

ELEMENTS OF A GOOD CONVO

- A clear goal
- Shared information that relates to that goal
- Strengthening of the relationship
- Agreement on the next steps toward that goal

KNOW

- You cannot minister well to someone you do not know.
- A doctor can't prescribe the right antidote if he doesn't know the person's specific problems.
- Trying to help a friend live according to the gospel takes knowledge of your friend and knowledge of the gospel.
- Why don't we ask more questions and take time to really listen?

ASSUMPTIONS

- When we assume, we don't ask.
- Why do we assume?
 - 1. Because we mistakenly use Scripture's insight on the nature of people.
 - 2. Because we equate our experience with others.
- For personal ministry to be effective, the principle is simple: Don't assume—ask.

ONE QUESTION IS WORTH A THOUSAND ANSWERS

Good questions...

- Are shovels that dig down to reality:
- Set the tone of a conversation.
- Take the focus off yourself.


- Ask permission to delve into sensitive issues.
- Do the work of change.

PRINCIPLES OF GOOD QUESTION-ASKING


- 1. Always ask open-ended questions that cannot be answered with a "yes" or "no."
- 2. Ask a combination of survey questions and focused questions.
- 3. Remember that certain kind of questions reveal certain kind of answers.
- 4. Ask a progressive line of questions, in which each question is based upon information uncovered in the previous questions.

FOLLOW-UP QUESTIONS

- What do you mean by that?
- Can you clarify with concrete, real life examples?
- Can you explain why you acted in that way?



LISTENING



- Most of us are better talkers than listeners.
- If we ask questions, we must listen.
- Hearing vs. Listening
- Our eyes communicate where our ears are directed.
- Listen for entry gates.

SILENCE

- Silence is seen almost exclusively as awkward today.
- Like rests in music, silence is part of the melody of life.
- Silence gives space for people to think and respond.
- Silence may be the best thing to "say" in the moment.
