Hebrews 13:10-14

Remember to begin your study early in the week so that you have time to really think (and keep thinking) about the passage without being rushed.

❖ Day 1

Read Hebrews 13:10-14.

For these lessons, the sermon text is provided in a format that visually helps display the structure of the paragraph or section of text. The main verbs are underlined. Commands are double-underlined. Generally, the main indicative clauses remain to the left, and the other clauses are either directly underneath when they have equal priority to what comes before, or are tabbed to the right when the clause supports, develops, or draws a conclusion from a neighboring clause.

10 We have an altar

from which those who serve the tabernacle
have no right to eat.

11 For the bodies

of those animals

whose blood is brought into the Holy Place
by the high priest
as an offering for sin

are burned outside the camp.

12 Therefore Jesus also suffered outside the gate,

that He might sanctify the people

through His own blood.

13 So then, let us go out to Him outside the camp,
bearing His reproach.

14 For here we do not have a lasting city,

but we are seeking *the city* which is to come.

8. How is Jesus' suffering outside the gate significant?

10. How have we seen Jesus as significant throughout the entire book of Hebrews? How does the whole of the book impacted the weight of this sacrifice he makes?

13. How is Jesus' death outside of the camp speak of his relationship with the Jews?
