What if we lived in a strange place where each day we were allowed to have \$86,400 but we were not allowed to save a penny of it. By midnight we would be broke again. But when the new day dawned, we would

have another \$86,400 to spend. We would know that by midnight we would be broke again.

Sounds crazy, doesn't it? In an article about our use of time, Ken Sopher suggested that we each have 86,400 seconds daily to do whatever we choose to do. We cannot "save" even one of those thousands of seconds to use in the future. If we do not use the seconds and minutes and hours productively and creatively as good stewards of the time God gives us, those 24 hours are lost forever.

Makes you think, doesn't it? For some, it may bring to mind St. Paul's words to the Ephesians: "Be careful then how you live," he wrote, "not as unwise people but as wise, making the most of the time ..." (Ephesians 5:15). Time is indeed quite precious.

What now?

You might hope that Satan is getting tired of doing his giddy-dance. You know the one - where Satan twirls and bounces and pumps his fists in joy over infecting so many people with spasms of fear.

But Satan doesn't get tired of his dancing. Just the opposite. Every time a human being looks to science or government for ultimate answers and protection, Satan gets reenergized. Every single second of terrorizing, speculating, rumor-spreading is another power-vitamin for his evil heart. And when a child of God, a chosen son or daughter of the King of Kings passes on the peace of God, or the hope of God, or the wisdom of God, or the healing of God, or the goodness of God, well - that's fireworks celebration for the whole of the demonic realm.


Are you tired of doing your praise-God dance? You know the one. We first learned how to do it from Paul and Silas. They had preached Jesus and cast out a demon. Then they were attacked by rioting crowds, beaten with rods, thrown into the darkest part of the prison, and had their feet cuffed to huge blocks of wood. But did they quiver in fear? Hardly. Did they fall into speculating about what terrible thing might happen to them next? Nah. "About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them." (Acts 16.22)

Like Paul and Silas, we don't wake up each day wondering what terrible thing might happen to us today. "If we live, we live for the Lord; if we die, we die for the Lord. Therefore, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's. It is for this reason Christ died and returned to life: so that he may be the Lord of both the dead and the living." (Romans 14.8-9)

We do our praise-God dance all the time - not worrying about if we will live through the day or not - because it's all for our Lord Jesus. All of our time, all of our thoughts, all of our treasures; they are for just One person. We are not "What now?" people. We are "Jesus Now!" people.

So what if the vaccine helps? So what if it doesn't? I'm still a "Jesus Now!" person. So what if the media vomits another rumor? I'm still a "Jesus Now!" person. So what if I stumbled for a moment and needed to repent and turn again to God? I'm still a "Jesus Now!" person. So what if the government finds a new way to oppress the church? I'm still a "Jesus Now!" person.

Love in action

Martin Luther King Jr., whose life and legacy we honor this month, spoke often about the power of love. In fact, he equated the practice of nonviolence with “absolute commitment to the way of love.”

Love, declared the minister and activist, “is the only force capable of transforming an enemy into a friend.” And, he said, anyone who’s “devoid of the power to love” is “devoid of the power to forgive.”

King distinguished between true love and “empty sentimentalism,” however. He taught — and showed — that love is “the active outpouring of one’s whole being into the being of another.”

Jesus’ sacrifice on the cross is the ultimate “active outpouring” of love, and we can choose to follow his example daily.

“Because of Calvary I’m free to choose,” writes Max Lucado in *When God Whispers Your Name*. “No occasion justifies hatred; no injustice warrants bitterness. I choose love. Today I will love God and what God loves.”




Epiphany's significance

The church season of Epiphany begins on January 6 each year. The name comes from the Greek word *epiphaneia*, meaning "to appear, to show or to manifest." The ending date of the Epiphany season is determined by Ash Wednesday, which is determined by the date of Easter.

Traditionally, Epiphany Day marks the arrival of the Magi, or wise men, to worship the infant Jesus. The significance of Epiphany for Christians is that it symbolizes the first recognition of Christ by Gentiles, or non-Jews.

The season of Epiphany emphasizes the divine nature of Jesus, the light of the world. Symbols for the season include light, a star and the color green, which represents life, growth, hope and eternity.



A COLORFUL body

Melt crayons to show how the body of Christ works together.



What you need:

- Crayons
- Metal baking sheet
- Adult help
- Metal gingerbread man cookie cutter

What you do:


1. Remove labels and break crayons into 1-inch pieces.
2. Scatter pieces on the baking sheet, about two layers thick.
3. Bake for 10 minutes at 350 degrees until melted. Allow to cool 15 minutes.
4. When melted crayons are the consistency of playdough, press the cookie cutter through them (while still on pan).
5. Cool the pan in freezer for 15 minutes until crayons are hardened.
6. Remove from pan and break apart the shapes.
