

THE EXILE IS ENDING; JOIN THE REBUILDING!

For seventy years, in the Old Testament, the Jewish people were kept as prisoners in the land of Babylon. Exiled from their homeland, they pined for the day they might be allowed to return and return to a life of faithful pursuit and worship of God. Finally, in the opening lines of the book of Ezra, we read that God spoke to King Cyrus and told him to let the prisoners go home so that they could rebuild the house of the Lord in Jerusalem.

Cyrus stood before the people and cast a grand vision of returning home. He invited them to see the possibilities of the people worshiping and gathering on holy ground. As their excitement grew, he challenged them to join in the work to restore things to God's desires. He challenged the faithful to let the workers "be assisted by the people of this place with silver and gold, with goods and with beasts, besides freewill offerings for the house of God" (Ezra 1:4).

Foley United Methodist Church is preparing to return from an exile of sorts, too. For over a year during the Covid pandemic, we've been worshiping outside of the sanctuary. Due to poor air circulation and the inability to create good distance between worshipers, we relocated to online worship, the beach, the park, and the Spirit Center. For many of us who have experienced powerful worship in the hallowed ground of the sanctuary, it has felt like exile. But the time to return home is drawing near.

During the pandemic, the Church Council took the astute step to renovate the sanctuary. The chance to replace the air conditioning, improve lighting and sound, and refresh the paint and pews for a 21st century traditional worship space while no one was using the room was incredibly wise. The Council developed a plan to secure lead gifts for about 2/3 of the project, and then use our generous reserve funds that have grown since our Arise Initiative as a self-construction loan to fund the rest. The plan was to repay the "borrowed" amount from our reserves over the course of the 2021 budget or in the new two-year ministry initiative that will begin in late 2021.

The good news is our current giving and reserves have enabled us to handle all the expenses of the hurricane repairs, make great advancements on the sanctuary remodel, and fully resource all our ministry objectives. The bad news is the hurricane repairs were an unexpected expense, and we had hoped that through our insurance and/or FEMA aid we might receive funding that would offset the costs of the repairs we had to make. Unfortunately, neither of those options are going to happen. The reserves we were forced to use to pay for hurricane damage was intended to be the loan we made to ourselves to complete the sanctuary remodel.

But this isn't a sad story! We are so blessed that we were in the great shape we were in to handle all of this. We haven't borrowed a single dollar, will rebuild our reserves, and we will

continue to fully resource the day-in and day-out Ministry Plan of our church. However, if we want to expedite the completion of the sanctuary (and our return from exile), we no longer have the reserve funds to loan ourselves to complete the project. Now, we have an opportunity to join like the people in Ezra and offer our gifts to the Lord in preparation for the chance to come home to the house of the Lord.

We imagine that the timeline for construction and the changing Covid guidelines could make it possible for us to begin using the sanctuary again around the first of May. To finish the first phase of work (all the renovation inside of the sanctuary) by then, we need about \$50,000 by the end of April.

Beginning in April, we are going to reopen the ability for people to make an offering to the Lord for the sanctuary remodel. We have already had people tell us that they would like to contribute to this because they would like for us to be able to open this beautiful, remodeled sanctuary to our church and community as the COVID protocols diminish and we are able to gather for in-person worship more normally. Some in our church have said that they don't need the stimulus money they just received, and they want to give that to the sanctuary remodel. Some are considering gifts even more significant than that because they want to see this project completed. Many people were not ready at the end of 2020 to make a special offering, but as we are beginning to emerge from the pandemic, they are ready to make a gift to the Lord to prepare the house of the Lord. Everyone can play their part like the Israelites returning from exile.

As soon as the money comes in, we'll move to finish the work and move back into the sanctuary as soon as possible. If the money doesn't come in, that isn't a problem. We are in such a healthy place that it will be no problem for us to wait, continue to have traditional worship in the Spirit Center, and finish the sanctuary remodel when it is financially prudent for us to do so. Our non-negotiables as church leadership are that we won't borrow money or reduce the budget of a current ministry area in order to finish the sanctuary remodel. That would be a step backward from the great financial shape we have established, and we aren't willing to do that.

At the end of Ezra 1, the outpouring of offerings was astounding. The people of God were hungry and eager to return to the place where they could meet with God. May God pour out a double portion of his Spirit on the generosity of his people that we, too, will be astounded at our offerings to God!

REAL LIFE NEEDS: SALLY RECOVERY

Last month we introduced you to Team Acts and Just the Crumbs, two teams that travel the country helping people recover from disasters. Team Acts brought in 34 people from around the country to help rebuild our community. Both teams were housed in our Spirit Center, in campers in our parking lot, and at St. Paul's Episcopal Church. They all ate and worshipped in our Spirit Center. It was wonderful to see so much going on again on our church campus. They were able to repair 6 homes while they were here. One of my favorite tasks that week was organizing a baptism for a homeowner and her two teenage children who found Jesus while working side by side with Team Acts rebuilding their home. One unforgettable moment: A single mother and her son who had been walking for 2 hours stepped into our church and asked for water and food. We gave them lots of water and a meal. One of the team members was from Peru and she was able to talk to Maria who is from Honduras in Spanish. Maria and her son came to eat and worship every night with the teams. On the last night Maria professed her faith in Christ. She now calls Folev UMC her church.

Team Acts wasn't able to help all of those in need. Unfortunately, we still have people who are trying to recover from Hurricane Sally in our community. Recently, we visited with a few more of our church members and church neighbors who still need repairs on their homes. We do have good news! More teams will be coming soon to continue to help in our community.

In March, we were also able to help Jessica, a single mom, who was moving from Family Promise to an apartment. We provided her with a bed, dresser, food, a basket of cleaning supplies from Team Acts, and a prayer box made by our KidsQuest kids. Jessica is expecting a baby very soon.

Our church congregation provided a massive amount of food, kitchen items, and bedding for the family who moved to our area to get away from an abusive situation. All of their belongings that they kept in a storage building were destroyed by Hurricane Sally.

A huge thank you goes to Bob Schroeder who is always there to help. This month, he worked along-side a homeowner repairing windows and building a porch. He also established relationships with the work teams and with families in need, took care of all the RV issues that arose, and put the Spirit Center back together after the teams left.

MEN'S MINISTRY

Challenge by Shane Ratcliff, Foley UMC Member

The men's group is continuing through Pat Morley's book Man In The Mirror however, several months ago the men's group read and discussed each chapter of Rick Warren's book entitled What On Earth Am I Here For. This book opened my eves to quite a few things that I had not given any thought to. While only Jesus has an inside track of knowing exactly what is meant. Rick takes the position of asking "what if God means...." In looking back through the book, the margins are filled with my notes and thoughts provoked during the reading. This book enhanced my daily walk with Jesus by teaching me to slow down, dig into what the scriptures are telling me, and make a genuine effort to use the gifts and live the life God has granted me. Rick first got my attention by prompting the thought of "Did God create us just to be a believer, only to die, go to Heaven without serving Him, or barely doing so?" Have we given thought to what it means to just give the bare minimum during our time on earth? Rick also asked the question "What if our time on Earth is a "trial run" for our Heavenly time?" Does how we serve Him show our love for our Savior? Do we serve with a joyful heart? Reluctance to serve could be a darker force suppressing the Holy Spirit's work within us and we often give in. Rick also challenged us with Jesus' parable of the master and the talents (Matthew 25:14-30). How does this parable apply to us individually? I personally, had never thought of the parable applied to my gifts and not just being a good steward with my money. I learned there's always more to a parable than our first impression and each reading on a parable or hearing a sermon about it will provide a deeper and better understanding. Christ told the disciples that "In His Father's house are many rooms" John 14:2. What are we going to be doing in those rooms?

Will we each hear "Well done good and faithful servant? You have done well with the talents I have given you. I will give you more". I am also reminded of the parable of workers hired at various times of the day for the exact same wage. (Matthew 20:1-16) At the end of the day, some worked many more hours than others for the exact same wage. As expected, they grumbled. How does this apply to our relationship with our service to God and others? Some come to know Jesus on their deathbed at the final hour and never serve Him while others serve many years in various ways and deny themselves worldly pleasures. But the blessings we experience from serving Him are missed by many due to serving their own self will. We spend the first few years of our lives learning to read. Then we spend the rest of our lives reading to learn. I am encouraged to make the most of this gift of sight to read what God has provided for us and live our lives as Jesus would live our lives if Jesus was living our lives. I challenge you to start by reading James 4:8 in various versions which will lead you to ponder the message of "If we spend more time with God, He will spend more time with us". Every morning ask the Holy Spirit to guide your plans for the day.


CHURCH COUNCIL HARD AT WORK


