First Corinthians Sermon Study Equipping Class

Hebrews 12:1-3

This coming weekend is DNOW for our church's youth. Adam Beutel, from Mission Road Bible Church, will be preaching a special sermon. While DNOW is the impetus, this passage is a wonderful reminder for us all. As usual, remember to begin your study early in the week so that you have time to really think about the passage without being rushed.

❖ Day 1

Read Hebrews 12:1-3.

For these lessons, the sermon text is provided in a format that visually helps display the structure of the paragraph or section of text. The verbs are underlined. The main clauses remain to the left, and the supporting clauses are either directly underneath when they have equal priority to what comes before, or are tabbed to the right when the clause supports, develops or explains previous clauses. As the class progresses, you will have the opportunity to learn how to do this yourself.

¹Therefore, since we <u>are surrounded</u> by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also <u>lay aside</u> every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and <u>let us run</u> with endurance the race that is set before us,

²<u>looking</u> to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith,

who for the joy that was set before him <u>endured</u> the cross, <u>despising</u> the shame,

and <u>is seated</u> at the right hand of the throne of God.

³<u>Consider</u> him who endured from sinners such hostility against himself, so that you <u>may not grow</u> weary

or fainthearted.
