Comfort in the truths of the Psalms Psalm 47 is one of those comforts.

Psalm 47
God Is King over All the Earth
To the choirmaster. A Psalm of the Sons of Korah.

- 47 Clap your hands, all peoples!
 Shout to God with loud songs of joy!

 ² For the LORD, the Most High, is to be feared, a great king over all the earth.

 ³ He subdued peoples under us, and nations under our feet.
- ⁴ He chose our heritage for us, the pride of Jacob whom he loves.

In verse 2 He writes,
"For the LORD, the Most High, is to be feared, a great king over all the earth!" (Psalm 47:2). The psalmist says the reason we are excited, the reason we are shouting with joy is:

God is King over ALL the earth.

God is no ordinary King. The psalmist tells us he is the Lord Most High. There is no one above him. He is the King of every other king, he is the Lord over every other lord and he is the One true God. And because of that, verse 2 tells us, we should be in awe! We should be in a place of amazement that causes us to clap

- ⁵ God has gone up with a shout, the LORD with the sound of a trumpet.
- ⁶ Sing praises to God, sing praises! Sing praises to our King, sing praises!
- 7 For God is the King of all the earth; sing praises with a psalm!

- 8 God reigns over the nations; God sits on his holy throne.
- ⁹ The princes of the peoples gather as the people of the God of Abraham. For the shields of the earth belong to God; he is highly exalted!

Psalm 24

A Psalm of David.

24 The earth is the LORD's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein, ² for he has founded it upon the seas and established it upon the rivers.

- ⁷ I will tell of the decree: The LORD said to me, "You are my Son; today I have begotten you.
- ⁸ Ask of me, and I will make the nations your heritage, and the ends of the earth your possession.
- ⁹ You shall break them with a rod of iron and dash them in pieces like a potter's vessel."
- ¹⁰ Now therefore, O kings, be wise; be warned, O rulers of the earth.
- ¹¹ Serve the LORD with fear, and rejoice with trembling.
- ¹² Kiss the Son, lest he be angry, and you perish in the way, for his wrath is quickly kindled. Blessed are all who take refuge in him.

"For now, Christians live in a great theological tension: we already possess every spiritual blessing in Christ, but we do not experience the fullness of these blessings yet. In one sense, we are already adopted, redeemed, sanctified, and saved; in another, these experiences are not yet fully ours. Underneath this theological and practical tension are the two comings of Christ. In his first coming, he inaugurated the last days; in his second coming, he will complete them. In the meantime, we live for now in "the overlap of the ages."

Already, Not Yet

What do I mean? According to Scripture, believers are

- •already adopted in Christ (Romans 8:15), but not yet adopted (Romans 8:23);
- •already redeemed in Christ (<u>Ephesians 1:7</u>), but not yet redeemed (<u>Ephesians 4:30</u>);
- •already sanctified in Christ (<u>1 Corinthians 1:2</u>), but not yet sanctified (<u>1 Thessalonians 5:23–24</u>);
- •already saved in Christ (<u>Ephesians 2:8</u>), but not yet saved (<u>Romans 5:9</u>);
- •already raised with Christ (<u>Ephesians 2:6</u>), but not yet raised (<u>1 Corinthians 15:52</u>).

Underlying this theological tension is a theological structure: the already-not yet framework.


The New Testament authors thought, wrote, and lived through the grid of this biblical framework or mindset. It determined the way they spoke about God's dealings in this world in light of the world to come.

If we don't understand this mindset, the theological tension we live in will become a theological disaster. We will inevitably misread Scripture. And if we misread Scripture, we will live misled lives.

Question 2:


We know the truths of God's word and that there is more of God's reign to come, but how should we live today?

In 1976, Francis Schaeffer published his blockbuster, How Should We Then Live. Like us today, Schaeffer was disturbed by how the church and the culture were slipping away from a Biblical Foundation.



Francis Schaeffer long pondered the fate of declining Western culture. In this brilliant book he analyzed the reasons for modern society's state of affairs and presented the only viable alternative: living by the Christian ethic, acceptance of God's revelation, and total affirmation of the Bible's morals, values, and meaning.


"Most people catch their presuppositions from their family and surrounding society, the way that a child catches the measles. **But people with** understanding realize that their presuppositions should be chosen after a careful consideration of which worldview is true."

Van Til argues that one must presuppose the truth of Christianity in order to make sense of reality: "What is the content of this presupposition, then? It is this: "I take what the Bible says about God and his relation to the universe as unquestionably true on its own authority" (The Defense of the Faith, 253

Thus, Van Til's apologetic does not make Christianity the conclusion of an argument; rather, Christianity is the starting presupposition.



- Live by the Christian ethic
- Accept God's revelation
- •Total affirmation of the Bible's morals, values, and meaning.
- 1.Christian ethics teaches us how to live a life pleasing to God according to the Bible
- 2.God's makes himself known as Lord through divine revelation, which is given to all people through creation and human nature and to specific people through events, inspired human words recorded as Scripture, and Jesus Christ himself.
- 3. Depend on the Bible as our standard for right and wrong
