PRINCIPAL'S CORNER

"Then God said, 'Let the land sprout with vegetation—every sort of seed-bearing plant, and trees that grow seed-bearing fruit. These seeds will then produce the kinds of plants and trees from which they came.' And that is what happened."
(New Living Translation, 1996/2015, Genesis 1:11)

My favorite parts of this verse are the beginning and end - "Then God said," "And that is what happened." Planting a garden isn't quite as simple as that for us, but once it is established, it can work just the way God describes in this verse. For HCA, the garden has been a place to learn, enjoy the company of friends, or even just meander through for some quiet moments of reflection.

It was more than ten years ago that God gave our founding principal, Susan Hayward, the idea for the Food for Life program, including the school garden. The purpose of the garden, as an integral part of this unique HCA program, is for students to know where their food comes from and how food is used to care for the bodies God gave them. Being good stewards of all that God created takes practice, though, and we want to partner with families to equip students in this area! The value of the garden has gone well beyond its original vision. Over the years it has been used for lessons in math, science, history, Bible, and literature. It has also been the setting for great events like storywalks, a grandmothers' tea, and poetry readings. The garden has been a valued place to build community, find satisfaction in working hard, and just enjoy getting dirty.

I am so pleased with the learning, planning, and creativity that has contributed to the new garden design that is now taking shape. We are moving from the beautifully formal French garden to a wonderfully sustainable garden with permaculture principles. There will be a wide path through the middle to guide our walk around fruit trees, shrubs, perennials, an arbor for climbing vines, and curriculum-related plants. There will be opportunities for each class to become the 'expert' on something completely different, and so much variety for the senses. I hope the renovated garden is a place that builds community and enjoyment for HCA as much as the original garden did!

Hello 3rd and 4th grade families!

We are so excited about the Thanksgiving Reenactment!! Thursday, November 10- all day. We hope you are able to join us. Here are some answers to some questions you may have:

- \rightarrow 3rd grade students should come to school dressed in beige, brown, or black shirts and pants. The Wampanoag costumes are here at school, so they just need to put it over their clothes when they arrive.
- → 4th grade students should come to school dressed in their Pilgrim outfit from the Plimoth Preview.
- → Everyone should bring a snack. We will be eating it before our day begins at about 8:50am
- → Please feel free to bring lunch if you are concerned about allergies. Thank you to all of you who have already signed up for Sign-up Genius!! (Ms. Graham sent an email on 10/31 labeled "Important Dates".)

Third Grade will be making Hasty Pudding on Wednesday, and 4th grade will be making Squash Surprise for the feast. Yum! Our class Food For Life budgets will cover the cost of these ingredients. (Third grade parents, ask your child what samp is, or what a mishoon is, or what the staple crop is for the Wampanoag Indians.)

3rd grade students are going to start learning about how to read food labels in Food for Life during Term 2. If you could start collecting labels and cutting them out with the name of the food item, that would be so appreciated.

In 4th grade, students have begun NaNoWriMo, or National Novel Writing Month. During this time, each student will do their best to write a novel in a month. Their stories are each as unique as they are and I love to see their creativity shine already through this challenge. Middle School News!

Students in Middle School are grouped in two distinct groups for our Thanksgiving Reenactment - the Pilgrims and Wampanoags. They have been working on authentic activities and conducting research throughout the term.

Wampanoag students will be participating in two separate activities: training participants in the arts of tracking animals and hunting, and storytelling around a fire. Students should be gathering leather, fur, and looking for items to make up their festive attire for the day. If they have moccasins those would make a great addition to their ensemble.

Pilgrim students will be participating in different activities consisting of teaching others how to make their own corn husk doll, as if they were Pilgrim children. They also will facilitate a Pilgrim perspective on hunting in the new world. Students' attire for the day should be formal-wear, consisting of skirts or dresses for the girls and dress pants or khakis with a button up shirt for the boys, appropriate for the time period we are representing.

Fifth Grade Update from Ms. Legro

Mathematics is a building project. It begins with a strong foundation which was laid in early childhood to which layer upon layer is added each school year....from learning how to use distributive property; to multiply using expanded form in fifth grade; to learning how to solve proportions using the distributive property with cross products in eighth grade. Our 8th graders, especially, recognize this building process and continually say things like, "I remember this from last year" and "We've done this before" to which I respond, "Yes! And now we're going to add another layer."

P.S. If you can't remember what the distributive property is, ask a middle schooler to tell you about the Amazon Delivery Driver delivering the same package to every house in the neighborhood.

Sixth Grade Update from Mr. Shea:

As we come to the end of Term 1 we are fervently preparing for our Thanksgiving Reenactment. The Middle Schoolers are studying Wampanoag culture through their myths and stories in Language Arts. We started off by simply reading and trying to understand the lessons and morals that some select myths were trying to pass along to future generations; we then spent time looking at how each story was told. Students have been able to identify tone and voice, intended audience, and style of a few of the different myths we've worked with. As we finish the term, students are taking what they've learned about Wampanoag stories and storytelling to create their own myths and stories in the same style as the Wampanoag.

Some of our storytellers are also bringing their knowledge of Wampanoag stories to the re-enactment! I have had the pleasure of coaching a group of students through performing some of the myths and stories from class around a cooking fire (something students are bringing in from Mrs. Gordon's Science and Outdoor Education classes). Please encourage your students to be practicing their parts and working on their projects as we close in on the event next Thursday!

To rake or not to rake, that is the question...

Mr. Curtis' Corner:

Welcome back to another episode of Mr. Curtis' Corner, I hope you've got yourself a nice cup of tea or a pumpkin spice latte because we are in the throes of Fall, which we all know is the perfect time to take a moment and survey the beauty of creation through the foliage that God created for us to enjoy. In Bible class, our students have continued journeying though the book of Genesis, most recently learning about the Tower of Babel and how when we directly disobey God there are consequences. The people who were constructing the tower were disobeying God by building a tower to heaven out of their own pride, all the while ignoring God's command to continue to spread throughout the earth and multiply. This led God to give them a consequence so that they would obey his command. We attribute this story to the formation of different languages, and it also highlights our sin nature and how we can wrestle with doing what we know we are supposed to do and what we want to do. Students then participated in the Tower of Babel Challenge where they were paired up and asked to create a free standing tower out of gum drops and tooth picks. The catch in this challenge was that each person could only use one hand at a time, so the importance of teamwork and communication is emphasized. As you can see students had a sticky good time and created some pretty awesome towers. The record on the day was over 26 inches tall.





Science Update from Mrs. Gordon:

5th and 6th grade began the year learning about the practices of science and engineering. These include things such as: planning & carrying out investigations, asking questions & defining problems, and using Math. We all use these practices in our work and everyday lives, and when we do them in a specific way and put them together, that's called Science!

7th and 8th grade started "in the beginning" learning about the origin of life together. We worked through a wonderful resource called Beyond the Evolution vs. Creation Debate which you could check out here if you're interested. It offers a viewpoint for lovingly and respectfully engaging with all sorts of beliefs about origins and design - how stuff interacts (physics) to what the stuff is (chemistry). May we marvel together at the order and beauty of the building blocks of God's creation!

All of the grades then went on to study physics for the remainder of Term 1. We applied Newton's Laws of Motion to an engineering project and studied energy together, even wondering about a possible connection between God and energy as the two things we know of that cannot be created or destroyed.
