

Lord's Day Worship

April 19, 2020

Dear Missio Dei Church Family,

I am reading through the Gospel of John as a potential sermon series. As I read it I am struck by how attuned Jesus is to the people around him. Many encounters start with the simple introduction of who he sees.


- Jesus sees Andrew and Peter following him, and he engages their inquiring hearts (John 1:38).
- Jesus sees Nathanael and encourages his devout worship (John 1:47-50).
- Jesus sees the paralyzed man and heals him (John 5:6–10).
- Jesus sees the hungry crowd and feeds them (John 6:5–11).
- Jesus sees the grief of Mary and Martha and weeps with them (John 11:33).

As Jesus looks around, his eyes are active and engaged. He notices people. And he looks long enough to see people's physical *and* spiritual needs. But what he sees is just the start of the story; he then moves in and is present with them.

My question is: Is this true of me? Is it true of you? There are many days when I am distracted and don't notice the people around me. My eyes are open, but my brain is elsewhere. There are other days when I *choose* to look past the people around me and toward getting a task done. Then there are those "coronavirus" moments when I see people, but choose to avoid them because of fear or caution.

Jesus lived a life that was practiced at seeing. So much so, that even as he hung on the cross, experiencing intense and unrelenting pain, he saw his mother in distress and asked his friends to care for her (John 19:26). At that point, we would not expect him to be noticing others, but he did. As he struggled for breath, he would have been right to focus on the much more significant and critical task of securing our eternal union with God. But even at that moment, Jesus sees the people around him and cares for them.

I want to grow in this. I want to notice the precious people that the Lord has surrounded me with. But it is not easy to do. There are so many things that compete for my attention. There have been moments I have been too engrossed with a task, or something on my phone, to even look up! Yet, I am challenged by how the gospel writers bring us into Jesus'



line of sight, and how what Jesus sees directs his next steps. So I must ask myself, who is in my midst that I am not seeing? I continue to ask the Lord to give me his eyes to see.

And I assume I am not alone in this. Do you hide behind the shield of busyness, thinking that what you are engaged in at the moment is more important than those the Lord has placed in your path? I do. Seeing takes work. It means looking away from myself (and what I am doing) and entering into the world of another. And it takes practice. Here are a few questions to get us started:

- Are you, like me, failing to see?
- What captures your attention as you move through your day?
- What do you notice yourself looking at?
- Are you careful with what steals your attention?
- Do you see your affection growing for what you spend time seeing (both good and bad)?


It helps me to know that Jesus sees me even now. We are never alone as he invites us to see and bless the people he places in our midst. I want to grow in doing what Jesus himself did. Will you pray with me that we grow in seeing?

I am praying and longing for our time where we can meet together again. May our longing for worshiping together bring God great glory, deepen our relationships with one another, and fuel an evangelistic fervor for sharing the gospel of our Risen Christ!



BEFORE YOU START

- Pick a time and place. We know that disruptions may come up, but do your best to preserve this time. It is powerful when we slow down, take time to worship, and pay attention to the way God is moving. Put phones and other distractions away.
- Designate a leader to transition through the elements of the liturgy. Portions that say "together" will be read or prayed by everyone. This practice will help you stay focused and help the service flow more naturally.
- Don't feel a need to rush through everything! If God's doing something, linger there.
- Remember your participation in the whole of it matters! Try to avoid just listening to the sermon, but participate in as many of the elements you can. Every element is formative and shaping us in particular and powerful ways, not just the preached Word of God. If it's time to sing, sing with passion. If it's time to read, read with confidence.
- We put everything in order so you can simply scroll down through the order of the liturgy. We know that this might feel a little weird, but as you interact with our content this morning, know that you are not alone. God is with us and many others around the world are worshiping in the same way today.
- Last but not least, give tons of grace to yourself. Dependent on if you're engaging solo or with others will affect how this plays itself out. Kids will adjust how things go and that's ok. Experiment one way this week and if something doesn't work, adjust it. God is with you. God is in you. He loves you and will guide you in these times.

We love you all and can't wait to gather again as a whole church body, but until then, lead with faith and confidence. We trust that God will be using this time of scattering to gather us to Himself and deepen our roots in Him.


SERMON DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1. Who is the most impressive public speaker that you have heard? What made their style or content impressive? Share about your experience.
- 2. What words might the Corinthians have used to describe their experience of being led by these charismatic giants or super apostles? In contrast, what does Paul boast about as the mark of his own leadership?
- 3. Read Matthew 20:25-27

"But Jesus called them to him and said, "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones exercise authority over them. It shall not be so among you. But whoever would be great among you must be your servant, and whoever would be first among you must be your slave," (Matthew 20:25–27, ESV)

Define servant leadership? Compare this to how the super apostles were leading. How might that apply to your day to day life?

- 4. What do you think was the motivation for Paul's commitment to others spiritual welfare? How was it seen in chapter 11?
- 5. Paul not only identified with those to whom he ministered, he cared enough for them to accept personal hardship in order to benefit them. Out of your commitment to Christ, how might you this week share yourself?




