Shorter Catechism Question 7: What are the decrees of God?

- I. Introduction and Background: Judges is a sad account of disobedience, idolatry, murder, unauthorized worship, unauthroized ordination of a priest, gang rape, dismemberment, war between the tribes, and mass kidnapping. And Judges 2:1-4
  - A. Genre: The genre of Judges is historical.
- B. Date: from 1375-1092 BC. (approx 280 years). Most of the book was likely written by David's time (1010–970 B.C.).
  - C. Author: The authorship of Judges is anonymous.
  - D. These judges were nothing like we think of modern day judges.
