### **True Freedom**

I am looking forward to my first Fourth of July holiday here at Lake Country. Where should Evie and I view fireworks?

I remember some of my favorite times on the Fourth were spent when Joel was young and we were living in Edmond, OK. The day would start with a parade that would take place in the center of town. That was followed by getting together with friends (our families all lived a distance) for the cookout and delicious hamburgers and hot dogs. Finally, the day ended with fireworks that we would take in at a local park. We had a great time building memories.

These memories remind me that, no matter what the occasion, life is all about relationships. God is a relational God who desires to commune with us and invite us into his trinitarian life. So, it should not surprise us that when it comes to freedom, it is all about relationships.

First, in our relationship with God, the Bible says quite amazingly in Galatians 5:1, "For freedom Christ has set us free; stand firm therefore, and do not submit again

to a yoke of slavery.” That means Jesus has come into this world for the purpose of freedom. He has come to free us from sin and death in order to remake us into new creations. Paul writes in Colossians 3:10, “And have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge after the image of its creator.”

This, in turn, leads to another question. What is the purpose of freedom? Does freedom mean doing whatever we want? Are we free to pursue our own agendas? That’s not the message of the gospel. Paul continues, “For you were called to freedom, brothers. Only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another” (Gal. 5:13). I like to word this freedom as, “freedom to.” A freedom to the common good, to loving one another, to doing what is best for the other person.

We are free to deny ourselves, to give up our agendas, for the good of others. That is what it means to be truly human, to be renewed after the image of its creator.

Imagine if we all could cultivate living like this. How much better our lives and communities would be.





## Sheds of HOPE

“The storm struck two days ago. Thankfully, the weather service warning came in time for the family to find shelter and no one was hurt. But the house is gone. Neighbors opened their homes and we have relatives nearby, so we’ll have somewhere to live until we can find a place to rent while we put our life back together. We need to save what we can that the storm didn’t ruin or destroy – clothing, dinnerware, pots & pans, appliances, tools, family pictures, books – there’s so much of our life just lying there in the wreckage of our house. But all the mini-storage places are full and there’s no safe storage available...”

This story is frequently heard soon after a disaster happens, and it’s the reason the Presbyterian Church of America’s Mission to North America Disaster Response created the Sheds of HOPE ministry. As you’ll see in the attached video, Sheds of HOPE provides a dry, secure place for families to store their belongings while they put their lives back together after surviving a disaster. Led by MNA Disaster Response specialists, volunteer workers demonstrate the love of Christ by setting up and giving Sheds of HOPE to families in need. During the following two years, volunteers from local PCA churches maintain contact with the families. Since our beginning during a cold week in January 2017, volunteers of the LOPC Sheds of HOPE ministry have built more than 100 Sheds of HOPE kits. LOPC-built Sheds of HOPE kits have been delivered to families across the southeast USA, including Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Texas. Our sheds have helped families recover from fire, floods, hurricanes, tornadoes and family financial crises. Our first two sheds were given to families affected by tornadoes in Albany, GA. Most recently, our sheds were among those given to tornado victims in Brent, AL.

Here at LOPC, we’ve learned that the Sheds of HOPE ministry begins helping people as soon as kit building begins. By working together and enjoying fellowship with other Christians, our volunteers – including the very young and the very not-so-young, male and female - have built stronger bonds with fellow church and community members. We’ve discovered (or rediscovered) our ability to contribute and make a positive difference in the lives of our brothers and sisters. We’ve welcomed and gotten to know new members more quickly. We’ve gained some really effective church officers. **And we have fun!** It’s not only the hands-on shed builders – the ladies who provide lunches and those who contribute financial and other support enjoy being part of the Sheds of HOPE ministry, helping others






## Youth Ministry
