On Sunday, September 15th, Pastor Sternberg and his family were with us in worship (after a long, almost week-long, trip from the state of Oregon) and we were pleased to be able to personally welcome them to St. Paul's. Pastor Timothy is married to Allison, and they have four boys.

The oldest of the Sternberg's sons is Gabriel. He is 18 and will be studying piano and composition this fall at Western Oregon University. Their second son is Joshua, who is 16, and enjoys business. Next is Benjamin who is 14. He is the artist of the family and will start high school this year. Samuel is the youngest at the age of 12. Hopefully, you will get an opportunity to introduce yourself to them soon — if you haven't already.

The date of Pastor Tim's Installation Service is unknown at this writing. We are still working with the LCMC to set that up. Watch for more information that will, hopefully, be coming soon.

October Message from Pastor Tim

To God's chosen sons and daughters at St. Paul's Lutheran in Maumee:

May the love of God our Father be continually revealed to you through the peace that Jesus our Lord has made by his death and resurrection.

I write this as I travel to you and I am filled with many thoughts and feelings. In a way I feel like Abram who was called out of his home to a land he had never seen. I feel like Paul who spent 14 years in the regions of Syria and Cilicia. I feel like Timothy, charged with the preaching and teaching of the Gospel. Our great God has, after 14 years, opened a new opportunity for preaching and teaching in His Name and for his glory.

It is in the Name of the Lord, brothers and sisters in Christ, that I come proclaiming to you the true testimony, and nothing but the true witness, of Jesus Christ and him crucified. And I, like the apostle Paul, come to you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling begging God to demonstrate his Spirit and power so that your faith will rest not in my wisdom but in the power of God. It is in the power of God that we walk forward together, following in the footprints of Jesus. Where those footprints lead we don't specifically know. We do know that they may lead to suffering together. As that suffering comes as a result of the Name of Jesus, we will rejoice together, along with Peter and John and the first Christians and we will pray, *"Lord, look upon their threats and grant to your servants to continue to speak your word with all boldness, while you stretch out your hand to heal, and signs and wonders are performed through the name of your holy servant Jesus."* We do know that the footprints of Jesus will lead to new opportunities to love people, both in word and in actions. Our Lord tells us plainly, *"You always have the poor with you, and whenever you want, you can do good for them."* Together we can do the good of feeding, welcoming, clothing, and visiting. The footprints of Jesus will lead us to new places in the Bible because walking in the manner worthy of the Lord and bearing fruit is only possible if we remain rooted - deeply, passionately, actively, resolutely, daily - in the Bible. *"If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you."*

To begin our walk together I'd like to invite everyone to share their story of God's love with me over a cup of coffee or tea. Health Matters

"Dear friends, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have confidence before God and receive from him anything we ask, because we obey his commands and do what pleases him." 1JN 3:21-22


More and more, I have come to appreciate this passage in recent years. It seems to me so much of life is about our perspective on the circumstances we face. I've noticed that being in close relationship with God each and every day has such a dramatic impact on how I think and feel. I know that if I am having a case of the "guilties" about something inappropriate I may have said or done, afterward, for a spell at least, I'm not nearly as quick to seek to be in God's presence through prayer, to the extent I should be.

Shortly thereafter, I eventually remember that God had been present all along anyway. Nevertheless, there is a definite period of time when as a result of my action or inaction, I do tend to be much more hesitant in asking for God's blessings or direction in prayer. And a prayer not prayed, is a prayer not answered.

From a health vantage, for me the *key* word in the passage above is "heart." How do I get this confidence the Scripture speaks of that enables me a prayer life that is *highly* effective if my heart isn't right with God? I think it may well start with one's heart, and whether or not we choose to regularly spend priority time with and focus on the Lord and his Word in our daily lives.

By doing so, we help make sure that our primary focus in our living is *not* merely the culture and the world around us. It becomes much more about God's Word and then our relationship with Him through an enhanced prayer-life

I think having our prayers answered includes a commitment on our part, too, that leads our behavioral responses toward loving God and each other even more, in obedience to God's Word.



Yes it's heart work and requires a challenging disciplined lifestyle, but I believe it is oh, so worth it. Perhaps with me you are inclined this month *to re-commit your heart to the Lord* in some way as well. In the faith He provides us we are to trust and obey Him through the empowerment of his Spirit. As our hearts align with knowing and doing His will, a brand new **confidence** in our relationship with God is bound to flourish, along with answered prayer beyond our dreams. How about it? Are you with me? Are you willing to give it a try?

Pillars of the faith

Because Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses, or thoughts, to a church door in Wittenberg, Germany, on October 31, 1517, many Christians remember that day and the major changes, or Reformation, that resulted.

Luther's theses contained three main pillars, which have stood for more than 500 years:

1. Sola Scriptura (Scripture Alone) - The Bible is the sole authority in matters of faith, life and conduct. "All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness" (2 Timothy 3:16, NRSV).

2. Sola Fide (Faith Alone) - Christians are justified, or declared righteous, only through believing in Jesus Christ as Savior. Although morality and good works are important, they alone cannot lead to salvation. "A person is justified not by the works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ" (Galatians 2:16, NRSV).

3. Sola Gratia (Grace Alone) - Grace is God's unmerited, or undeserved, favor. Salvation is a free gift from our gracious God. "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God - not the result of works, so that no one may boast" (Ephesians 2:8-9, NRSV).

Trail Mix

This portable snack combines favorite fall flavors.



What you need:

- 1/4 cup maple syrup
- 1 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- 2/3 cup pecan pieces
- 1/3 cup roasted pumpkin seeds
- 1/3 cup almonds
- 1/4 cup raisins
- 2/3 cup dried fruit (any)


What you do:

1. Microwave syrup, spices, seeds and nuts for 30 seconds at a time, stirring frequently, until mixture thickens.
2. Spread the mixture on a baking sheet lined with wax paper. Let cool and harden.
3. Break the candied nuts into chunks. Combine with dried fruit.
4. Store in airtight container.


Christian symbol: Fortress

The tower, or fortress, is a symbol that, in the words of Psalm 46:1, "God is our refuge and strength."

Martin Luther used this psalm as the basis for his hymn "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God."

The tower or fortress may also represent Saint Barbara, an early Christian martyr, who ordered that her tower be built with three windows instead of two to signify the Trinity.

Another scripture reads "But the LORD has become my fortress, and my God the rock in whom I take refuge" (Psalm 94:22, NIV).
