1 Corinthians 7:12-16

Remember to begin your study early in the week so that you have time to really think (and keep thinking) about the passage without being rushed.

❖ Day 1

Read 1 Corinthians 7:12-16.

For these lessons, the sermon text is provided in a format that visually helps display the structure of the paragraph or section of text. The verbs are underlined. The main clauses remain to the left, and the supporting clauses are either directly underneath when they have equal priority to what comes before, or are tabbed to the right when the clause supports, develops or explains previous clauses. Suggested themes in the text are provided in the box on the left.

- I. Marriage to a consenting unbeliever:
 - Stay married
 - 3 benefits:
 - 1. Holiness for spouse
 - 2. Holiness for children
 - 3. Possible salvation of spouse

- II. Marriage to an unconsenting unbeliever:
 - Let them go
 - Called to peace

¹²To the rest I <u>say</u>... that (I, not the Lord)

if any brother <u>has</u> a wife who is an unbeliever, and she consents to live with him,

he should not divorce her.

¹³If any woman <u>has</u> a husband who is an unbeliever, and he consents to live with her,

she should not divorce him.

¹⁴For the unbelieving husband <u>is made</u> holy because of his wife, and the unbelieving wife <u>is made</u> holy because of her husband.

Otherwise your children would be unclean,

but as it is,

they are holy.

¹⁵But if the unbelieving partner separates,

let it be so.

In such cases the brother or sister <u>is</u> not <u>enslaved</u>.

God <u>has called</u> you to peace.

¹⁶For how do you <u>know</u>, wife,

whether you will save your husband?

Or how do you know, husband,

whether you will save your wife?

6.	Does this mean that the unbelieving spouse and children are saved? Explain your answer from the text.
7.	Describe some practical blessings that an unbeliever might experience through marriage to a believer.
