


Dwight L. Moody, one of the greatest evangelists who has ever lived, made this astounding statement after a lifetime of observation and service: "I have lived over sixty years, and I have learned one thing if I have learned nothing else—no man or woman who dishonors father or mother ever prospers." The Bible commands us to honor our father and mother. If you are a Bible student, then you know that the Ten Commandments are divided into two sections. The first part deals with our relationship with God, and the second part deals with our relationship to one another. So we have vertical relationships and horizontal relationships, and we have to be right with God before we can be right with others. Conversely, if we're not right with others, we can't be right with God. Jesus summed up all of the commands in Matthew 22:37-39 by telling us to love God with all our heart, soul, and mind, and to love our neighbor as oneself.

Why does God start the second section of the Ten Commandments by telling us that we are to honor our father and our mother? It's because the fifth commandment is a pivotal commandment. It's the one that helps us obey all the rest. Our parents are the first people we meet, and if we cannot learn to love and respect our parents, then it's likely that we cannot learn to love and respect anyone else. The religion that doesn't begin at home really doesn't begin at all. The first place you can show the reality of your religion is at home. Barbara Bush, the dearly beloved First Lady, said, "Your success as a family, our success as a society, depends not on what happens inside the White House, but on what happens inside your house."

What happens at home is the basis of everything else. If the home decays, then the church decays. If the church decays, then society decays, and the nation decays. So it all begins with the home. God tells us that the basis of all our relationship to everybody else and everything else on earth after we get right with God is a home where we learn to honor our father and our mother. Mother's Day in not just sentiment; it's a token of the honor that the Bible commands us to have 365 days a year.

The Hebrew word translated "honor" literally means "to add weight to." Now, no mother wants weight added to her, so let me explain. The word means to think of your parents seriously, to reverence them, to respect them. Certainly, we honor our parents through obedience and by caring for them, but also by living an honorable life. The Bible says that a child can bring his mother to shame (Prov. 29:15). Why? Because we are an extension of our parents. Their life is in us, and if we live an honorable life then we honor them.

The Bible says that we are to revere our mother and our father (Lev. 19:3). If your parents are still living, lavish love upon them now. Make that telephone call now, pay that visit now, give that gift now, give that kiss of affection now, do that repair job now, write that thank-you note now. Whatever you're going to do to show your love, do it now. Dead noses smell no roses!

Well, we've reached the end of another school year, and soon our seniors will take the big plunge into the great unknown of college and life. This is always a time that's a little unsettling for those students about to graduate. Most are trying to finish their last high school requirements and choosing a college, while the parents are busy trying to figure a way to pay for it all. Graduation should be a happy and exciting time but it ends up very stressful. This is a small symptom of a larger problem that is rampant among our students, but also affects many adults; it's the issue of fear and anxiety. While it is natural to have a fear of heights or public speaking, our irrational fear can become paralyzing for the sake of the Gospel and detrimental to our understanding of God's grace, mercy, and love. When we are all alone, and honest, most us don't really like ourselves and therefore we have a hard time understanding how God could truly love and accept me, much less delight in us? Still others are in love with ourselves and it shows in our prideful and obnoxious nature which is off-putting towards others. Digging deeper, many who seem prideful and obnoxious are actually using that false bravado to cover up their deep rooted insecurities. What does all this tell us? Fear and anxiety can affect anyone at any time and it's quite common to the human condition. However, different people handle it different ways; for some they become practically disabled shying away from life itself, others lash out at those around them due to their lack of control, and some internalize the stress till it affects their health. Wherever you fall in the spectrum, know that you're not alone! To understand how all this started we have to go back to the beginning. Genesis 1:26-31 records that humans were made as God's image bearers, made for eternal relationship, endowed with a purpose, and God alone was their sufficiency. Absent was death, the struggle to survive, pain, sickness, or disease. But then came the Fall of Man in Genesis 3:17b-19 where man lost his innocence (naked & ashamed), man hid his sinfulness, man became separated from God, and their relationship was severed. Going further, creation itself was cursed, death entered the world for man and beast, pain, toil, harsh environments, survival was necessary, work became loathsome, and enmity came between all beings, even between the man and woman. However, with our fallen nature came the grace of God enacting His plan, and I'd like to give you four ways to combat fear and anxiety. First, to combat fear and anxiety you must have a correct view of God, which brings a correct view of self. Seeing yourself through God's eyes is far more impactful than how you see yourself. The parable of the Prodigal Son in Luke 15:11-24 is so liberating in our understanding of how God sees us versus our view of self. We see dirty, broken, and worthless, while He sees ready to be molded and used for His glory as a display of grace. We see unforgiveable, while He rejoices over us. We are scared and hiding, while He's our daddy waiting with open arms. Second, we must be mindful/careful of what we place importance on. What we prioritize and obsess over is often at the root of our anxiety and fear problem. We can spend all our time seeking after something that's truly worthless in the end. Comparing yourself to others is always a dead-end street, as there is always someone more than you are. But when you find your value and worth in Christ alone, you seek His approval over man's. Third, ask yourself who's really in charge of my life? This is a control issue at heart, because if I'm in control, I'm fallible, which means I can and probably will fail at times which leads to more insecurity. But if God's in control, His will...will be done...for my good and His greater glory, so there's rest, safety and provision there (sound familiar?). When we read Matthew 6:25-34 it sounds so simple as Jesus declares; "Do not worry!" However, few of us can live this out. He gives two tangible examples of money and clothing, but there are many other things that we use to fill in those blanks. Our list might read; money, popularity, sports, achievements, position, respect, beauty, friends, or things? We often get bent out of shape over the smallest things when those things probably won't matter this time next year and definitely don't make a difference for eternity. Parents are often guilty of living in fear and anxiety over their kids. What if my child gets hurt, misses out, gets picked on, isn't popular, or fails? The result is "hover" parents who swoop in to the rescue, which actually hinders the child's growth and social development under the guise of protection. Even further, it often ends up alienating their child against them later on. Finally, the last way to combat fear and anxiety is found in Matthew 6:33, and the famous "seek ye first" command. It was true when Jesus spoke it and it remains true now, we are to seek Him first in all things, and especially with the things that trouble us! When He becomes our first resort instead of our last, we will feel the power of fear and anxiety slip away. When we try and handle things on our own it actually represents a lack of faith and a lack of trust that God is truly good in His nature. If there's lack of trust in your relationship with God it probably stems from damaged human relationships in our past, where someone failed, disappointed, or scarred you. If left unchecked your fear and anxiety can combine with your failures/sin and become depression, anger, bitterness, and a negative outlook on life. Remember, fear is a primary tool of the enemy, and while feeling fearful or anxious may be somewhat natural you don't have to be mastered by it. Just keep reminding yourself; God's got this!
