



Your Labor is Not In Vain In Memoriam: Donald Frueh

the gospel from the first day until now" (Phil. 1:3-5).

Don had been a part of PLM as an organization from its earliest days in the late 1990s, and although a partnership with the gospel can take many different forms, Don seemed to encapsulate them all.

When Don passed away in March, I had the great honor of serving at his funeral and committal, days before the start of Holy Week. Don, always organized, had chosen hymns and Scripture to be included in his

funeral, and he proved to be encouraging of our work in Philadelphia to the very end by choosing I Corinthians 15:54-58, which concludes, "Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord *your labor is not in vain.*" With these words echoing in my ears, we committed Don to the ground on a hill overlooking Philadelphia, where he will rest until Christ's return.

Don Frueh lived according to his confirmation verse: "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith" (II Tim. 4:7). He worked tirelessly and strove to

encourage others in the race. Th roughout his life, he reflected his faith in Christ's work on our behalf by supporting pastors as they proclaimed the gospel to sinners.

Don was a native of the Philadelphia area, so he understood the true need for the gospel in the city. He was unfailingly gracious in his fi nancial support of the work and in the time he invested, serving as chairman of the board over the years and overseeing a number of labor intensive projects. Even more, he personally invested himself emotionally to the end goal of proclamation of liberty in Christ.

He encouraged pastors to be busy about Christ's work, carrying His atoning

message to sinners. The same grace he received from our Lord he showed to pastors as they proclaimed Christ's Word in an area underserved by the LC-MS.

Don's wife Wilma kindly let us borrow Don for all sorts of things. He would meet me in coffee shops to talk things over, to such an extent that Wilma called Starbucks his other office. She and Don had already made plans to watch the Concordia St. Louis Seminary vicarage placement service, excitedly anticipating the next vicar that would

assist us in Philadelphia. Being able to host vicars and see future pastors being formed was a special joy to him.



We share the same confidence Don held, that "he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ" (Phil. 1:6). On that day of Jesus Christ, we will be reunited in the resurrection with our brother and friend.

Casting Nets

The first sermon that I ever preached during my time as Vicar for Philadelphia Lutheran Ministries was on Luke 5:1-11. The text reads, "[Jesus] said to Simon, 'Put out into the deep and let down your nets for a catch.' And Simon answered, 'Master, we toiled all night and took nothing! But at your

word I will let down the nets.' And when they had done this, they enclosed a large number of fish, and their nets were breaking."

Jesus' words to Peter stand at the heart of the mission and work of PLM. He commanded Peter to do two things. First, he is to put his boat out into the deep. The Church is to go out into all the world. It is to be among all people wherever they may live. Our nation's cities are not to be neglected. Second, Peter is to let down his nets for a catch. From the Church, the nets of the gospel go forth through the preaching of the word and the administration of the sacraments to bring all who are called safely into God's kingdom. It is not enough for Peter to put his boat out into the deep. He must also cast the nets. The gospel must be proclaimed in the city.

This task of bringing in a catch is not easy; we cannot accomplish it on our own. Peter's response to Jesus encapsulates the fear and stress of many working in the mission fi eld: "Master, we toiled all night and took nothing." We as individuals are not capable of converting anyone to the faith. This is the work of the Holy Spirit, who, as Luther put it in the Small Catechism "calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian Church on earth and keeps it in the one true faith." All Peter can do is trust in the word of Jesus, that the gospel will not return void but accomplish the purpose for which it was sent. At Jesus' bidding the Church goes into the deep of the world and proclaims the good news. No matter how foolish or impractical it may seem, through the proclamation of the gospel the nets are filled.

I am very grateful for my time in Philadelphia and the opportunities given to me by Pastor Kieselowsky to preach God's word. It seems only fitting that Luke 5:1-11 will also be the text for my last sermon as my time in the city comes to a close. Please continue to pray for the work being done in Philadelphia, that the nets of God' word may bring many safely into the boar, the church.
