### First Corinthians Sermon Study Equipping Class

### Colossians 1:15-20

In celebration of Christmas, Pastor Bret will spend the next couple of Sundays focusing on the Incarnation of Christ. This week we look at Colossians 1:15-20, which talks about the preeminence of Christ.

### ❖ Day 1

Background: "When Paul wrote to the Colossians, he was countering a clever company of false teachers who sought to replace the Colossians' enthusiastic devotion to Christ with only a mild approval of him. They didn't encourage anyone to forget Jesus altogether; they just said he wasn't the only show in town. According to these false teachers, Jesus got equal billing with a vast number of emanating spirits flowing out of God. They said Jesus could be prominent, but he certainly wasn't preeminent. In contrast, Paul—along with telling believers the truth about the gospel and pleasing God—tells us the truth about Jesus." (Max Anders, Galatians-Colossians, vol. 8, Holman New Testament Commentary (Nashville, TN: Broadman & Holman Publishers, 1999), 282–283.)

Read Colossians 1:15-20.

<sup>15</sup>He is the image of the invisible God, the **firstborn** of all creation. <sup>16</sup>For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities all things were created through him and for him. <sup>17</sup>And he is before *all things*, and in him all things hold together. <sup>18</sup>And he is the head of the body, the church. He is the beginning, the **firstborn** from the dead, that in everything he might be preeminent. <sup>19</sup>For in him *all* the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, <sup>20</sup>and through him to reconcile to himself *all things*, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of his cross.

1. In verse 15, to whom does "he" refer, and where did you find the answer? (Hint: Look at the verses preceding our passage.)

2. IMAGE: Commonly in ancient times (long before a king could broadcast his face and voice to his subjects over the airwaves), a king would erect a statue of himself to serve as a visible reminder of his authority. Similarly, a king's image stamped into a coin served to indicate its authenticity and jurisdiction. (See Daniel 3:1-7 and Matt 22:20.)

The Scriptures repeatedly speak of Jesus as the image of God. Look up 2 Corinthians 4:4; John 1:1, 14; Hebrews 1:3; and Colossians 2:9-10.

How do these verses help you understand what it means for Jesus to be "the image of the invisible God" (verse 15)?

- 3. In verses 16-17, what three evidences are given to demonstrate that Jesus is the firstborn of creation?
- 4. What three prepositions does Paul use in verse 16 to describe how Jesus relates to creation?
  - a. How does each preposition describe a different way Jesus relates to creation?

5. FIRSTBORN: 'Firstborn' often, but not always, refers to the one born first in chronology. It can also refer to one's superiority, authority, and right to rule or inherit. For example, look at Psalm 89:20, 27. There, God calls David His firstborn, even though David was neither the first son of Jesse nor the first king of Israel. Verse 27b clarifies that God was saying he would grant to David a special superiority over other kings.

How does this help you understand what it means for Christ to be "the firstborn of all creation" (verse 15) and "the firstborn from the dead" (verse 18)?

7. Verse 17 says that "in him all things hold together." If Jesus is holding all things together, how important does that make him?
a. What would happen if he stopped holding all things together?
8. If Jesus was before all things, does he need them in order for him to exist?
9. If Jesus is holding all things together, do they need him in order to exist?
10. Who is more powerful, the self-sufficient one or the dependent one?

Read Colossians 1:15-20 again.
11. Verses 18-20 describe how Jesus relates to the new/redeemed creation. Do you think "the firstborn from the dead" refers to time, or rank, or both? Explain.

13. What does 'preeminent' mean?
14. What two reasons are given for why Jesus should be preeminent?
15. How extensive is his preeminence supposed to be, and what phrases in the passage inform your answer?
16. How did Jesus "reconcile all things"? (see verse 20)
17. When was Jesus' preeminence first challenged?
18. How do you see Jesus' preeminence challenged in the world around us today?
19. Will Jesus' preeminence be challenged when he completes the new creation? (see Revelation 11:15-18; 21:3-4, 22-27; 22:3-5)
