Keeping the place in shape

The Board of Church Properties makes upgrades to our facilities as part of the regular maintenance program for the benefit of all members of the congregation.

Plumbing fixtures were upgraded in early July. All three toilets in the basement washrooms were replaced with modern low flush units. New taps were installed in both basement

washrooms as well. A new sink and taps were installed in the upstairs washroom. As part of the upgrade Nickel Plumbing replaced the main water shut off valve as well as repairing a leak from a sink shut off. The total cost for the plumbing upgrade was \$2,506.14.

The board replaced all seven downspouts and run outs on the eavestroughing system as part of our preventative maintenance program. The original downspouts were undersized and prone to plugging. Vic's Eavestroughing performed the work in mid-July. The cost for this upgrade including supplies and labour was \$2,102.34.

A passion for music, and it shows

As your editor, I recently spent a delightful hour with Laura Neufeld and Megan Bracewell to talk about music. Words like joy and fun popped up quite often in the conversation. They have a genuine passion for music and for sharing that music with others. Laura noted that being a soloist is not for her. She loves involving others, the more the better.

In the last few months we have been treated to duets on piano and organ, duets on the piano and even four hands, two pianos. And a treat they have been. I asked Laura and Megan how this got started. Laura explained that she had to take some time off this past winter. With time on her hands she got digging around and came up with a binder of 20 – 30 duets. Not a big deal in itself but it proved a turning point for the two of them as she handed the binder to Megan and said something like, here, see what you can do with this.

Laura and Megan agreed that it isn't always easy to find someone to

play with. There needs to be a sense of connection between the two or it just doesn't work well. Playing isn't just notes but also feeling and there is a push and pull between the players. Laura and Megan seem to have found a kindred spirit in each other. They began with a duet or two at Christmas and it just grew from there. Despite connecting well, good music doesn't just happen. They have been rehearsing every Wednesday since Lent began and recently, with the Grand Concert coming up they've also begun rehearsing on Mondays.

So how did each of them get so involved in music, I asked.

Laura grew up in a family very involved with music. Her sisters were ages seven and nine when she was born, and they were already singing in church where their pastor father provided the accompaniment. I suspect that almost from the time she could walk she longed to play the piano. She begged and begged to play at church, but her father kept saying she was too young to do that. By the time she was ten her piano teacher said, "She's ready. Let her play." But she also had an admonition for Laura: remember to play the notes, not what is in your head" because Laura first learned to play by ear. Laura's mother had instructions for her, too: you have to sit still during the service (after all she was only ten). From that point, there was no stopping her, in fact she played for a wedding when she was eleven.

Megan also grew up in a family where music happens often. She says there is always singing and other sorts of music going on in the Timm family. She spent some time singing with Saskatchewan Express and then was a member of the Fireside Singers

for 15 years. While in university she sang with Greystone Singers. Piano lessons began for Megan about the time she was five and, like Laura, she dreamed of playing in church. She wanted to be just like her aunt Jennifer (Timm/Beattie) who was St. Paul's organist at the time. But Megan was shy and on her own would likely not have told anyone that was her dream. One Sunday, however, Laura couldn't be there to play the organ. The pastor said to Megan...you can play the piano; will you fill in for us? Despite stumbling over many notes, she was hooked. Laura began asking her to play one hymn, then two on the piano, then it was on to the organ. It was a gradual thing but somewhere along the way Megan lost her shyness.

It isn't easy getting a full-time teaching job in Saskatoon schools, so Megan began teaching music to supplement her income. Several of her students are members at St. Paul's. Like Laura's encouragement of her, she is encouraging them. The future looks bright for music at St. Paul's.

Our conversation, of course, turned to the Grand Concert they are planning for September 29 to raise money for a new piano. What's wrong with the piano we have, I asked. Well, it seems that while it can be tuned, the tuning doesn't hold and it is very soon out of tune...again. Also, it isn't suited for playing with the organ we have. A new piano would not only stay in tune but sound much better when played with the organ. Explanation can be a little complicated so if you want something clearer, you'll have to chat with Laura or Megan.

Their plan is to move the piano we

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currently own, downstairs.

Is it possible to raise enough funds for the excellent piano they envision? They are confident it is because following the first announcement of the fund-raising concert a significant donation was received from a single individual setting them well on their way to a goal of \$15,000.

Laura and Megan want to acknowledge the concert committee who are assisting them in a variety of ways. There will be pie and coffee downstairs after the concert and Marilyn Wallace has that well in hand. Dianne Gilbert and Clara Zirk are looking after reaching out into the community. Adele Wagner is putting together a PowerPoint to go with the music so consider this a multi-media event. And Cheryl Walter is seeing that all donations are properly handled. The program is wide-ranging and planned to last about an hour and a half. It won't disappoint. Admission is by donation.

If you're interested in singing in the congregational choir, they want you to know that rehearsals will be

Stewardship

What is a steward? Most people will say a steward is a manager.

That is correct, but it is only half right. A steward is indeed a manager, but he is a manager of what does not belong to him. Someone else is the owner, and the steward manages the owner's property on the owner's behalf.

We are God's stewards. Our stewardship is that God has made us managers of what belongs to Him: "For we brought nothing into this world, and we cannot take anything out of the world" (1 Timothy 6:7)

Everything that we have and everything that we are comes from God's fatherly divine goodness and mercy. God is the owner.

This is not only because He created all things; He is also the redeemer. He has redeemed—that is, purchased—and won all things. Therefore, it all belongs to Him.

We are simply managers of everything in this world. Like Joseph in Egypt, we are put in charge of managing what belongs to God. What a privilege.

Think about that for a minute. The all-knowing, all-powerful, all-wise God has asked us to manage his possessions on His behalf here on earth.

And by doing this, He invites us to take part in the

allocation of His good gifts. He wants us to give our input and advise Him in where His gifts are to be used. What a privilege indeed.

But what a responsibility!

"Everyone to whom much was given, of him much will be required" (Luke 12:48b).

We are not the owners. And while He puts us as managers, we are still to do with His property what He wants done with it. That means we need to know what He desires and wills for His property.

How do we know this? How can we know the will and mind of God?

We find the will of God in the Bible. There God tells us what His will is for all His gifts. He tells us how we are to spend our time and use our talents and treasures. He instructs us in the use of our minds, bodies, and souls.

There is nothing we have that doesn't belong to Him. "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body" (1 Corinthians 6:19-20).

God informs us of the big picture, the overarching policy, of how we as His stewards—managers and custodians—are to manage His property.

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Stewardship, continued

And that is stewardship. It is simply doing what God wants us to do with what He has given us.

As St. Paul said, “Do not present your members to sin as instruments for unrighteousness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and your members to God as instruments for righteousness” (Rom. 6:13).

So, let’s dive into God’s Word, and listen to what He desires from His stewards.

Pastor’s Corner

Now that companies like Skip the Dishes and Uber Eats exist, most restaurants offer to have their food delivered to your home. Those who are drivers for these companies have nothing to do with making the food—they simply deliver it. There is some similarity between the work of food delivery drivers and pastors. You could say that pastors are God’s deliverymen.

Rather than tasty tacos and delicious sandwiches, pastors are called by God to deliver His gifts to His people. Like a driver for Skip the Dishes, pastors have nothing to do with making what they deliver—they just bring it to you.

Skip the Dishes drivers deliver the food wrapped in containers that keep it warm and fresh. Pastors deliver God’s gifts “wrapped” in the Word and Sacraments. Through the waters of Holy Baptism, through God’s Word preached, through the true body and blood of Jesus given in Holy Communion, through God’s word of forgiveness spoken in Holy Absolution—God is delivering His gifts to His people.

What are these gifts being delivered to you? Forgiveness for all of your sin and eternal life. Jesus



earned the forgiveness of your sin and your eternal life around two thousand years ago when He became one of us, lived a perfect and holy life, suffered and died on a

cross, and left the tomb alive. All of these years later, all that Christ accomplished for the salvation of the world is delivered to you personally by your pastor through God’s Word and Sacraments.

A driver for Skip the Dishes delivers your food by picking it up at the restaurant and driving it over to you. A pastor delivers God’s gifts through leading the Divine Service on Sundays, teaching Bible studies throughout the week, visiting and bringing God’s gifts to homebound members and those who are sick and injured in the hospital, meeting with engaged couples to plan a wedding, bringing God’s Word of comfort to those mourning the death of a loved one and more. In all a pastor does, his main focus is to deliver the gifts of God to His people.

I feel incredibly blessed to serve you as God’s deliveryman.
