REFLECT

- What stood out to you in the reading? Why?
- The sin of Israel in the chapters that we read are as a result of worshipping the Baals and the Asheroth (in this instance the text appears to use plural forms indicating multiple locations of idol worship (v. 3:7). Baal was a fertility god who was believed to enable the earth to produce crops and people to produce children. Asherah was a Canaanite goddess.

As is common throughout
Scripture, people are often
influenced by other ideas or
people and they begin to reject
God Himself. Why might the
Israelites have been influenced by
the Baals and Asheroth? What
makes idols so intriguing?

Where have you sought after an idol in your own life? Why is that?

- The story of Ehud is rather detailed and grotesque. This might be an indication of just how difficult this period of history truly was.

Ehud made for himself a sword that was roughly a cubit long and concealed it on his right thigh.
Ehud used his own circumstances to do what he thought was right.

How would you describe Ehud's actions and strategy? Why was this effective against King Eglon?

- After killing the king of Moab, Ehud leads the Israelites into battle against Moab and says that God has given them into their hand.

How did Ehud's previous act give way for this second act of victory agains Moab? Why do you think there was swift action?
