S.A.

Now we can certainly see biblical precedent for the value of the individual.

The Bible affirms how each person is made in the image of God, endowing each individual person with inherit value and worth. The New Testament Church certainly believed there were radical implications to Christ's death for all people that conferred countercultural dignity to people regardless of the collective group they were born into. In Christ, whether you were rich or poor, male or female, Jew or Gentile, you had value and an equal place at the Lord's Table (see Galatians 3:28).

And yet, the Gospel also presents some challenges to our hyper-individualistic American culture. Yes each individual has inherent dignity and worth, but that worth does not untether us from our responsibility to others, nor does it mean that we can find joy or fulfillment in a life lived as isolated individuals detached from community. No, God designed us to go through a shared journey of life and faith with others.

We are better together.

After the birth of the Church, when the Spirit was poured out on Pentecost in Acts 2, we see Luke (the author of Acts) summarize the results of this outpouring of the Spirit on these new Christians in verse 42-46.

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. All the believers were together and had everything in common. They

sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved."

Check out the words I've intentionally bolded in that passage and notice how they confront some of the unhealthy aspects of a hyper-individualistic culture. Following Jesus wasn't a nice private spiritual practice, part of a regiment of individualistic "self-care." Following Jesus was community-centered. They gathered together in worship for preaching, Communion, and prayer, but it wasn't just a Sunday morning thing. They met regularly in their homes, shared their possessions with others, and probably had some pretty awesome potluck dinners. And this wasn't some "insiders only" club either. The community continually expanded as "the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved."

The reality of the pandemic that we've all lived through these past 18 months is that most of us have experienced isolation in unprecedented ways. Maybe some of you who really prided yourself on being a rugged individualist even started to feel a sense of something missing with the increased isolation.
