

From the Pastor's Desk

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

At our annual meeting in mid-February, I mentioned that we are looking to emphasize three things this year: growth, participation, and production. Growth includes both a maturing discipleship for our covenant partners (members) as well as increasing in numbers.

Growth and Lent are not words usually found in the same sentence, never mind the same paragraph. I want to challenge us to think differently about it. It is going to take a few steps but hang in there – I will circle back around to how they fit together.



**Step 1.** Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on March 2. Historically and traditionally, most non-church people think of Lent in terms of "giving up something." Whether you give up chocolate, sweets in general, wine, bread, whatever; the common perception is that Lent is about giving up something that is either pleasing to us or a vice. As a child, the Roman Catholics in our neighborhood were required to give up meat on Fridays, often leading to a rather pungent smell as fish were overcooked in half the houses around us. I remember joking with some of them, "Presbyterians don't have to give anything up; but in solidarity with you, we are giving up fresh air." (There was a mixed response to that line.) The upshot is: give up something.

What people generally miss is the reason *why* Christians participate in giving up something. Again, the common perception is that people are to give up something that is bad in order to be a better person. Although that is not altogether wrong, it is inaccurate to list self-improvement as the primary goal. The purpose of giving up something is to create discomfort in our lives; discomfort that reminds us to turn our attention in prayer to God. It is discomfort to remind us of our dependence upon God for life, for our salvation, for our redemption and adoption as children of God (and brothers and sisters with Jesus Christ). The twinge we get when we would normally enjoy a bite of chocolate or when we think about having a slice of fresh warm bread serves as a physical reminder to intentionally turn our attention to God.

Step 2. This is where the general perception is partially correct. By paying attention to God and by seeking God in prayer, we are drawing closer to God and following the example of Jesus. The more we are conformed to the image and example of Christ, the better we will be. It is not self-improvement per se; rather, it is improvement by proximity to the One who is honorable, just, pure, pleasing, commendable, excellent, and worthy of praise (Philippians 4 – "think about these things"). We are not making ourselves righteous, we are trusting that Jesus – the pioneer and perfecter of our faith (Hebrews 12) – is at work in you, enabling you both to will and to work for his good pleasure. (Philippians 2).

Lent is the time of year when we intentionally think about Jesus' walk of obedience to the cross. The "suffering" we experience in giving up something we enjoy is a physical and tangible tweak to make us think of how Jesus bore our sin to the cross so that we might be forgiven and set free. Our suffering – in our Lenten tradition and in life generally – pales in comparison to the burden Jesus carried.

Yes, we are sinners. Yes, repentance is a big deal. Yes, we need to be honest with ourselves and honest with God about the sin in our lives. Yes, that is unpleasant and difficult. Remember, though, "a broken and contrite heart, the LORD will not despise." (Psalm 51).

Step 3. We do not want to take the cross for granted; but we also do not want to ignore the fact that Jesus was crucified, but death could not hold him. On the cross, Jesus declared, "It is finished." The work he was sent to do had been accomplished – and has been accomplished for us. We can rejoice because we have [a great high priest] who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin." Thus, [we can] approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need." (Hebrews 4)

Misery for misery's sake is not pleasing in God's sight. It denies the gift we have been given by grace. If the chief end of mankind is "to glorify God and enjoy Him forever," (Westminster Shorter Catechism), the joy of discipleship includes the thanksgiving for our salvation – and – the confident boldness to seek to draw ever closer to God.

**Step 4.** Here is where I want to circle back to the idea of growth and Lent together. Because the real purpose of the Lenten tradition was to draw closer to God, perhaps a better way to approach the season is by adding something rather than eliminating something. When we "diet," we tend to think in terms of short-term changes that have a definitive end date. Oh, the sugar highs on Easter as those who had been deprived of chocolate over-indulged!

What would happen if, instead, we chose to commit to 15 minutes of prayer each day, focusing on the mission and ministry of First Presbyterian Church. Each day, every day, add fifteen minutes – whether when you wake up, at lunch, when you lie down to go to sleep at the end of the day, or anytime in between – commit 15 minutes to praying that God would guide our steps in opening the gospel to Carson City and beyond. You need not treat it like a mantra, "God, open the gospel to Carson City and beyond, open the gospel to Carson City and beyond...".


No, engage it as a conversation. Ask God to show us *how* He would like us to open the gospel to Carson City and beyond. Pay attention to the ways God reveals that He already has, is, and is preparing to use us to open the gospel to Carson City and beyond. Praise God for the ways we have seen. Pray for opportunities to share with others the stories of how God has been active and moving among us.

That is just one example of "growth." As we look to participate in the mission and ministry God has set before us, let us be honest about our sin, grateful for our salvation, and hopeful for our participation in God's work of building for the ultimate realization of the Kingdom of God.

What do you say? Can we "grow" as our Lenten discipline?

Randall Gray was born in Ft. Worth, Texas; later his family of six moved to Mesquite, Texas and this was his home until after high school graduation. Randall had a passion for protecting the water

environment and spent 45 years operating\managing wastewater treatment plants around the country.

Randall met Sherri the love of his life in Sparks, Nevada. They have been married for 21 years. They have three daughters, Kimberly, Andrea, and Leila, along with six grandkids.

Randall attended Baptist and Christian churches until the age of 35. At age 35 there was a personal need to learn more about different religious groups and beliefs. The end result of this study was attending the Saint Andrew Presbyterian Church in Longview, Texas. "I love the teachings provided and the openness of discussion related to the Bible in the Presbyterian Church."



During his time in Longview, Texas Randall visited Mexico doing missionary work. "This was truly a life changing event which opened up a higher level of understanding of my role in this world."

Her mother played both the piano and accordion by ear, and if you mentioned any phrase or words, her mother would amazingly know a song with that phrase. Dad was the family member who was always called on to sing at weddings and funerals and also sang in barbershop quartets. Singing in harmony could be heard on almost every family car trip.

A key time in Jacque's life was when her mother was seriously injured in a car accident by a drunk driver. Jacque was twelve years old with a younger brother who had recently been diagnosed with Autism. Aunts and cousins came to help with caring for the family, but as the

oldest she always felt it was her job to take care of her brothers and sisters, especially her autistic brother. Everyone did the best they could and eventually her mother came home but it was not the same.

Jacque was active in church youth groups, participated in sports, music and drama, even playing Humpty Dumpty one year. After college she joined the Army medical corps reserves, got married and had three children, divorcing many years later. God has always been with her, even through struggles with giving Him control of her whole life. He has certainly guided her, sometimes despite her resistance in many areas including her career in a non-profit business, developing a health care coalition, and running a home for homeless mothers and their children.

Jacque learned that she is a seed planter—she plants the seeds and God takes it from there. It has helped her through many life situations even eventually leading her to worship with her husband, Buzz, at First Presbyterian Church, Carson City.

Worship and music are her passion and she feels so blessed that God has placed her in places to serve in that way. Is all this joy always perfect----NO! Does she always get it right----NO! Does she still try to control things.....YES! Does God know who she is, still love her and guide her through her imperfections.....YOU BET!

#### ACTIVITIES DURING LENT





February 27, following worship, we will be doing the annual burning of the palms fronds out in the Nevada Street yard area. The tradition is that the palm branches used during the previous year's Palm Sunday celebrations are burned, creating ashes for the current year's Ash Wednesday worship. These are the ashes used to 'mark' worshippers foreheads. The ashes symbolize **both death and repentance**. During this period, Christians show repentance and mourning for their sins, because Christ died for them.

Ash Wednesday worship will be held on **March 2 at 7:00** pm in the Sanctuary. Please join Pastor Bob for this meaningful worship service leading into the Lenten season in preparation for Easter and our Lord's resurrection.
