Understanding Advent

The apostle Paul writes to the church at Rome, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind," (Romans 12:2). The church is called to be a contrast society to the world, but unfortunately the church is all too often just like the world. Instead of being an agent of transformation in the world, we typically mirror the world. A primary area is the season of the church year known as Advent.

Did you know that Advent is different from Christmas? The answer to that is probably yes, but do you know how it is different, in what ways it is different? Or do you see it more as just as a time to get ready for Christmas? In other words, what spiritual significance does Advent have, and in what ways does it shape our practices as believers and as a church?

Fleming Rutledge, a prominent writer on Advent says, "The disappointment, brokenness, suffering, and pain that characterizes life in this present world is held in dynamic tension with the promise of future glory that is yet to come. In that Advent tension, the church lives its life."

The word *advent* means *coming*, and the church lives its life between the time of Christ's first coming (what we celebrate at Christmas) and His second coming. Theologians refer to this as, "the already and the not yet." Christ has already inaugurated His kingdom, and we receive many of the benefits of the kingdom, but the fullness of the kingdom is not yet realized, thus the "not

yet"and the disappointment, brokenness, suffering, and pain spoken of above.

Thus, the whole of our lives is lived in a sense in Advent, or as Rutledge puts it in "that Advent tension." The question remains how are we to live in the midst of that Advent tension? How do we live as a contrast society in this tension? We can frame the question this way: what is the missional opportunity in this Advent tension?

The end of Peter's second letter (that we have been reading as part of our Community Bible Reading) has an interesting passage that gives us some clues about living in this tension. Peter writes, ***"But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a roar, and the heavenly bodies will be burned up and dissolved, and the earth and the works that are done on it will be exposed. Since all these things are thus to be dissolved, what sort of people ought you to be in lives of holiness and godliness, waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be set on fire and dissolved, and the heavenly bodies will melt as they burn! But according to his promise we are waiting for new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells," (2 Peter 3:10-13).***

Since this is a newsletter article, I can give you only a couple of quick thoughts. First, do not get bogged down in all the details of what it means that things will be burned up and dissolved. Do not miss the forest for gazing at the trees. The text clearly tells us that our future is one of new heavens and new earth in which righteousness will dwell. That means our future is a physical one. Resurrection gets the final word.

We can take away a couple of practical things that pertain to Advent, themes that help us to live missionally as a contrast society. Waiting is a prominent theme in Advent and in the Christian life. And waiting is not passive. We actively wait for the new heavens and new earth, meaning that two other themes in Advent are the reality of judgment and the promise of hope. Judgment is real, and that is good news. Judgment means that God will put everything to rights. He will restore that which is broken. Where there is disappointment, brokenness, suffering, and pain, there will be healing, renewal, restoration, and life. Do those who do not follow Jesus see the difference that this kind of hope makes in our lives? Do we tell them, yes even warn them, about the reality of judgment and where hope can be found in Jesus?

Friends, Advent can be such a missional opportunity. There are so many expectations leading up to Christmas. It can be a time of enormous pressure on people. Christmas can be a time where people feel a sense of unlimited obligation. Loneliness can run rampant. These provide opportunities for us to be honest with people about the pain of life as well as where hope can be found. May our eyes be open to the needs of those around us, and may He use us to bring the hope of Christ to a community that needs Him.
