At the close of this moving Service of Darkness, worshippers leave in silence to ponder the impact of Christ's death and await the celebration of the coming Resurrection.

We will rejoice and celebrate the resurrection at our **Easter Services on Sunday, April 4!**

Worship will be at 8:30 am (Traditional) and 10:30 am (Modern).



### Children's Ministry News

## April message from Pastor Tim



What do you see in the face of Jesus?  
Does his anger in his house embarrass you?  
Is there sorrow? Agony?  
Do you see the love he commanded you  
to imitate?  
Is the weight of your sin etched in his skin?  
Are you offended by his refusal to condemn  
his enemies?  
Do you turn from his gaze when your failure  
is revealed?  
Is his dripping blood too much to stomach?  
Is his cold corpse a grief too much to bear?

This is what we see in the face of Jesus during Holy Week. Therefore, Holy Week is holy for us. We set aside (we hallow / we keep holy) the days from Palm Sunday to Resurrection Sunday. We do this because each day, and each story of Jesus, is special. The Gospel writers recognized this. Believers continue to witness this truth.

What do you see in the resurrected face of Jesus?  
He has no longer set his face to suffer and die.  
He has seen death's darkness.  
His face looks different and new somehow.  
One moment you see him and the next he is gone.  
He sees you now as his friend.  
His face shines as the sun unveiled in glory.

This is what we see in the face of the resurrected Jesus. He is the radiance of the glory of God and the exact imprint of his nature, and he upholds the universe by the word of his power. After making purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Father in heaven.

And we all, with unveiled faces reflecting the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same likeness from one degree of glory to another.

What do you see in the mirror?  
Are you seeing less and less of your face and more and more of Jesus face?  
Is the light brighter and brighter in you each passing day?  
Does freedom, given by the Spirit of Jesus, radiate from you?

Dear Christian, the resurrection has happened! We are on our way to an eternal glory beyond all comparison. We carry in our body the death of Jesus so that the life of Jesus may be revealed in our face. We will be raised from death and brought into the presence of God our Father. Hallelujah! Christ is Risen!

## Seder Dinner Worship service planned for Maundy Thursday

*“This is a day you are to commemorate; for generations to come you shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord—a lasting ordinance. ~Exodus 12:14*

We are excited to announce the return of the Seder! Sarah Howard has graciously agreed to come and host a Seder meal like those she has done in the past.

Come take part in a very unique worship service where you will learn, experience, and taste your way through a Seder Dinner Worship Service on Maundy Thursday, April 1, at 6:30 pm. This Jewish tradition of Passover dates back more than 3,500 years and tells the story of redemption of God's people and will tie its connection to the Last Supper and Holy Communion.



So what will that look like in 2021? We are requiring everyone who attends to make reservations no later than March 28th. Families will be grouped at individual tables (NOT one long table as done in prior years) and spaced apart from other tables. If you're a party of one or two, not a problem, we will accommodate smaller groups as well. Food/Drinks/Dinner will be served family-style at your table.

If you want to participate from home, you may come at 5:30 pm and pick up a meal to go. (Reservations for to-go meals are also required and can be made at church or on our website until March 28th.)

## Where was I?

Our young son often asks where he was when something significant happened before he was born. “Where was I when you two got married?” “Where was I when Nana died? And even “Where was I before I was inside your body?”

My response is always “You were in God’s heart.” God said as much to Jeremiah: “Before I formed you in the womb I knew you” (Jer. 1:5).

A Good Friday spiritual asks plaintively, “Were you there when they crucified my Lord?” Clearly none of us was present when Jesus died. Yet as we worship on Good Friday, we place ourselves at the cross, where Jesus bore our sins.

“Where was I,” we might ask our heavenly Father, “when they crucified Jesus?” I’m confident that God’s tender answer is “You were in my heart.” Indeed, only because of our place there did Jesus go willingly to the cross — and rise to assure us of everlasting life.

## Health Matters

***"I trust in thy word."* PS 119:42**


"Just in proportion in which we believe that God will do just what He has said, is our faith strong or weak. Faith has nothing to do with feelings, or with impressions, with improbabilities, or with outward appearances. If we desire to couple them with faith, then we are no longer resting on the Word of God because faith needs nothing of the kind. Faith rests on the naked Word of God. When we take Him at His Word the heart is at peace...Trials are the food of faith."

George Mueller wrote the above reflection. He is one of dozens of contributors to the daily devotional classic entitled *Streams in the Desert*. One of our members brought it to my attention and said she highly recommends it. Occasionally, I have been asked for an additional devotional recommendation apart from my favorite—Sarah Young's, *Jesus Calling*. This may well be a good one for you to check out, as it has very high reviews from multiple sources.

*Streams in the Desert* was reportedly first published in 1925. I noted it is chock full of relevant quotes, thoughts and spiritual inspiration. I read how Mrs. L.B. Cowman was the first to create the collection. She used its contents originally to help sustain and strengthen her faith while she cared for her dying husband overseas. Both she and her husband were long-time missionaries in Japan and China.

*Streams in the Desert* is full of stories of great conviction and wisdom. Our member who brought it to my attention notes that it provided her with significant encouragement for her daily faith walk. I like it because in the midst of today's fast-paced world, it also is the kind of read that causes me to want to slow down, and to more deeply reflect on that which is *truly* most important in my life.

You, too, may want to explore it out and consider reading it alongside your other bible devotionals. Our Lord bless you and your loved ones in this special season focused on the joy of our resurrected Lord, Jesus the Christ. In addition—celebrate too, the rebirth and new growth of Spring! It is upon us...already.

## IMPORTANT building use reminders

Following a year of cancelled meetings and events, we're getting busy again. That's a good thing but it means we can no longer just show up at the church any evening and assume that we can use a particular room because nothing else will be going on at the church. So that there will be no scheduling conflicts, it's time for a reminder to church groups, MATs and external organizations who use space in the church building to **schedule your meetings with the church office.**

The Church Secretary is responsible for scheduling space for **ALL** activities and meetings at the church. Any church group, MAT, or external organization desiring to use space in the church must contact the church secretary during office hours (8:00 am – noon & 1:00 – 4:30 pm, Monday-Friday) at 419-893-0205 or via email to [bjguth@saintpaulsonline.org](mailto:bjguth@saintpaulsonline.org). Requests for repetitive use of the church facilities can also be taken care of in this way. Special events might require the completion of a Building Use Agreement form.

St. Paul's retains the right to cancel any room reservation if it becomes necessary due to an unforeseen church event (e.g. funeral).

Some other important reminders for those who use our space:

1. Clean all tabletops and chairs, if used. Leave room as clean and picked-up as you found it so that it is ready for the next event.
2. Close all windows and turn off lights of the room(s) used.
3. Parents must be responsible for the children that they bring.
4. The church has very limited janitorial service. Trash should be bagged and bags should be taken to the outside dumpster.
5. Please be considerate of other groups meeting in the building.

## Maundy Thursday

The day before Good Friday is called Maundy Thursday. The word “Maundy” comes from the Latin word *mandatum*, which means “commandment.” In the gospel of John, Jesus makes this statement during the Last Supper: “I am with you only a little longer. ... I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another” (John 13:33-35, NRSV).

Maundy Thursday should always be a time of sharing with others, showing loving concern for one another, and partaking of Holy Communion. That is what the Lord asked of his disciples and asks of us.



As a reminder, the cost is \$20.00.


## Stay informed

# SUNRISE SURPRISE

The hidden surprise in these sweet rolls hints at the reason behind Easter's joy.

**What you need:**

- ½ cup chopped pecans
- 10 uncooked frozen rolls, thawed
- 10 large marshmallows
- ½ cup sugar
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- ½ cup melted butter
- ¼ cup brown sugar
- Adult help

**What you do:**


1. Grease a round baking dish. Sprinkle pecans on the bottom.
2. Flatten each roll. Place a marshmallow in the center, wrap dough around it and pinch edges together.
3. Combine sugar and cinnamon. Dip each roll into melted butter and coat with cinnamon-sugar. Place in pan, seam side down.
4. Sprinkle brown sugar and remaining butter over rolls. Cover with plastic wrap and let rise 30 minutes.
5. Bake at 350 degrees until golden brown, about 30 minutes. Cool in pan.
6. As you bite into a roll, you'll see the marshmallow has melted, leaving an empty center – just like Jesus' empty tomb!

**Encourage wonder**

For a new perspective on Bible accounts you've heard over and over, play "I Wonder" with children and adults alike. Similar to "I Spy," it encourages a deeper dive into familiar passages. Simply explore ideas that aren't detailed in the Bible, starting with the phrase "I wonder." For example:

- I wonder if any Roman soldier was standing in the back *not* mocking Jesus (Matthew 27:27-31). If so, what was he thinking as others threw about insults?
- I wonder how long it took Joseph of Arimathea to cut his own tomb out of the rock (Matthew 27:57-60). What did he think about as he worked?
- The day after Jesus' ascension, I wonder which disciple spoke first at breakfast — and what he said.

Scholars may have chimed in on some of these ponderings, but there's likely no right answer. Playing "I Wonder" can help you slow down to really pay attention and experience more of a Bible passage — especially one you seem to know by rote.

Add meaning to this year's Easter celebration by letting your wonder wander during Holy Week. Then continue the practice whenever you're eager to gain new insights on the "old, old story ... of Jesus and his love."
