# Nazarene Christian Academy Summer Reading Project for students entering 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> Grade Due on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of School

Students will read **one** book found on the list below. They will write a report based on the reading of the book and will turn the report into their English teacher the first day of school. This report will be a test grade for the first quarter and will count as one of the two critical book reviews that the students will complete to fulfill the requirements for their English course. Students will use the following format:

- I. Choose a book from the list and read it.
  - a. Start at the beginning of the summer.
  - b. Read carefully and take notes (notes are optional).
  - c. Choose a book that you think you may enjoy reading.
- II. Begin writing the report
  - a. Do not wait until the last minute to write your report.
  - b. Submit the paper to your English Teacher the first day of school.

### III. Introduction (15pts)

- a. This paragraph includes general information, such as the author and the title of the book, as well as the book genre (fiction, biography, information, etc.).
- b. Your introduction should also include your thesis statement, which reveals your attitude toward the book and gives the main ideas to be developed in the review. The thesis statement also gives your evaluation of the book (favorable or unfavorable) and your reason for giving such an evaluation.

## IV. Body (40pts)

- a. Contains a short, concise summary of the book.
- b. Supports the thesis statement.

#### V. Conclusion (15 pts)

- a. Restates the thesis
- b. Strong closing

#### VI. Grammar and Mechanics (30 pts)

- a. Grammatical errors
- b. Spelling, punctuation, capitalization, etc.

#### VII. Format

- a. Times New Roman
- b. 12pt. Font
- c. Double Spaced
- d. 300-400 words
