# A Message from Andrew Spires

One of the easiest things for human beings to do is to complain. We complain about life, work, friends, enemies, family, health, gas prices, inflation, the president, our favorite football team, etc. Let's face it, sometimes it seems like we are hardwired to complain, it is our default setting. Just so we're clear, I have done my fair share of complaining in my life. In fact, you can say that over my 47 years of life on this earth, I've become pretty adept at this practice. I've complained about ill-treatment, about spiritual and political leaders, about my teams, and about unfair practices of all sorts. If it has happened to me in this life and I thought it wasn't right, you guessed it, I complained about it. If there was a Hall of Fame for complaining I'd rank as an all-time great. God has allowed me to live long enough to eat many of those words and wish I had never uttered them. Over time, God has convicted me about this complaining practice in my life through the study and application of His Word. Did you know that complaining is never shown to be a characteristic or character trait that should be present in the lives of believers? In fact, the Greek word that is most often translated in the New Testament as "complainer" literally means a person who is discontent with their life. Now, we must ask a question; who determines my lot in life? The answer is obvious; God does. So, if I am complaining about this situation or that person, I am ultimately complaining about allowance of that person or circumstance in my life. At the very base, I am complaining against God!

Did you know? The first biblical reference of complaining is in the very first book of the bible; in only the third chapter of the book of Genesis. This complaint was spoken by the very first created man; Adam, and it was directed squarely at God Himself. Genesis 3:12; "The man said; "The woman you put here with me—she gave me some fruit from the tree and I ate it." Did you get that? Right after Eve sinned and pulled Adam into it, the blame game began. The woman blamed the serpent and Adam blamed the woman. However, in Adam's blame of Eve there was subtle blame and a complaint raised against God; "the woman YOU put here with me". With his hand caught in the cookie jar, the first man railed against His God and the blessing that was his wife Eve. Not only did Adam's sin cause separation between man and God, but I bet Adam's statement created the first-ever martial fight and strife soon after they left the garden. Again, this reminds us that a complaint against another is always ultimately a complaint against God. It certainly didn't end well with Adam, some of the most famous people in the Old Testament (Job, Moses, David, Jonah, etc.) complained about others and God, and that destructive human trait has been passed all the way down to us in this present age.

Sometimes the word 'complain' translated as 'grumble', like in 1 Peter 4:9-10; "Offer hospitality to one another without grumbling. Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others. Faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms." In other words, we are to use our gifts to bless one another without finding fault, and look for opportunities to serve one another, which makes a lack of grumbling an example of the grace of God. When we are selfless and serve others it keeps us from a complaining spirit because the focus is off me! Another direct command is given in Philippians 2:14-15 which says; "Do everything without complaining or arguing, so that you may become blameless and pure children of God without fault in a crooked and depraved generation, in which you shine

like the stars in the universe." Here, the Word of God is clear, a believer is called to be a grace-giver and not just a grace-taker. When we do this we stand out against the backdrop of the fallen world that is beset by a complaining spirit. We actually shine God's light into a dark world because we think and act differently. James 4 tells us that a complaining spirit will start fights and quarrels even among Christians and this comes from not getting our own way and what we want. All these scriptures combine to paint a very bleak picture of complaining. It has no place in a believer's life.

Remember, it is never wrong to bring your concerns to God. If someone has mistreated you or problems arise you should always pray over those things and ask God for His resolution. God already knows the outcome and has ordained the best path forward yet we are to still submit our concerns to Him. However, it is never okay to complain about God or one of His children. This sin may be common to man but let us not be found comfortable in it. Let us remember the promises of His Word in 1 John 1:9; "If we confess our sins He is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness." Join me in eschewing the sin of complaining and grumbling, and with much effort and by the grace of God, may it be rooted out of all our lives.

# A Message from David Stephens

CHILDREN'S PASTOR

Sometimes I feel like we are short on stories. Is this just me? Sometimes, I get caught up in the facts and figures of life and I lose track of the story that is playing out right in front of me. Sometimes, I can get caught up in the owner's manual version of the Bible. I understand it's the best rule book for life. This is definitely true, but the Bible is also an epic and true story. God could have given us a formula such as A, B, C, tell me what to do and I'll get it done. I know many who would like that. He didn't do that. He told us stories. 'In the Beginning God....' Are we short on stories? For the English teachers we ask questions about stories. who, what, where, when, why, and how. Our tendency is to focus on the how and the what of our story. What is our goal and how are we going to reach it? We tend to spend less time on the who and the why. My heart as a Children's Pastor is the discipleship of children and the spiritual formation of families and the home. Discipleship is personal and communal, it's not a formula. It cannot just be information transfer. It must be a [do you love Jesus with ALL your heart; soul; mind, strength'] mentality. It must be a story that grips you. It transforms you into a new creation. The gospel must be a story that changed your life and we make it a priority to tell it to our kids. This story must grip our kids so much that they zealously tell it to their kids. Before we can impress the commands of scripture on others our heart must be gripped by the Gospel. We must be intentional in our teaching of the word. Our kids must remember the word of God even when they don't want to. If the Gospel story has not gripped your heart the 10 commandments will just be a list of rules to follow. We do a fantastic lesson on the commandments, but people generally will not remember the message we gave. They will remember what has gripped our heart. I want the kid's in my care to see that my love for God is demonstrated in my love for them, not in my theological precision. Do we need to

correctly teach the Word of God? Most definitely. That goes without saying. If we don't teach the commands and laws of the bible our kids will never see their need for a savior. But, if we settle just on commands and laws without the Gospel we'll get moralist not disciples. When a child asks me why do you do what you do? I'm not going to dazzle them with theological precision. I'm going to tell them a story of God's redeeming love and that the meaning of the commands of God is the gospel. We must give our kids Jesus as often as we can. When kids ask why do we live the way we do? Tell them a story, don't just give them information. When we preach the gospel to our kids, we are reminding them of who they are, and who we are, and ultimately WHOSE we are. They will see the goodness of God. They will see that the commands of God are not grievous. They will see the Gospel is our obsession. Tell them we were slaves in Egypt and God rescued us. Tell the story of your sanctification. The gospel must grip us at our core so it spills out of us into the discipleship of the next generation. I don't care what has happened in your life. You have a story to tell of God's redeeming work. Telling our redemption stories to the next generation must take priority because we are only 1 generation away from extinction. Discipleship is not automatic. When we drift away from the centrality of Jesus' last command to make disciples as our first priority we get apathy. Apathy unchecked will transform into apostasy. Let's never stop telling the story of the redeeming Love of Jesus.
