### Hebrews 12:25-29

### ❖ Day 1

Read Hebrews 12:25-29.

For these lessons, the sermon text is provided in a format that visually helps display the structure of the paragraph or section of text. The main verbs are underlined. Commands are double-underlined. Generally, the main indicative clauses remain to the left, and the other clauses are either directly underneath when they have equal priority to what comes before, or are tabbed to the right when the clause supports, develops, or draws a conclusion from a neighboring clause.

#### 25 See to it to it

that you do not <u>refuse</u> Him who is speaking. For if those did not escape when they <u>refused</u> him

who warned them on earth,

much less will we escape who turn away from Him

who warns from heaven.

26 And His voice shook the earth then,

but now He has promised, saying,

"Yet once more I will shake not only the earth,

but also the heaven."

**27** This *expression*, "Yet once more," denotes the removing of those things which can be shaken, as of created things,

so that those things which cannot be shaken may remain.

28 Therefore,

since we receive a kingdom which cannot be shaken,

#### let us show gratitude,

by which we may <u>offer</u> to God an acceptable service with reverence and awe;

29 for our God is a consuming fire.
