¹ Some time later, Jesus went up to Jerusalem for one of the Jewish festivals. ² Now there is in Jerusalem near the Sheep Gate a pool, which in Aramaic is called Bethesda and which is surrounded by five covered colonnades. ³ Here a great number of disabled people used to lie—the blind, the lame, the paralyzed. ⁵ One who was there had been an invalid for thirty-eight years. ⁶ When Jesus saw him lying there and learned that he had been in this condition for a long time, he asked him, "Do you want to get well?" ⁷ "Sir," the invalid replied, "I have no one to help me into the pool when the water is stirred. While I am trying to get in, someone else goes down ahead of me." ⁸ Then Jesus said to him, "Get up! Pick up your mat and walk." ⁹ At once the man was cured; he picked up his mat and walked. The day on which this took place was a Sabbath, ¹⁰ and so the Jewish leaders said to the man who had been healed, "It is the Sabbath; the law forbids you to carry your mat." John 5:1-10

BACKGROUND

The Pool of Bethesda was designated for the halt, the lame, and the blind. There were porches for each of the afflictions.

- · It was indicative of the times—there were no hospitals.
- This was a holding place for people who weren't dead, but weren't alive.
- · They were stuck in a sorry state.
- Around them life was going on: business, religion, government; learning—but they were not part of it.

What is the name of your porch?

The PATHOLOGY of BETHESDA

Because their illnesses were not going away, they developed a pathology of "I have survived".

- "I made it another day."
- "I'm still here."

- "If I'm down and everybody else around me is down, ther down becomes normal."
- It's possible to develop a mentality that fits your environment that simply makes the best of a bad situation.
- Some of the torture at Bethesda comes from the life that surrounds the facility.
- The people of Bethesda built a system of survival based on what would not go away.
- They celebrated what was.

JESUS COMES to the POOL

Jesus comes to the pool. He observes "one who was there—had been an invalid for thirty-eight years." He asks a profound question: "Do you want to be made whole?"

Here's why:

 Nothing in the man's actions let Him know he wanted to get well. He had been sick for 38 years and in the process had made himself comfortable. He escaped death. He was still alive. He was holding on.

Jesus wants a clear answer. Does he merely want to survive or does he want to be healed?

Have you developed an addiction to your affliction?

The INVALID'S EXCUSES

Anytime you justify your condition, you give it license

to stay.

- 1. Because of what I didn't get
 - "I had no one to carry me into the pool."
 - "It's not that I didn't have an opportunity, I didn't have the support.
- 2. Because others got there before I did
 - "I tried to get healing for my life, but others got ahead of me."
 - "Others had better connections.
