





What is the foundation of church unity?

John 17 & Unity in the Godhead






John 17:6-23

- We (the people in Christ, then and now, vv. 9, 20) are "in the world" – we are sojourners (vv. 14-18)
- Thus, there is the need to maintain unity!
- Purpose: to manifest Christ in the world (vv. 21, 23)
- Jesus prays, "they may be one, even as we are one." - This is the standard of the church's unity (v. 23)
- "Perfectly one" (v. 23) is attained through sanctification in the truth (Word of God vv. 14-19)

"This is vastly more - deeply more - than being related through a common organization." - Piper



- The Church is not a Human Organization – Christ is the Head of the Church (Eph 2:19-22)
 - Unity is grounded in a shared fellowship with the Eternal Godhead (v. 21)
 - As we are sanctified in the truth, the evil that seeks to undermine our unity becomes weaker
 - As we practice unity, the church more perfectly manifests and glorifies
 Christ – the aims of church unity

POSITIONALLY

The Church is united by their position in Christ and fellowship with the Spirit

Position in Christ


- Ephesians 2:1-22
- We are seated with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus." (v. 2:6)
- "For through him, both (Jew and Gentile) have access in one Spirit to the Father." (v. 18)
- Being United in Christ means that we have a unity that is wholly independent of our own preferences (1st Corinthians 1:13)
- "The catholic or universal church, which is invisible, consists
 of the whole number of the elect, that have been, are, or
 shall be gathered into one, under Christ the head thereof;
 and is the spouse, the body, the fullness of him that filleth all
 in all" Westminster Confession

[&]quot;Perhaps the greatest weakness in the Christian church is that we fail to realize who we are in Christ." – Dr. Martyn Lloyd Jones

Unity in the Spirit

- Ephesians 4:1-6
- The "unity of the Spirit" is not generated or developed. It is "maintained" (v. 3)
- Unity is Spirit given!
- "The human task is not to achieve unity among themselves, but to keep the unity already created [in Christ]." – Everett Ferguson
- We are a people united and pursuing unity (pursuing the perfect unity that Christ spoke of in John 17!)

Our unity is grounded in the "oneness" established by Christ our Head Ephesians 4:4-6



Humbleness in Roles

- Ephesians 4:7
- 1st Corinthians 12:4-31
- Same Spirit, same Lord, same God (vv.6-7)
- The body is not created by man, but is knit together by God Himself (v. 13)
- God Himself has also arranged the members of the body (v. 18)
- God Himself has given equal honor to all in the body so that there should be no division (vv. 24-25)

God has firmly established unity
The Church must strive to maintain it!

"We, in conservative Christian circles, have vigorously maintained the message of the gospel but, at least in some areas and among some movements, have begun to lose any profound grasp of the community of Christ. We have rightly said that a relationship with God is a personal matter. In our context, though, it has become but a step, and a step many of us have unthinkingly taken, to acquiesce that a relationship with God is a purely individual matter. This is practical heterodoxy. Jesus said you can identify his disciples by the kind of relationship they have with one another, by the "love" they have for one another." – Josh Moody
