TRANSITION: FINDING GOD'S BEST WHEN LIFE HAPPENS

We've heard the statements: "Life happens." "Change is the normal." "Transition can lead to better things." All of that is well and good (and generally well-meaning), but what do you do when the inevitable transitions of life become a personal reality? While not all changes are bad and some are self-chosen, the life transitions we all face deeply affect our lives. Transitions are sometimes eagerly anticipated, and other times they are unplanned and unwanted. But they always involve a change.



Throughout history, Christians have faced change. How we respond to life transitions – both small and large – can bless others who will face what we are navigating today. With the right approach, attitude, and action, life transitions can be manageable and even positive. Here are five principles that will equip us to walk confidently through periods of transition.

1. Prayer

"Don't worry about anything, but in everything, through prayer and petition with thanksgiving, let our requests be made known to God" (Phil. 4:6).

The most beneficial discipline to calm the spirit and prepare us for what needs to be done is prayer. It's the spiritual resource we often neglect. Through prayer, we cry out to God and seek to understand His will. Through prayer, we ask for His power to obey even when we don't have all the details.

When we are tempted to worry and complain, we make our requests known to God. We pray for His peace, "which surpasses every thought," to guard our hearts and minds (Phil. 4:7). Prayer keeps our focus where it should be – on God, His desire for our lives, and His protection and guidance. Let's make prayer a daily priority, even during [this] season of transition.

2. PLANNING

"Commit your activities to the Lord, and your plans will be achieved" (Prov. 16:3)

It's always best to plan and organize according to God's will. We don't allow ourselves to fall in the trap of busy work. As we seek God's will through prayer, Bible study, and wise council from other Christians, we can write in a journal or notebook what we hear Him saying. Planning will help us prioritize and keep our focus on God-given goals during times of transition.

3. PEOPLE

"A friend loves at all times, and a brother is born for a difficult time" (Prov. 17:17)

Others can and should be a significant source of help. When we call on friends during transitions, we often will find the encouragement we need and expertise we didn't know others have. This significantly lowers our stress levels. When we're faced with a time of transition, instead of being overwhelmed, we can contact friends, neighbors, or relatives who will be willing to assist. Frequently, others who are part of a Sunday School class or church are glad to have the opportunity to help. Let's not deny them the blessing, thinking we don't want to seem "needy." All will be richly blessed as ministry is given and received.

4 PERSPECTIVE

"God is our refuge and strength, a helper who is always found in times of trouble." (Ps. 46:1)
We need to take a fresh look at God and His word, not at the present circumstances. We must not become

discouraged or disheartened when times are especially hard. Life may be hectic and harried. There may be difficult and painful days ahead, but God is in control. He can bring good out of the most difficult, painful, or confusing circumstances (Rom. 8:28). In times of transition, God's peace can comfort our hearts. God's perspective can encourage us as we remember, "Weeping may spend the night, but there is joy in the morning" (Ps. 305b).

5. Perseverance

"If you do nothing in a difficult time, your strength is limited" (Prov. 24:10)

We must never give up hope, no matter what! There will be days of adversity for all of us. But God is able to do in our lives what we could never do. When we feel overcome, weary, or defeated, we need to remind ourselves that it's not our strength that count, but God's. He loves His children. And though He doesn't remove all the problems of life, He is with us as He takes us through them. As He guides, we will experience triumph in the midst of transition.

Family Ministries

John 15:5 - I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing.

Recently I was watering the plants and trees in our little garden. This is one of the few times I take to be quiet and present in the moment, as I tend the plants, and check on their health. Last year, due to a late freeze, we ended the season with a handful of apples and one pear. This year, our apple and pear trees are weighed down with fruit. Our plum trees have a few plums. And our cherry tree... Well, it has beautiful leaves. But as I stood at that tree, right at eye level, where I couldn't possibly miss it, was one large unripe cherry. And in that moment, the Holy Spirit opened my eyes and gave me the lesson I needed now, in this season I am going through. Maybe you've experienced this, and could use this encouragement also.

All of those trees received the same sunlight, water and pruning. They were fed and nurtured. And yet, something happened with the cherry tree. It didn't produce fruit like the others. Maybe it was one of our gusty winds that blew the blossoms away, or the hailstorm that ripped through plants and damaged property. Whatever it was, the tree had been established years before and stood solidly where it was planted. But there was seemingly no fruit. Then I spotted that one little cherry, and since then a handful more.

Have you experienced stormy times (illness, grief, hardships) even knowing that you are firmly planted, your faith is strong, you recognize your need for God's love and guidance in your life, but it feels like you're not producing His fruit? That one little cherry reminded me of God's faithfulness (to a thousand generations). The fruit is there. Sometimes we go through seasons or circumstances that challenge our yield. But it is there. Because God is faithful. He produces fruit in us even when we are going through the storms of life. It


may not look like we want it to. We may find it frustrating that our branches aren't drooping with the weight of the fruit we want to see. But not every season is a perfect reflection of God's love. Sometimes we have to recognize that in this season, due to whatever storms we are weathering, it is time to rest in God's love and faithfulness, and we may be surprised and delighted to find that He is producing fruit in us through the tumult. First Presbyterian is experiencing stormy weather as we process and work through Bob's sudden passing, and we aren't where we want to be. Rest in His faithfulness. Know the fruit is there, and this season will pass. Look for the fruit, no matter how small or hidden it may be. It is there, and soon our branches will be heavy laden.

"Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest.

Music with a Message

This summer has been a challenging one without our dear friend and teacher, Pastor Bob. Selecting music has become a time of trying to find the correct songs and words to go with our interim speakers for each Sunday, not knowing only a couple weeks ahead of time what is going to be the message of the week. In the past, music would be decided months ahead of time, matching what the Pastor had planned as the message. Music is being decided by previous services from years past, to make sure that we are keeping up with the scriptures and their message through music. This summer we're selecting music from various Psalms and Readings, bringing back some of the old favorite hymns that help ground us and our beliefs.



The choir will be returning with arousing hymns and introducing new anthems that will lift us up within our soul. One of the new anthems that will be introduced this fall will be "Go Down Moses," words and music written by Mark Hayes, that has been adapted from a traditional spiritual. The spiritual tells us the story about Moses going down to Egypt land, where it seems the Pharoah had taken control of the Israelites, forcing them into slavery, causing them grief and shame. Well, the Lord in the heavens looked down and saw His people and their pain, sending Moses to free them and sending them to the Promised Land. The music in this anthem is upbeat with a driving tempo, drawing the attention of the listeners that absorb the message of the story.

The Praise Team will be singing upbeat songs to draw the listener and singer into the worship service. One of the new pieces they'll be singing is "I Speak Jesus." This piece tells a story of speaking the Name of Jesus, over every heart and mind, giving peace and declaring hope. Telling us that Jesus' name is full of power, healing, and life that breaks every stronghold, shining through the shadows, burning like a fire. Songs like this one send a message that helps us all grow even more as Christians, strengthening our faith in our Lord and Savior.



OLD SANCTUARY PRESERVATION UPDATE

The church was listed in the National Register of Historic Places as part of the West Side Historic District in 2011. Renewed interest to preserve, restore and renew our old, historic church sanctuary began in 2020. A steering committee was created for the Old Sanctuary Preservation consisting of Craig Clark, John MacSween, Ken Pearson, Jon Ruiter, Charlene Rodman, Bob and Grace Speicher. Please contact any member for further information.

The committee has been meeting periodically to consider our objectives; consult with Melvyn Green, Structural Engineer; determine the scope and plan of action; set priorities; and proceed with maintenance projects. All work can be completed by phase. We will not proceed with any work until we have sufficient funds to complete each phase and no dollars from the general fund will be used on the original sanctuary.

To-date, the roof of the Old Sanctuary has been replaced. New sheeting and asphalt shingles replaced the old roofing. It was discovered that there were up to five layers of shingles in some places. By removing those layers, the overall weight of the roof decreased and the roof was strengthened with new sheeting.

The two crumbling sets of stairs leading to the Old Sanctuary and the two-story addition were replaced; the railings were sandblasted and powder-coated, and the original granite slabs were reinstalled.

The committee has met with Melvyn Green several times. He has outlined his recommendations for preservation by phase:

- · Repoint the exterior of the bell tower
- Strengthen/seismic retrofit the tower by installing framework to brace it and convey lateral loads to the ground
- Strengthen the wall separating the old sanctuary from the two-story building
- · Brace the tall walls at the gable ends of the building
- Wall anchors to connect the walls to the roof
- Evaluate footings and floor

We are currently looking into work on the bell tower as suggested by Melvyn Green to be the first phase. Paint samples are being evaluated, estimates for repointing are being calculated, and designs have been requested for the strengthening of the tower.

Several fundraising activities have been held that you have graciously supported over the past few years including the Chili Cook-off, the rummage/garage sales, the *Mark Twain* event by McAvoy Layne, and the Holiday Craft Fair.

A special thanks for your many generous donations made to the Old Sanctuary Preservation fund. Your free-will offerings are a blessing to our efforts.
