I need to use this space this month to bring you up to date on matters of interest to our parish. First, we have begun to look for an assistant rector. The Diocese provided names of two candidates for our position, and I have interviewed one by phone and the other several times in person, including a trip here to visit the church and meet some of you and the staff. We are going to meet the other (my phone interviewee) during the week of November 14 when he returns to South Carolina for our clergy conference. I have also posted our position description at two seminaries on their “alumni” websites – so far no responses there. It would be great to have a new priest on board before Christmas, but that seems unlikely at the moment.

Meanwhile, the Morgans have rented a house in Virginia and Kitty and the boys will be moving there to join Andy early this month – an improvement over their original expectation that it might be Christmas or later before Kitty could move. All seems to be going well for Andy at the new church. For further information, check with Jon or Sarah Blamire, who, along with others, are helping Kitty and Andy with this transition and move.

Despite being short one priest, I believe most everything in the parish needing attention or doing is being attended to or done. This has been achieved through the staff taking on increased workloads and hours, as well as through the extra efforts by the vestry and other lay volunteers. We remain excited about our new vision here at Prince George, and you will be hearing more about that, including opportunities to be involved, over the next few months. My work with the Diocese continues to draw me to Charleston for meetings an average of once a week, but most weeks I can combine that with hospital visits to our parishioners there, so the travel time is put to best use. My hearty thanks to all who have pitched in, or offered to help, to make this time of short-handedness both productive and enjoyable. If you become aware of some need in the parish going unmet, please let me or Lauren know – please don’t assume we know and are just too busy! We are not too busy, most of the time, and we probably just did not know about that need.

Finally, at our special adult education session on October 16th, we discussed the so-far “anonymous” charges against Bishop Mark Lawrence which are being investigated by The Episcopal Church’s (TEC’s) Disciplinary Board for Bishops – charges which will likely result in Bp. Mark first being “restricted” (put on leave) by the Presiding Bishop, and then “deposed” (removed from being a TEC bishop) after a trial in TEC’s House of Bishops (HoB). While the time-table for these events is uncertain, recent events suggest that a restriction of our Bishop would come not later than early January 2012, in time for a his trial at the regular HoB meeting in March. I remain convinced that the best plan for us (and for every parish) is to focus on the work to which the Lord has called us, to trust Him in all these matters, and to take whatever steps may be necessary in the meanwhile – which we and the diocese are doing. If you desire further information on these matters, please do not hesitate to call me or come in for a visit. I would love to talk with you!

Stewardship – 2012

You will be receiving shortly a letter from the Stewardship Committee and a pledge card for 2012. Please carefully read over the information presented. You will see that although we are experiencing a short-fall in estimated pledge income for 2011, we have successfully reduced expenses and thus are expecting to end this year with a balanced budget. However, reduced expenditures means reduced ministry, program and outreach for this parish in the year ahead in which we are embarking on a new vision. Accordingly, the Stewardship Committee and Vestry ask that you prayerfully consider your pledge for 2012, and increase it as may be possible for you over your giving in prior years. Every pledge makes a difference, both to the parish and in the heart of the giver.

Here is a simple chart to help you see where your giving fits into our financial picture:

Vestry Nominations Needed

The wardens and vestry of Prince George meet monthly to share in the spiritual leadership of the parish as well as to make financial and business decisions for the church, and to confer on matters of worship and program.

Each year at this time we request nominations from the congregation for the election of wardens and vestry to be held at the January annual meeting. The senior and junior wardens are elected for one-year terms, and may be re-elected for second terms. The vestry has nine members, with staggered terms of three years. This year Dave Starnes (senior warden), Laura Gates, Scott Marlowe, Andy Roberts and Andy Crocker (junior warden) will rotate off the vestry; they also make up the nominating committee for the upcoming election. Because Dave Starnes and Andy Crocker have served two years as senior and junior warden respectively, they are ineligible for election to the vestry until January, 2013.

Please prayerfully consider members of the church you believe would make good wardens or vestry members and submit their names to the nominating committee **no later than December 10th**. Profiles of the nominees will be available prior to the annual meeting, which will be on Sunday afternoon, January, 15th.


Guest Preacher, Sunday, November 13th - Bishop Michael Nazir-Ali

NOTES FROM THE CHOIR LOFT

They will know we are Christians by . . .

- . . . the clothes we wear?
- . . . our building?
- . . . the design on our denominational flag?
- . . . our liturgy?
- . . . the style of our music?
- . . . the number of times we attend worship?

At best they might be an indicator, but they're all 'fakable' externals, and indeed even potential idols. Jesus tells us something else. In John 13 we read:

“A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.”

Later in Chapter 17, John records Jesus' words:

“My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me. I have given them the glory that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one: I in them and you in me. May they be brought to complete unity to let the world know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me.”

The key to our recognition as Jesus' followers is love, and especially love for each other. True Christian love cannot be faked, because only when we are rooted in the Father's love can that love flow through us to others. If we try to love in our own strength eventually we will fail.

Read again what the apostle John wrote, and ponder the interaction between God's love and ours. Let it speak your heart, bringing comfort, encouragement and maybe some correction:

Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not

love does not know God, because God is love. This is how God showed his love among us: He sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him. This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins. Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete in us.

We know that we live in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and testify that the Father has sent his Son to be the Savior of the world. If anyone acknowledges that Jesus is the Son of God, God lives in him and he in God. And so we know and rely on the love God has for us.

God is love. Whoever lives in love lives in God, and God in him. In this way, love is made complete among us so that we will have confidence on the day of judgment, because in this world we are like him. There is no fear in love. But perfect love drives out fear, because fear has to do with punishment. The one who fears is not made perfect in love.

We love because he first loved us. If anyone says, "I love God," yet hates his brother, he is a liar. For anyone who does not love his brother, whom he has seen, cannot love God, whom he has not seen. And he has given us this command: Whoever loves God must also love his brother.

The church is God's 'love workshop'. It's the place where we learn of the love of God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It's also where we learn to receive His love through our brothers and sisters. And it's the place, too, where we express the love God gives us back to Him in worship and service of others.

What we experience in worship as the gathered body of Christ is to be lived out day by day. Live to love!

YOUTH NEWS

Chelsea and I have started watching a TV show called “House”. In a recent episode, there was a man who left his family because he viewed the needs of the world as more important than those of his wife and children. He was extremely rich and gave most of his wealth away, and left a simple amount for his family to live on. As the plot developed, he was willing to give more and more of himself, making statements like, ‘when the risk of an operation is 100-1, how can I value myself a hundred times more than another person?’ Curiously, Jesus has made statements that have been interpreted by many to be similar. In Matthew 8, Jesus says “Follow me, let the dead bury their own.” In Luke 14:26, He says, “If anyone comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters—yes, even their own life—such a person cannot be my disciple.” Again in Matthew 10:34, He says “Do not suppose that I have come to bring peace to the earth. I did not come to bring peace, but a sword. For I have come to turn a man against his father, a daughter against her mother, a daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law- a man’s enemies will be the members of his own household.” And finally, Luke 12:52 says, “from now on there will be five in one family divided against each other, three against two and two against three.”

Is Jesus calling us to this altruistic sort of life beyond the inherited social customs into a scientifically evolved society? Whatever you think about inherited social culture, and the possibility of objective reasoning for life values, it would seem confusing that Jesus, being God the Son, would be against families and family structure, which was considered, after God, to be the most important thing in society. The Jewish society in Jesus’ day was patriarchal. What the father said mattered most in the family. The whole family was identified by the father. It is more likely to understand Jesus in his context, than in any modern way. In Matthew 12, someone approached Jesus and told him that his mother and brothers wanted to speak with him. Jesus replied, “Who is my mother, and who are my brothers?” Pointing to his disciples, he said, “Here are my mother and my brothers.” The paradigm that Jesus seems to be talking about when creating divisions between families is one of a different allegiance. He is speaking of an entry into a family under a different father- a Heavenly Father- his Father. It was a whole new way of thinking and a whole new reality. You may have heard the term ‘born again’. Jesus says in John 3:5, that no one can enter the kingdom of heaven without being born again. So, we are to see ourselves primarily in God’s family, and we are spiritually born into this new family. In Ephesians 2:19, it says, “Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God’s people and also members of his household.” We are part of the same family. Hebrews 2:11 also says, “Both the one who makes people holy and those who are made holy are of the same family. So Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters.” It is in this family that Jesus calls us to pray the Lord’s prayer- ‘Our Father’. Jesus is challenging this patriarchal culture to see themselves not in the identity of their father or their blood family, but in their new spiritual family.

But does this allow us to deny our actual family? Is it a selfless altruism that has no boundaries- no preferences? The altruistic actions of the man in the TV show was elevated to be ‘too good to be true’, and it was his selfishness that they viewed as lacking in not caring for his family. However, in the family of God, there is a responsibility. 1 Timothy 5:8 says, “Anyone who does not provide for their relatives, and especially for their own household, has denied the faith and is worse than an unbeliever.” In fact, God sets up the responsibility of looking after our families as the main structure for society. In a society where everyone must follow what the father says, Jesus is bringing a hard message that would bring divisions in families. We are called to see ourselves in our new family first, but that does not allow us to forsake our given family. We should not use Jesus’ words as an excuse to neglect our families. But instead, we should live as true examples of what it looks like to live in a true kingdom family, and invite those who disagree to come and see the beauty of God’s family and showing them the beauty of Christ crucified in our lives.
