Dear Friends,

Lent, Holy Week, Easter, the Tours, tax season – they are all behind us, and we are into the last push, the final month or so before summer schedules begin. A third of 2011 is gone, and it seems a good time to reflect on *where* that third of a year went. Will you think with me for a moment about where we've invested our time over the last 18 weeks (about 1,900 waking hours)?

Prince George parish has offered roughly 160 hours of “content” for her parishioners over the past 18 weeks – an average of roughly 9 hours a week, including one service on Sunday (we assume you'd only go to one), plus the mid-week services; plus men's or women's Bible or book studies, plus other adult classes; plus Holy Week services and the Lenten suppers; but *not* including the many volunteer hours available to all. So – if a person participated *extremely* fully in the offerings of the parish for worship and study, plus Holy Week, that would be roughly 8% of their waking time (160 hours out of 1,900 hours). Figuring most are below this level (9 hours a week is a lot!), but adding in time for private devotions and other Christian service, I suspect we're all still short of *a tithe* of our time to the Lord.

My point is not, however, about tithing our time to God. My point is: how are we using the other 90%? Do we even think about it? In a prior life, I had to record in 10 minute increments my workday time, whether spent on client work, office administration, travel, business development, continuing education, or whatever. At the end of the month, I received a summary showing where every bit of my time had been spent over the last month. It was always startling, always a surprise, to see where the month really went. I would think I hardly did anything on a matter, and find I'd spent 25 hours on it; I'd think administration had been huge that month and find it was only 4 hours. It works with money too – keep track for a few months of where every dollar is spent. It is always a shock – eating out cost \$700 last month! Or, we spent \$400 on gasoline! Or \$500 on clothing! Most often: there's \$400 missing last month – can't tell where we spent it.

What would we find if we started tracking our time? Of course you parents with kids at home will log a huge hours, and rightly so, on their proper raising and nurture. Wage earners will find, and rightly so, the job consumed 50–60 hours of time each week (gone forever is the 40 hour work-week). But what else would we see? Church/“God” activity: 8 hours a month? 6? Television: 10 hours a week? According to A.C. Nielsen Co., the average American watches more than 4 hours of TV a day, or *28 hours* a week. What would your record show? Other leisure activities – sports, games, movies, parties, dining out, time at the bar? Leisure is great – but what if it adds up to 10 hours a week, while “God” gets 4 or 5 hours a month?

Someone wise said: If you want to understand your priorities, study your calendar and your bank statement. I'm refining that proverb a bit by suggesting that we could understand a lot about our beliefs, about what we really value in life, by keeping track of where we spend our minutes and hours. We need to recognize that as Christians *all* our time is the Lord's, as all our money is His money. We are stewards – we manage assets, resources, belonging to the Owner. He has given us this life to be used for Him, for the spread of the Gospel of Jesus to the world. One day we'll go over the record with Him, where we spent our days and hours. You need not use the “content” Prince George offers – but I urge us all, for heaven's sake, to be good stewards of what the Lord has given us. Do you know where you spent the last 4 months?

NEW ADULT EDUCATION

We gave further consideration to a formal employment contract with the rector, and we discussed expense reduction steps we could take with regard to grounds, maintenance and cleaning. The growth of the “Children's Church” during the 9 o'clock service was also considered, along with the corresponding decrease in Sunday School attendance at 10:10 am. We also discussed some general principles regarding qualifications for the parish secretary position, in the event that position becomes vacant.

Women's Monday Noon Bible Study



NOTES FROM THE CHOIR LOFT

Lives that match our profession

In preparing for Holy Week and Easter some of the staff have been discussing the contrast between our behavior and that of the disciples and other 'great' Christians. Our behavior is a reflection of what we believe, and as we have compared our lives in recent weeks, we have been challenged to a much deeper commitment.

Despite their 'slow start' on Easter morning and initial failure to grasp the depth of Christ's love in His atoning death, and the reality and power of the resurrection – the disciples met together behind closed doors for fear of the Jews, and returned to their old homes and ways of life rather than urgently declaring the good news – when they personally encountered the risen Christ, their lives were changed forever. It's not that they never made a mistake, never wavered and never sinned, but they were passionate to be about God's business of building the Kingdom, and were open to the leading and correction of the Holy Spirit, especially once they had received the empowering of the Holy Spirit in a new way at Pentecost.

Compare them with us. Have we met and surrendered to Jesus Christ, crucified and risen, or are we just adherents, even addicts, to church culture or social standing? Are our lives focused on doing His will alone, or have we compartmentalized our faith and avoided total dedication? Are we prepared to give up everything for the sake of the Kingdom of God, or do we content ourselves with a tithe (or less) and giving up a luxury for Lent? Are we so overwhelmed by Christ's love for us that we want nothing more than to bring others to Him, or are we scared of what other people might think, so we say and do nothing? Do we really comprehend the cost of our salvation and it's value to us, or do we continue to make excuses for our sin and try to find escape clauses for our behavior? Do we run the race for the prize set before us, persevere for the sake of the Gospel, or do we allow small knocks to stop us in our tracks?

Can we say with the apostle Paul:

... whatever was to my profit I now consider loss for the sake of Christ. What is more, I consider everything a loss compared to the surpassing

greatness of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whose sake I have lost all things. I consider them rubbish, that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which is through faith in Christ - the righteousness that comes from God and is by faith. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the fellowship of sharing in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, and so, somehow, to attain to his resurrection from the dead. Phil 3: 7 - 11

If Christ can 'burst His three day prison', he can surely burst into our lives, but this side of His return in glory, he won't break down the door to our hearts. Instead, Jesus says:

Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me. Rev 3: 22

There is a tendency to take that verse out of it's context and apply it as a call to those outside the church, but it is a promise which comes after a warning to those inside the church who claim to be believers:

These are the words of the Amen, the faithful and true witness, the ruler of God's creation. I know your deeds, that you are neither cold nor hot. I wish you were either one or the other! So, because you are lukewarm - neither hot nor cold - I am about to spit you out of my mouth. You say, 'I am rich; I have acquired wealth and do not need a thing.' But you do not realize that you are wretched, pitiful, poor, blind and naked. I counsel you to buy from me gold refined in the fire, so you can become rich; and white clothes to wear, so you can cover your shameful nakedness; and salve to put on your eyes, so you can see. Those whom I love I rebuke and discipline. So be earnest and repent. Rev 3: 14 - 19

We need to hear His invitation again, listen for Christ's knock on the door of our lives, open it wide and invite Him inside. We need to look again at the Cross and Resurrection, and live in the reality of what he has done for us.

“Come, all you who are thirsty, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without cost. Why spend money on what is not bread, and your labor on what does not satisfy? Listen, listen to me, and eat what is good, and you will delight in the richest of fare. Give ear and come to me; listen, that you may live.

Seek the LORD while he may be found; call on him while he is near. Let the wicked forsake their ways and the unrighteous their thoughts. Let them turn to the LORD, and he will have mercy on them, and to our God, for he will freely pardon.

You will go out in joy and be led forth in peace; the mountains and hills will burst into song before you, and all the trees of the field will clap their hands. Instead of the thornbush will grow the juniper, and instead of briers the myrtle will grow. This will be for the LORD's renown, for an everlasting sign, that will endure forever.”

Isaiah 55: 1 – 2, 6 – 7, 12 – 13.

What promises – to us if we will allow Him in and for His glory as we do so. Then maybe we can sing without fear and with all our hearts:

*Living He loved me, dying He saved me,
Buried He carried my sins far away;
Rising He justified freely forever,
One day He's coming, O glorious day!*

We have had a great month thinking about our Savior. The youth group enjoyed folding palm crosses for the start of holy week and then we turned to the culmination of our fast in Holy Week. We remembered with the world Christ's entry into Jerusalem and His last meal with the disciples before His horrific death and majestic resurrection. Christ has walked a path that we could not walk. Only hell and judgment were on the horizon before Jesus rose from the dead.

No matter how hard we try to make it up to God, humanity cannot save itself. Jesus had to walk that path before us making the way back to God. Christ reconciled the world to Himself not Himself to the world. We can be bought back into His life. Redemption is a matter of trusting in the power of the saving love of Christ and making covenant with Him. Are we not then baptized into Christ's death and resurrection? Are we not joined to Him in the path He walked? We spent time remembering who our God is and what He has done for us. After remembering, do we believe and trust in this way? Is our faith truly in the life of God?

It seems to me, Sunday is the day that brings together what we remembered in Holy Week. Sunday we are invited to Christ's table and to feed on Him, to receive Him in our hearts, and to walk with our own sacrifice to God. We know we cannot trust ourselves and desperately need the love poured out for us. The Eucharist is God inviting us to His temple and join with Him in the sacrifice. We are to bring with us the real sin offering of all our brokenness, shame, guilt, sin and un-forgiveness, while trusting Him with our hearts.

God pursues us but does not force us to let go of these things. He walked the path out of love for you. The work is finished on the cross; will you reject that love? When we let go and allow Christ crucified into our hearts we can experience the good gift of heaven. There is something that is very Godlike when it comes to letting go. Jesus displays the glory of God on the cross in a place where mercy and justice meet. It's in this extravagant love that we ourselves can start to walk in the footsteps of a life poured out. It is only in this place that we can see life come from this brokenness. Are we not called, named after our Savior? Should not people see His way in us? Maybe you are a good gift that can bring Christ into someone's pain. Maybe you are a good gift that can transform someone's darkness into light. Maybe you just need to receive that good gift and be restored to Him in your own sacrifice. It is my prayer that what we remember in Holy Week would resound sweetly, restoring all that is out of tune with the Creator.
